Humoresque

"The One whose throne is in heaven sits laughing." - Psalm 2:4

One more caroling session has passed with the sopranos getting all the glory. As though to hit high C were singing! It's always like this, however. The soprano, without lifting a finger or (frequently) singing on key, is worshipped by an ignorant public. The alto - the stable, reliable, on-pitch alto - invariably is ignored. Perhaps this happens because the basic listener can always hear those sopranos wailing around in the upper octaves. People know they're singing and not just faking it with the lips. Altos tend to blend in. They are the drudges of the chorus. Getting the leftover notes of the scale, picking them out of what's left from the mangle the sopranos are making of the G clef. Altos don't even get full sentences to sing. Rarely a grammatical phrase. Mostly it's nonsensical filler, "My tree ummmm, what ahhhh to go" or the occasional mystic syllable. Sopranos sing the highest part, which is, of course, the easiest. After all, they can hear themselves above the rest. Their part is always printed on the top; not for them the laborious task of finding a note in the middle

of four other ones on the score. Anyway, sopranos almost always get the melody. As for the others in the chorus...well, the bass is just the soprano in reverse. He's so low it becomes immaterial whether he's on key or not. And, faith, who could ever criticize that fine ol' tenor? You can't lend money to a soprano, either. She's flighty and she'll never pay it back. A tenor will pay back a loan by taking you out for drinks. A bass will repay you and make it sound like he's doing you a favor. Altos never borrow money. They arrive on time for rehearsal. They have always studied their music in advance. They don't fuss about seating. Sopranos don't see the point to all that. They're temperamental. When they cause a scene, the world stops. If an alto causes a scene, everyone thinks she's kidding. You can't criticize a soprano, however. Tenors think they're soul mates (something about singing up where the angels are), and basses worship sopranos - from afar. Sopranos sing solos. Altos sing lead-ins. The most praise an alto hears is "Oh, what a lovely duet you and that soprano sang. "Does anyone ever ask an alto if she's had voice lessons? Most non-altos think being an alto is like having a lisp or growing too tall. Some people even think you are doing it on purpose and if you'd only try, you could sound as nice as that soprano. For your mother, it's a failure second only to not having you married yet. Oh, I can sing in the soprano range all right, but I won't - I have too many principles. So, during the holidays, we were singing carols at work. Along came the typical soprano. She trilled her way in, hummed most of the words and invented her version of the tunes. An octave lower, on pitch, I sang out each word, pure and clear. At the end, the others said to me, "How nice you know all the words. But what a voice that Mary has!" "The off-key creep couldn't hold a note in a catcher's mitt," I almost said. But instead, I did what altos always do: I smiled, harmoniously.
