and I mean, though I often forget, to give thanks,
to faint down by the kitchen table in a prayer of rejoicing
as the holy birds at the kitchen window peck into their
marriage of seeds.

this laughter of the morning, lest it go unspoken.

Joy that isn't shared, I've heard, dies young.



MISSION TRIP REPORT

Stories, stories, stories! Heart wrenching stories, stories of hope, stories of how God is working in the many ministries of Frontera de Cristo. What exactly was the Mission Delegation “doing” in Aqua Prieta on their mission trip?

We listened to stories. We were building relationships. We were present – a ministry of presence that communicated louder than words that we care and that we hear our border brothers and sisters as they tell their stories. Beyond the stories, we shared experiences with members of Lirios de Valles Presbyterian Church. Our youth and their youth made an early and lasting connection. We sang together, played together at the sports complex and made tamales together in the home of Ana who faithfully made us delicious breakfasts most days. We were blessed to have Joca Gallegos as coordinator of the delegations that are visiting Frontera de Cristo for our daily activities and translator extraordinaire!

Carmina Gasteleum Sanchez shared how she and her husband, Oscar, migrated to the border as teenagers, Oscar from a small farming community ten hours south of Aqua Prieta and Carmina from the state of Chiapas. Carmina told her story of trying to live in Aqua Prieta with their two children on the wages with Carlos working as a factory worker and her working at Café Justo. She shared the pain of her heart when she told us of the difficult decision of Oscar to go to the U.S. on a work visa so he could provide for the family. Being apart is very difficult for them.

On Sunday evening, we visited CAME, a hospitality center for migrants, staffed by volunteers. “It was founded in 2002 as a collaborate project of the parish of La Sagrada Familia church, the Archdiocese of

Hermosillo, and Catholic Relief Services to address the needs of the vulnerable and the poor who cross the border to seek a better life in the U.S. or who are being deported back to Mexico. Many families arrive after spending several days in the Sonora Desert without food, water, a place to stay, or other resources. Recently, CAME has been providing support for persons from Central America who want to present for asylum at the US Port of Entry.” Our delegation shared a dinner at the center and heard stories of those who were there. One particularly poignant story touched us as Miguel and Susanna and their one and half year-old son told of fleeing from Honduras in fear of their lives. Susanna cried at the loss of her ten year-old

son who stayed with her mother and how she can no longer have contact with them for fear of endangering them. Miguel had been a policeman and she had worked in security. They had applied and were denied asylum seven times.

Mark Adams, our mission co-worker took us on a tour of the border wall challenging us to think about how Jesus would see the wall. He shared the story of the history of the border and the wall.

An impactful experience was on Tuesday when we were divided into two “families” so we could see what eating on a maquila, factory worker, wages is like. Family A was made up of 5 people, 2 working in a Maquila, 3 students. In fact, a factory worker as a machine operator, makes the equivalent of \$40.11 a week, \$5.73 a day, \$1.91 per meal to feed that family of 5. Family B also had 5 persons, 3 working in Maquila, 2 students. A maintenance worker makes the equivalent of \$58.82 per week, \$8.40 a day and \$2.80 per meal. After paying bills and setting aside money for other necessities, we had to figure out what was left so we could go shopping in our families for our three meals the next day. One family had more money than the other. We have



our own stories about that experience.

After our shopping expedition, we went to the home of Familia Cifuentes for dinner and conversation. We were impressed with the humble surroundings in a very small space and yet Lidia graciously served a meal of rice and beans and calabacitas. This lovely twenty-three-year-old woman not only provided dinner but looked after her three children as we ate and talked and shared of her passion for serving those who have less through a mercy ministry she and her friend Lili Llamas started. Both women are members of Lirio de Valles. She shared stories of her experiences with us.

A rainy, soggy, cold Tuesday morning found us visiting CREDDA, a drug-rehab Center of “addicts helping addicts.” Laura, a recovered addict herself, is director of the center. She shared her story of beginning CREDDA with her husband who has since passed away. Javier, also a recovering addict translated for us and together they shared about the center, about some of the issues they are having and about the improvements they are planning. We had a tour of the facility. The cramped housing setting and the whole situation was hard for us to wrap our heads around. And yet recovery was there despite the conditions. The whole experience was unsettling for some of our delegation.

CREDDA has been partnered with Aqua Para La Vida Ministry, Water for Life, since 2004. Our van was driven by the street pastor, Rosendo Sichler Rubio. The plan was to follow the truck that had members of the Rehab Center along the migrant trail to put fresh water in the desert for those who are crossing the border.

We did indeed drive the road until the truck was stuck and then the van got stuck. Younger members of our group along with the folks from CREDDA worked together to get unstuck. The mud was of the caliche variety, nearly impossible to navigate in. First, they got the truck unstuck. The van proved to be entirely different matter. The truck left us and went to get ropes to pull us out. We ate our Maquila lunches as we waited. The youth especially enjoyed the slipping and sliding and even digging out of the mud! Ultimately it took about six hours with five more times of getting stuck, another retreat to get a chain after the rope kept breaking, before we made it out. By the time we got back most of the delegation members wanted showers and something hot to drink. Only three of us barely made it to the prayer vigil in Douglas.



Identificado” because they were unable to identify them.

On Wednesday morning the manager of the Café Justo shared the story of the ministry of the coffee shop part of the business. Some of the people who work there come from CREDDA. The coffee shop hosts regular Bible studies including our own. Later we went to Dougla Prieta Trabaja Women’s ministry for lunch and to hear the stories told by Trini and by RosaLinda. Trini shared her experiences of becoming part of the cooperative while RosaLinda shared about the beginnings of the women’s ministry. We also had great fun learning how to make first corn tortillas, then flour. The lunch was delicious! After lunch we heard the story of the beginning of the Café Justo Cooperative told by Daniel Cifuentes who was a founder and dreamer of the coop. Afterwards, we were given a tour of the roasting part of the facility. Ahhh...the smell of fresh roasted coffee!

Thursday morning, we got to help out and interact with the youth at the Children’s Enrichment Center. The center is a ministry to help keep children away from drugs. The children are at particularly high risk for drug involvement. School in Aqua Prieta is half day with morning and afternoon sessions. The children come



Healing our Borders Prayer Vigil is an in interfaith group which was organized in December of 2000 in response to the growing number of migrant deaths in Cochise County. The Prayer Vigil takes place every Tuesday, regardless of weather conditions, along the Pan American Highway in Douglas, Arizona. It was a sobering experience to hold up crosses, call out the name on the cross and join all in in the procession with a resounding “Presentado” honoring the presence of the people who lost their lives. Some crosses said “No



to the center in the half day that they aren't in school. Our youth played with the children outside. The rest of our delegation either helped outside or read and drew or painted. We had lunch with the staff in between the two sessions. After lunch we had the opportunity to explore a local mall. Following shopping, the group split with the younger contingency going to Ada's house with the youth of Lirios de Valles to make tamales (more stories there). The rest went back to CREDDA for an uplifting time of encouragement through music, prayer and video. We finished the day with Mark and Miriam in their home where we shared a delicious meal and our gratitude about our day/time during the week.

On Friday, we wrapped up our visit with Biblical reflections, like we had done every day, with checking in about our week and with a discussion about what comes next after returning home. There was so much to digest, to reflect on and to ponder that very question. We are so grateful for Frontera de Cristo and their many ministries, for the work they do and for the support of FPC Mesa and all of their prayers. On Sunday, March 24th, the delegation shared their experiences during both services. They will share more at the PW luncheon on May 11th. Please invite and engage in conversation with members of the delegation. This is just an overview of the many stories we heard and the many we have to tell so ask us! Thank you, God for this opportunity to build relationships and gain understanding of the realities of our brothers and sisters at the border!
