## Giving by good people always releases a special kind of joy.

## Hitting some of the highlights:

- A roof to keep the Fellowship Hall dry
- The parking lot shows our faith in the neighborhood, plus lighting to increase safety
- The 1950s electrical system modernized to safely handle more power, and more powerful air conditioning in the library and youth area to keep our meetings comfortable
- Not to mention new thermostats to keep us from freezing or baking, or both, in those meetings.

## Behind the numbers:

Roundly speaking this is about \$500,000 (and that doesn't even include work done at the preschool, which was almost a quarter million dollars.) That's a lot of money, but the <u>VAST</u> majority of it has already been raised.

- Some of these projects were planned well in advance
- Some were surprises
- All were necessary
- All were completed on time, and on budget
- All are investments in the future of our church, and they continue our mission to serve down-town Mesa

Improvements like we've done continue a tradition of using the gifts we have been given to their best and highest use.

## Tradition of faith:

Since the original chapel was first constructed at the end of the 1940s, the congregation has tackled big projects over the decades.

- During the 1950s we built Fellowship Hall, the office, and education wing
- The 1960s saw the completion of our sanctuary
- Throughout the 70s and 80s we started several valley churches. Some of you reading this were part of those lasting missions.
- To embrace the musical side of spirituality we installed a PIPE ORGAN
- The decades of the 1980s and 90s saw the preschool sprout, grow, and then flourish
- After that we built the Trinity Building When the need was there, we stepped up to the plate and DELIVERED.

## The need:

Once again, the need arises. The work we have done this year costs money. But fundraising has fallen short during this summer of heat and vacation travel, so we need your help closing the gap.

Look around the campus now, and see that the property is well cared for. Donations given for the church's capital projects will also be well cared for.



## Worship

Shortly after we moved our Sunday morning worship from Fellowship Hall back to the Sanctuary, Mark Ramsey and Dan Reeves met with the company who configured and outfitted the Sanctuary for the large screen monitors and live-streaming. Our purpose was for the company to assess the current equipment in Fellowship Hall, and to make recommendations to equip the Hall for in-service and live-stream technology comparable to the Sanctuary. While the representative was on campus, we also visited the Sanctuary to review the performance of our equipment there. As a result, several proposals were submitted. These were reviewed, prioritized and approved by the Worship



Committee for submission to Session. In its August 16th meeting, Session approved the proposals as presented. Here's a summary of what we currently have in process, as well as what we hope to be working on over the course of the next several months.

The Sanctuary visit revealed that two units of the older "behind the scenes" audio equipment were either not functioning properly, or in the case of one unit not functioning at all. Updating the connection from the Sound Booth to the equipment closet behind the Quiet Room from analog to digital was deferred from a previous project for cost considerations. To address these, as well as some other minor technology issues we're facing in our online/in-person worship services, these items were prioritized first, and we're excited to let you know that funding was identified and approved for the following projects:

Update the Live-Stream firmware and further stabilize two of the three cameras, as well as install two new audio sequencers with related equipment and digital snake from the Sound Booth to the Sequencer Closet. We hope to have this project completed within the next couple of months, but certainly before the beginning of the holiday season.

Improvements to Fellowship Hall will include a new digital projector, two monitors flanking the stage on either side, a new sound board, and upgrades to make the room more technology smart and Live-Stream ready. Because the Fellowship Hall projects will benefit future worship services, stage productions and outside groups who rent the Hall, we would like to complete those by the end of the first quarter 2024 prior to the next First Players' Production and the return of worship to Fellowship Hall for Summer 2024. Due to the more complex nature of certain elements, we're still working to identify potential sources and/or methods of funding those projects.
