

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Eastern Producers Glycerine Explosion on the Miller Farm

My great-grandfather Andrew (Pete) Miller was born in 1855 as his parents emigrated from the state of Thuringia, Germany. It was recorded that he was born in New York, NY but according to family lore he was actually born on the boat. I suppose that "Atlantic Ocean" wouldn't have been a valid entry. The family settled in Buffalo and later had a farm in Cheektowaga. He went to work in a shoe factory. According to what I remember from my grandfather, William Miller, Andrew, along with one of his brothers who also worked at the shoe plant, actually came up with the idea for what became the Goodyear Welt method of attaching the sole to the upper of a shoe. The daughter of my grandfather's older sister concurred with this, having

heard the same thing from her mother.

According to Wikipedia, The Goodyear Welt was invented in 1869 by Charles Goodyear Jr., son of Charles Goodyear. That would make Andrew 14 years old at the time. It is conceivable that he could have been serving as an apprentice, a common practice at that point in time. Sometime after that Andrew moved to Lafayette Township, McKean County, PA where he purchased a tract of land and proceeded to clear the virgin hemlock in order to build a farm. It is my understanding that he had a partner at first until the land was cleared and then bought out the partner. He did not acquire the minerals as there were four wells on the property owned by Grant

MacGregor. He did have free gas however. He cleared the large hemlock stumps by laying a gas line to each stump and burning a gas fire until the stump was consumed.

Andrew and his wife Honora Sheehan Miller raised three children on the farm: Gertrude, William and Arthur. My grandfather William was born on this farm in 1895. I fondly remember as a youth having many conversations with my grandpa, a wonderful humble, kind and loving man, about his growing up on that farm. I would go with him sometimes when he would pump his wells on a property he owned that adjoined the farm. It was a tough life and everyone had to work really hard for survival as the land was very poor for farming. They raised vegetables and had dairy cattle. Grandpa told about delivering butter from the isolated farm to I presume Lafayette, Riterville and possibly Mt. Alton. When possible he would walk on the steam boxes that were built to insulate the steam lines from the boiler to the pumping rigs at the wells. My grandfather faithfully

kept a daily journal throughout his life, even as much as possible while serving in the Army in France in WWI. Most of these journals have been preserved and I gleaned some of my information from them.

As a youth Grandpa would help Mr. MacGregor work on his wells but somewhere along the line MacGregor decided to abandon the wells. After the wells were abandoned the Miller farm lost its gas supply. Grandpa remarked that it was always so cold and dark after they had to revert to wood heat and oil lamps after having had gas light and heat in the house and a gas flare in the yard. Sometime after the wells had been abandoned Cory L. Baker acquired the minerals, reopened one of the MacGregor wells and drilled a new one. The new well was completed in 1913, at first in the Bradford Third Sand but then deepened to the Upper Kane Sand.

The rig was powered by a 15 hp. steam engine that didn't have enough power to drill the well to the depth of the Upper Kane. Consequently, the diameter of the hole was reduced from 6½ inches to 4 inches. The engine could barely swing the smaller tools as the well was deepened to 2325 feet. My grandfather was hired to stand by the engine and help the flywheel around so the engine would not stall on center stroke. He was 18 at the time.

He and Mr. Baker became friends as evidenced by a letter in my possession from Baker to my grandfather. I think that his early associations with MacGregor and

Baker as well as personnel of the South Penn Oil Co. that adjoined the farm influenced Grandpa to gravitate toward the oil business. I know he did not want to go into farming. The South Penn people let my grandfather use their boilers and gas at night to boil maple sap. He made heat exchangers that would pass live steam through pipe immersed in the sap in a wooden barrel. It was very efficient and he made as much as nine gallons of syrup in a night.

Eventually, my great-grandfather (Andrew) moved off the farm and built a brick house on the corner of Roberts Rd. and Rt. 59 that is now the residence of Bruce and Bev Roberts. There he operated a general store and shoe shop, making custom-made shoes. The establishment even had an ice pond and ice house to provide refrigeration. Andrew died however in 1926 and the family sold the house. It became a bar for several

years before becoming a private residence.

After being dormant for some time the farm property was sold to Daniel H. McQueeney for the purpose of building a nitroglycerine manufacturing plant for the Eastern Producers Glycerine Company formed by Mr. McQueeney in 1935. McQueeney claimed to have a new method of nitro manufacture to make the well shot more efficacious. The new company also sported the latest hydraulic reels on their shooting trucks.

The new nitroglycerine plant was erected very close to where the Miller residence had been on the farm. There was a necessity for a source of sufficient fuel to fire the boiler for operating the plant. As

it happened, my great-uncle Arthur Miller had an oil property near to the old farm. It was on the other side of the farm from Grandpa's oil property. Arthur provided that source of fuel by drilling a well to the Kane Sand for gas. A pipeline was laid from the well to the boiler house for the plant on the old Miller farm. My father Andrew D. Miller was 10 years old at the time and helped lay the pipeline. I remember his telling about how strenuous the work was for him at that age.

McQueeney's company operated until March 10, 1938 when at around 2

PM a tremendous explosion occurred. Both my mother and my father were in school at the M. J. Ryan School in Lafayette. My mother Pauline recalls that windows in the school were cracked as were I am sure those in residences. It was reported by The Bradford Era that the door on Tack's Inn was blown open at a distance of four miles from the blast. It was estimated that between 600 and 800 quarts of liquid nitroglycerine had detonated. The explosion killed both Mr. McQueeney and shooter Ralph Mong. It left a hole in the ground about six feet deep and 20 or 30 feet in diameter at the site of the building where the explosive had been manufactured.

Some of the school boys including my dad were enlisted to scour the debris field for fragments of the bodies to be put in baskets. Only small fragments of Mr. McQueeney's body were found,

the largest being a foot and an arm. The torso along with the back of the head of Mr. Mong's body was found.

As it turns out I actually was acquainted with one of Dan McQueeney's daughters, Winifred (Jackie) Cotton, but I never realized she was his daughter until I read her obituary. She lost her father when she was 18.

Nitroglycerine was used to enhance production in oil and gas wells for well over a century. It made many wells profitable that would not otherwise have been and enabled the recovery of oil, not only in the Bradford Field. Fortunately, accidents of this nature were few and far between but they did happen. This was one example of how destructive nitroglycerine could be when it detonates in the wrong place at the wrong time.
