As I am getting “settled in” to both FPC Mesa and the city of Mesa itself, I am enjoying learning about all of the wonderful things happening in this area. Our congregation reaches out with Christ’s love through our Food Pantry, our participation in I-HELP, Vacation Bible School, Mission trips, and caring for our own congregation through our Deacons and Befrienders. I imagine there are others ways I haven’t yet learned about!

Many good things are going on in the city of Mesa as well, and I was introduced to some of them at a For Our City Mesa meeting in early August. The mission of For Our City Mesa is to be a catalyst for constructive change at the community grassroots level. The vision is to bring together leaders in the community from faith communities, businesses, non-profit organizations, and local government to identify and address the needs and concerns of our area, as well as promote and explore its many wonderful opportunities. When we all come together, we will all be better for the collaboration!

Here are some of the highlights and opportunities to serve our local community:

- **National Day of Service on Monday 9/11** – Neighbors helping neighbors with a variety of projects. For more info on this, contact Bryan Goodwin, Neighborhood Outreach volunteer coordinator at 480-644-3705 or bryan.goodwin@mesaas.gov
- **Make a Difference Day on Saturday, October 28th** – an opportunity to volunteer for 2-4 hours to give back to the community to help make it a better place. Many “beautification” projects in which to assist including painting, park clean up, etc.
- **Mesa Veterans Resource Center** – Provides job training for vets with funding from a grant from Boeing; volunteers are needed to walk alongside vets to help them get the assistance they need and deserve. Located at MCC downtown campus, Suite 101 www.mesaunitedway.org/mesa-veterans-resource-center
- **CarePortal** – “Connected by technology; Powered by people; Led by God.” This is a means to help meet tangible needs in our community by connecting churches who want to help with the families who have the need. The needs are identified by case managers in the child welfare system and an email is sent out to participating churches within a certain radius (i.e. 15 miles) of the family so that the need can be met locally and a relationship can be developed, if appropriate.

These are just a sampling of the many ways to reach out to neighbors in need and enhance our Mesa community. Of course, volunteers are always needed in our congregation as well! If you have some time to offer and are not sure where there is a need, please don’t hesitate to give me a call or come in for a visit and together we can figure out a place for you to serve!

We have a new Sunday morning schedule! Several of our HolyGrounds families asked for an earlier worship time, and our Session voted unanimously to move the service to 11:00 a.m. The Christian Education classes now begin at 10:15 and conclude at 11:00. The first service time has not changed. The complete schedule looks like this:

9:00 First Service
10:00 Social Time (coffee, punch, and cookies)
10:15 Christian Education
11:00 HolyGrounds



It's been five years since a Sunday morning schedule change has occurred, and we are continually working to create a schedule that allows everyone the opportunity to participate in all that FPC has to offer. We have a wonderful and growing CE program, and the time change positions the CE start time even closer to the end of first service and to the beginning of the second service. It is our prayer that the time changes will be a means to draw us all closer together while opening the door for others to share in our ministries.

The Worship Commission is a busy group. In addition to considering time changes, the Commission shares in tasks ranging from the mundane selection of special bulletin covers to the awesome responsibility of allocating Commission funds. Our main focus, however, is Worship. We spend most of our time planning for worship and finding ways to draw others to worship. In fact, with that in mind, a new FPC website will soon be unveiled. The site will be a fresher-looking online presence for FPC!

The Commission also plans for seasonal services, for Worship in the Park, for our choirs, the Prayer Chain, communion services, ushers, and the upkeep of our musical instruments. We prepare for weddings, funerals, and memorial services, and we provide music for special church events, such as theater productions, Artist Series events, caroling for our shut-ins, and even liturgical dance!

During my trip through Las Vegas this summer, it was pointed out to me that there are more churches in Las Vegas than casinos! Peace and Global Witness Offering

It is once again time for one of the four annual special offerings as set forth by our denomination. The Peace and Global Witness Offering will be highlighted in September during a Minute for Mission. The offering can be gathered throughout the month or collected on World Communion Sunday, October 1st. This year we will do both. You may give earlier in September or wait for October 1st. Presbyterian Mission agency provided the following inspiration for your prayerful and generous giving:



PROCLAIM THE PEACE OF CHRIST

“So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near.” — Ephesians 2:14-17

The letter to the Ephesians tells us that Jesus came to proclaim a universal peace. While the earthly ministry of Jesus occurred in a specific age and place, the peace he shared is limited by neither time nor geography. As followers of Christ, our call to work for peace begins in our own neighborhoods and extends to the ends of the earth. It is a demanding call, but one that Presbyterians at all levels of the church are seeking to follow. The Peace & Global Witness Offering supports the holistic and wide-ranging witness of the whole church. At the national level, this witness means supporting those working to heal the divisions in violent contexts like South Sudan. It means bringing leaders together who have made a profound witness for peace around the world and deploying them to congregations like yours. It means creating materials that equip congregations to deal with important issues—from disagreements between members of session to bullying at schools to gun violence in our communities. And it means using our seat at the United Nations table to speak up for the vulnerable around the world. This Offering strengthens the collaboration of the Peacemaking Program and the Presbyterian Ministry at the United Nations with the peace work of global partners through World Mission.

Yet the Offering is as much about your local congregation living out a commitment to peacemaking and as it is proclaiming Christ's peace. Twenty-five percent of the Offering stays in your congregation and 25% is retained by your mid council, enabling you the freedom to provide support where you need it the most. It has meant two pastors in Texas starting an organization that seeks civility in political discourse. It has meant supporting the work of a mission co-worker in finding reconciliation in difficult international contexts. It has meant scholarships for students recognized as peacemakers, resettlement of refugees, and support for shelters where those who are abused may find refuge. This Offering sustains our witness in many forms and at all levels of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), but all are bound together in Christ. Together they are a living proclamation of the peace we know in Christ, who puts an end to hostility and speaks peace to all, near and far.

Last year, FPC Mesa designated their 25% to go to our mission co-worker, Leslie Vogel with CEDEPCA in Guatemala. In a recent update, Leslie said, “August 7-18, I will be co-facilitating and traveling with a group sponsored by the Presbyterian Program and Environmental Justice/Creation Care Programs of PCUSA...I am very excited about this opportunity to connect work that CEDEPCA does to support and strengthen psychosocial health and resilience to environmentally destructive projects such as gold and silver mines, African Palm (for palm oil), etc...From there I will be accompanying the Rev. Delia Leal, Regional Coordinator for CEDEPCA's Women's Ministry as she travels and speaks via the International Peacemaker Program. Pastor Delia will be speaking about some of the powerful ways in which CEDEPCA and the church in Guatemala are addressing intense forms of violence in the society and particularly against women and girls. I will have the privilege and opportunity to serve as Delia's Spanish-English interpreter during the itineration.” Funds sent to Leslie support these and other peace and global witness programs.
