Throckmorton Ridge Fire Station Update

It has been a busy winter for the Throckmorton Fire Station. With the warm winter and lack of rain we have had a lot of visitors to the water shed as well as the state park. With the increase in visitors we have had a steady increase in service calls



which have included several cliff rescues, multiple bicycle accidents, several motor vehicle accidents, as well as our normal medical aids.

As most of the residents are aware, we have been involved in a fuel reduction project along Panoramic Hwy. This project has been a long time in the works and is in coordination with the State Parks, MMWD and private citizens. The Marin County Fire Department's Tamalpais Fire Crew began cutting and piling brush from Four Corners to the fire station. When all was said and done over 2000 burn piles were created. Since the middle of December the fire crew has

been burning piles. This has been a slow process due to the number of no burn days and the inversion. The fire

crew tries to limit the impact of smoke to the community by monitoring both the weather and the fuel moistures before beginning each burn. The Marin County Fire Department would like to thank all who assisted as well as the community for allowing this project to go forward.

As spring time approaches we would like to remind people that we live in a wild land urban interface area and the need for 100' of defensible space around your residence. The Marin County Fire Department will once again begin our home and neighborhood inspections beginning in May and June. The Throckmorton Station would like to welcome Captain Jake Rosebrock who just transferred from our Tomales Fire Station. Jake has been with the department for over 10 years and is a great addition to the station.



Historic Homes on Mt Tamalpais



This is the first in a series of stories about historic homes and structures on Mt Tamalpais. What constitutes the term 'historic' is subjective. For this purpose, we will be featuring 'homes with a story'. Ever since the Mt. Tamalpais and Scenic Railway brought weekend adventurers up the mountain via steam, and down via gravity, people have been discovering the

3 Annie Lane (aka 3 Mountain View Avenue) I had a good friend in L.A. who had an Aunt named Kay DeClark. Kay

and I became close, perhaps because she lived in Beverly Hills and would drive me around to look at stars' homes, but primarily because she and I had fantastic talks. Many of her stories were about her history on Mt Tamalpais. She

owned a big piece of property she hadn't visited for many years, although she was emotionally attached to it.

3 Annie Lane was built in 1920, by a doctor who was a heart specialist. As the first home on the street, he named the lane after his wife Annie. It's a huge structure on three levels, plus a lovely lookout room, all encased in glass. The doctor had very specific plans - this would be a convalescent hospital specifically for heart patients. He would live on the top floor with his family, the middle floor would be for patients, and the bottom level for a caretaker of the vast property. He built beautiful pathways that wound all through the steep property. Once completed, the Marin County AMA came to inspect the sanitarium for certification. Well, they were shocked. According to the practice of the day, heart patients were most certainly not to get up out of their beds and walk - most especially on pathways in the woods. The doctor was denied certification and his dreams were dashed, which is amazing when we look at modern-day treatment of heart disease.


Go forward 30 years, and Kay DeClark was very young and newly married to a professor at San Francisco State, she herself getting a degree in education. They bought 'the big white elephant' for a great price, and set upon making it a home and a place they could rent out to help make payments. That summer, they were putting a balcony deck around the top floor, and her husband had a sudden heart attack and he died instantly. So Kay was in her 20's, going to school, widowed and had the responsibility of a large piece of property to handle on her own. Well, she did - for many years.



Thirty years after buying it, she encouraged me to go to San Francisco State University as: 1) they had a good film department and 2) my mediocre grades would suffice. And, I would have a place to live - the caretaker's apartment at 3 Annie Lane. In 1980, I moved to the home and spent 2.5 years in her magical house, before moving 500 yards downstream to the home we live in now.

300 Block on Panoramic Highway

If you see fewer bewildered hikers and joggers where Bayview Drive hits Panoramic, thank **the Cooksons**. It is Emily

Cookson's handsewn cloth banner that points Dipsea trekkers in the right direction (literally and figuratively). Dean, her husband,



chief information officer at Virgin America, **says** they've had a couple of knocks on the door from people who weren't sure where the Dipsea picked up after it crosses Panoramic, but mostly, the flummoxed visitors are just stopped in their tracks near the Cookson house, looking right, left and backward for some sign leading them to the famous trail.

The Cooksons are among the residents of the 300 block of Panoramic, the stretch that starts at Walsh and ends at about Lone Tree Avenue. The Cooksons, who include 8year-old Adrian and 6-year-old Nathan, moved into their yellow house in 2009 "for the view." They weren't quite prepared for all the fog. "Four days a year it's clear," Dean laughs, quickly adding that it's still worth it living on the mountain. Emily walks the kids to school down the Dipsea steps, and at home, they see bobcats and deer and other animals. "It's gorgeous," Deans says.

In another of the Lookout's Saturday strolls (mixed with a few phone calls) to meet the neighbors, one finds **Eike Ko-nopath** rotating the tires on his truck outside his geodesic dome home, but mostly, people are shut up inside, not at home or not eager (but polite about it) to talk to an unin-

vited guest about them-

Eike and **Wenona Konopath** weren't looking for a geodesic dome when they came house hunting on Mt. Tam in 1998. They just wanted access to the beautiful



outdoors. But the geodesic house wasn't selling – in part because banks don't offer conventional loans for "experimental structures" and it was a good deal. The advantages of the dome structure, Eike says, is that his PG&E bill is rarely more than \$40 because the sun keeps it heated and the winds don't come at it with the force they do a square house. If there's a disadvantage, it's that the roof is built in triangles and it's like building 12 roofs to put a new one up.

Bob Clemons was an engineer working for a railroad in Indiana in the early 6os when he heard about an intriguing new building project in the San Francisco Bay Area called BART. "The idea of working on this new transit system, which was the newest in the country at that time, piqued my interest."

300 Block on Panoramic Highway (cont'd)

Bob and his wife, **Emily**, weren't sure where to live in the Bay Area: one friend who lived on the Peninsula told them that "no one" lives north of the Golden Gate. But a relative told them they'd like Mill Valley and Bob had roots here, having lived at Hamilton Air Force Base for a short time as a child. They did like Mill Valley. They rented a house for a few years, moved to Washington D.C., with their son and daughter for three years and then came back. They then rented again on Marion Avenue for seven years before finding their house on Panoramic in 1975. "We didn't have any money and we bought this place because we could buy it on a veterans' loan with no down payment," Bob recalls. He went back to working for Bechtel, continuing his work on BART and other projects.

At that time, he remembers, he walked across the street and caught the bus to the city. "Greyhound operated one bus that started out at Point Reyes and came across the mountain. One bus in the morning and one bus out in the evening." School buses also took the kids to and from school, "so it was a different world," says Bob, who has been a vice president and member of the board of the Muir Woods Park Community Association.

When they didn't ride the school bus, Emily recalls, the kids walked up and down the Dipsea steps or rode their bicycles. It was a time of civil rights and then Vietnam War marches. Their son volunteered to help integrate Martin Luther King Junior Middle School in Sausalito, so after his ride to Edna McGuire in a school bus, another bus would take him to Sausalito.

Two years ago, **Sudeep Balain** joined **Kelly Purcell** at her house, which, although it has a Panoramic address, is down a lane away from the main traffic – and protected from the mountain's high winds . Sudeep is retired from a career in marketing and finance and now spends his time managing money and reading. Kelly runs the Paul Thiebaud Gallery in San Francisco. Sudeep finds the mountain "calming, very quiet . . . spiritual . . . There's no better place for me."

Roberta Doleson-Weiss fell in love with Marin on several trips from her native New York, one during which she, at separate times, got a job at the old Trident in Sausalito and met her husband, **Mark Weis**, a Mill Valley

native. They have been on Mt. Tam since 1980, and their two children, Jarret, who invented an iPhone app and lives in San Francisco, and



Daryn, a dance teacher in Harlem, were born in the

Roberta is a personal trainer and teacher at Happy Feet Dance Studio and Mark is a woodworker who once owned the Mill Valley Cabinet Shop. Roberta says she feels fortunate to have her kids grow up in the outdoors but also near museums and plays and other cultural offerings. "I'm very thankful to be here," she says.

The only thing that sometimes make her think more fondly of New York is the lack of sidewalks, open doors and street lights that made her own childhood a more friendly neighborhood experience. "It's a tradeoff," she says. "This mountain is so beautiful – wildlife, bobcats. A falcon landed on our porch and a deer dropped its antlers here."

Jeffrey Cohen, who lives on Panoramic with his artist wife Bonnie, thinks there's just enough neighborliness on the mountain. "There's a sense of community but we're not in each other's faces," he says. What drew him and his wife was the outdoors: "the wildness, the view, the feeling that you can smell the ocean, the air." Cohen, who writes songs and works at a tea shop, has lived on Panoramic since 1987. He and his wife have a grown daughter who grew up here.

Bob and Ciri Berg lived on Monte Cimas for a decade before buying their bigger house on Panoramic last year. Ciri is a financial adviser and Bob works at home in a number or businesses, including wine distribution and sports investment. They had a chance to move anywhere last year but in the end, they realized they loved the mountain for themselves and their dogs, with its "killer views" and proximity to trails and Muir Woods. If there are drawbacks, it's that when Bob wants to take a break from work and mingle, he has to go downtown. When he lived in the city, he could just walk out his door. Also, the fog can be off-putting. "The last two summers have been a little difficult," he says.

Carl Duisberg and **Linda Lindskog** came back to Linda's hometown following Carl's 35-year career as a foreign service officer, which included a stint in Afghanistan. Carl loves everything about the mountain, including the storms – and the views. "I like being on the edge – all the madness of the bay below." It's amazing, he adds, how Marin has been able to save open space and avoid the crushing development of other communities. – Diane Curtis

Neighbors

In July 2011, Elisabeth (Betli) Scheibach was interviewed by representatives of The Jefferson Awards Committee. She had been nominated as an outstanding volunteer for service performed in the Bay Area. Pictures were taken and shown on Channel 5 and also described on KGO Radio.



On January 12, all of the Jefferson Awards finalists were introduced at a program held at the Herbst Theatre in San Francisco. Each finalist was awarded a large Plaque and five of the top individuals will go to New York for a National Selection.

In 1969 Elisabeth (Betli) Scheibach was certified as a BRAILLE TRANSCRIBER by The Library Of Congress. The certification resulted from one semester of classes at the College of Marin to learn the language of Braille and the completion of exams by the Library of Congress.

After receiving her certification, she joined a group of volunteers working under the name of *Transcribing Mariners*. The work involved writing letters or copying text books into Braille for blind individuals.

A Perkins Brailler, similar to a manual typewriter, was used to make the dots on paper for the blind to read. Later, computers and special programs were developed, which sped up the time to type each page and make corrections.

As the skills improved and computers were obtained, *Transcribing Mariners* began to print text books in braille for the state of California and many of the school districts of other states. Betli purchased her own computer and was able to work at home. At the same time she started as a volunteer at Guide Dogs for the Blind. With her knowledge of Braille she was able to complete all types of material for the blind students.

Mt. Tam Easements: Meaning and Function

I have been a resident on Mt. Tam for forty-three years. One of the things that has struck me during that time has been my ability to strike off in any direction down an easement and get anywhere on the mountain.

If you check the title papers of your property you will see reference to the year 1903 as the base year for the survey. At that time, the automobile was a slight gleam in Henry Ford's eye. Walking and horses were the main modes of transportation. Laid out n our community were many walking trails. This is why we have paper streets that seem to go uphill. Historically, these passages allowed people to get around. They all appear on the county maps and are recognized as through passages.

Recently and over past years, I have noticed that some people regard these passages as their private property. Some people havwe put up gates and some have put padlocks on the gates. Since these avenues are designated by the county as easements, they are fin the public domain and cannot become private except through a legal hearing and release by the county.

Given our similar situation with the Oakland Hills and the need for safe egress from the mountain if a fire or earthquake encroaches on the houses. These easements may be our only way down the mountain. To block or impede easements is highly questionable and could place residents in serious danger. All residents on the mountain need to realize that these easements are established on the map and that neighbors have the right to pass over them unimpeded.

Spring into Muir Woods

Try one of the newly opened trails for a fresh experience this spring! After nearly seven years of being closed, the Dipsea Trail below upper Muir Woods Road is open and is a great way, via the Sun Trail, to experience the early spring wildflowers and greening hills! Dias Trail is now redone, rerouted and OPEN! Take this trail down to Muir Beach to see the new floodplain, creek channel and approach to the beach...we're not the only ones who like the new scene: late January storms brought salmon and steelhead up into Redwood Creek! We'll be eagerly looking into the waters from Muir Woods bridges for young fish in early April.

In Muir Woods a new boardwalk greets our neighbors walking in from Panoramic trailheads. It literally gives you the feeling of floating above the forest floor; the design eliminates the protective rails so you can have a much more intimate experience among the redwoods, hear singing Pacific Wren and enjoy the early flowers such as trillium, houndstongue, redwood violet and milkmaids. Rangers spend most of their time these days either greeting school groups or working on how to relieve unsafe parking, road congestion and other site impacts. You can help by joining one of our volunteer crews to weed, work on trails or clean the beach. The walls rise skyward Like the wings of angels. Holding light and air and Giddy space.


But sheetrock mud Besmears the walls, White plaster splatters On the plastic curtains That cover everything.

Yoga on the Mountain
