The tour stopped at 8 sites this year, most of them museums: Penn Brad Oil, Marilyn Horne, Zippo - Case, Eldred WWII, and the Kinzua Bridge Visitors Center and Skywalk which included a catered lunch by 'Eddie's on Main' of Port Allegany.

Fireside Pumpers Talks in April & May

The first Fireside Pumpers program of 2023 was Jim Zoschg, a conservation resource technician for the Cameron County Conservation District, speaking about "Invasive Plant Species" in our area.



Accompanied by many images of introduced plants such as Japanese stilt grass, mile-a-minute vine, and Oriental bittersweet, their negative effects and methods of spreading were emphasized. He pointed out that many of these plants were deliberately introduced, such as garlic mustard for erosion control, or periwinkle and pachysandra for landscaping. He also noted that the locally famous Bradford Pear is now on the Pennsylvania Noxious Weed List. Many questions were asked about the edibility of invasive plants, apple tree diseases, and non-invasive ground cover plants.

Generously supported by McCracken Energy Services,

May's program was "The History of the Music Mountain Oil Field" by long-time resident of Music Mountain, Tom Frair, a retired consulting forester and owner of Frair Haus Greenhouse and Gardens. He based his talk on, and distributed copies of, a document written by Neil Wilson, a field rep for several oil investors in the Music Mountain area south of Lewis Run, PA. A spectacular gusher was brought in on August 4, 1937, during the depths of the Great Depression, by wildcatter Ed Williams working for Niagara Oil Corporation. The prodigious flow (up to 50 barrels in just 6 minutes) was totally unexpected for the Sliverville Lease, and at this time, which last saw a freeflowing gusher 40 years before. The excitement led to hundreds of other wells drilled by several other oil companies, and the building of pipelines and storage tanks.



Newspaper clippings describing

the economic boom were displayed along with maps and the museum's sample of Sliverville Sand, an unusual formation 4 miles long but only about 800 feet wide. Several members of the large audience related their own relationships to Music Mountain, including Mike Nenno whose attorney father helped to liquidate the excessive and expensive purchases of the Williams family which had, like many sudden millionaires, ended bankrupt.

PBOM on Collectible Pin Trail



This is an update to an article that was written by our former museum manager Sam Slocum and published in our Fall 2019 newsletter.

As briefly explained before, the trail is a route drivable by car or motorcycle that was developed in 2019 by the Allegheny National Forest Visitors Bureau. The trail connects 10 sites, each of which offers a colorful metal pin that can only be purchased at that location. The ANFVB website urges travelers to "explore the region's rich history as you visit the sites along the trail! McKean County, PA, was created in 1804. Its fascinating history is founded on the early lumber and oil industries and its story is told in iconic American events from the Underground Railroad and the Civil War to the invention of the Zippo lighter in Bradford. McKean County is home to the world's oldest operating refinery and is the birthplace of the American endangered species movement."

The updated news is that in 2020 Linda Devlin, the Executive Director of the ANFVB, received the PA Museum's Special Achievement Award for the McKean County Collectible Pin Program. Then in 2021, the Heritage Partnership Award was given by the PA Route 6 Alliance in recognition of the Pin Trail as a unique way to link local county heritage sites while promoting traveling.

Here at the Penn Brad Oil Museum, our pins are such popular souvenirs with young and old alike that we have had to re-order more. Come visit us to obtain one, and also a pocket map, at the museum's gift shop.



St. Patrick's Day Dinner Event



NYSOPA Inducts Six Honorees to Wall of Fame

The New York State Oil Producers' Association (NYSOPA) "Wall of Fame" was established in 2005 to honor those individuals who labored so intensively to build the local oil and gas industry. Working in conjunction with NYSOPA, the Pioneer Oil Museum of New York provides the facility, organization, and labor to permanently house this exhibit. With this year's class included, there will be 70 members of this Wall of Fame. This year there are six inductees.

Al Fenner was employed as a nitroglycerin "shooter" for many years in the Bolivar area. He worked for the Otto Torpedo Co. of Bolivar and Duke Center, PA, for 25 years as well as for the Bolwell Torpedo Company.

Bob Keller spent his entire life in the oil business and, in 1923, became partners with Bill Hughes of Bolivar and Nat Hill of Portville, purchasing the Waid Oil Co. located on Daggett Hollow. They later changed the name to the Hill, Hughes, and Keller Oil Co. He operated the Keller family lease on Daggett Hollow and, in the 1950s, he bought the Gowdy Lease on Ford's Brook with Sepp Hendrix.

A life-long Bolivar resident, Dave ("Red Beard") Hollister was employed as an independent oil field contractor for many years. He was the owner/producer of several small oil companies including Moore Producing, Inc. on Salt Rising Road, CHW Oil and Gas on Daggett Hollow, Empty Tank Oil, and Hopewell Oil Co. After serving in the U.S. Navy

during WWII, Willard "Bill" Cline returned to his hometown of Bradford, PA, to fulfill his lifelong dream of having his own oil production company. He operated wells throughout the Bradford oil field and several in New York. He served as president of the Bradford District Pennsylvania Oil Producers' Association and as a member of the board of directors of the Pennsylvania Independent Petroleum Producers. He was instrumental in forming the original Petroleum Production Training class at Bradford Area High School in the 1970s. In 2014, he received the Colonel Edwin L. Drake Legendary Oilman Award from the Petroleum History Institute, the highlight of his career.

Wellsville native **David Haskins** began his career in the oil business at Custer Oil Co. He held positions with Wellsville-based Haskins Oil Co. and Ebenezer Oil Co. working at various Alma Hill and Whitesville leases. He was a board member, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer for Ebenezer. He was instrumental in an experimental water flooding program known as Maraflood, working with Marathon Oil Co. of Ohio on local Ebenezer properties. He was a member, director, and officer of NYSOPA as well as a life member of the Penn Grade Crude Oil Association.

At age 17, **Bob Benson** joined the Merchant Marines during World War II and later served during the Korean Conflict. He was employed for many years by Joyce Western in Andover, NY, as a superintendent. Eventually he began a long career as an independent oil and gas producer. He was a longtime member and director of the NYSOPA.

As the local oil and gas industry crossed the border between NY and PA, many of these inductees worked in both states. The Pioneer Oil Museum invites the public from Pennsylvania and New York to attend the induction ceremony on June 23 at 6:00 at the Pioneer Oil Museum's location on Boss Street in Bolivar, NY.
