Discipleship Commission: Annual Report

Sunday Christian Education continues to thrive for all ages: preschool through adult. We have five classes meeting each week on campus. The elementary age classes are meeting together in one room. Adults are always invited to join us each week for a hands-on lesson that is custom written for our program! Jasmine Couillard, Deborah Rosen and Lanai Mills are teaching the preschool through sixth grade students, which meets each week at 10:15 a.m. in Jackson B. This month the children will be exposed to:

February 4 – Faith Basics – the attributes of God February 11 – Valentine's Day February 18 – President's Day February 25 – Lent

Wednesday WRAP continues to meet from 5:00 – 7:00 p.m. in six week blocks during the school year. In May 2017 we closed out our year with a laser tag game put on by the game truck. In September we kicked off our new year with fun changes and additions to our weekly themes. Wednesday WRAP is open to families and individuals of all ages. We have fellowship, music classes, dinner, crafts, games and Bible study. There is an adult Bible study class that meets after dinner. This class would love to have visitors or new members! We are currently studying Ask It by Andy Stanley. Wednesday WRAP is meeting three times this month. Themes will be:



February 7– What I want to be when I grow up February 14 – Jesus Loves Me February 28 – Circus

Grief Share is a support group of those currently grieving the loss of a loved one. Grief Share kicked off their fourth 13 week session of classes this year and they start each week with dinner in Fellowship Hall, joining the rest of the Wednesday WRAP attendees.

The church Nursery continues to be staffed each Sunday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The nursery is located inside the sanctuary (in the quiet room) for the 9:00 a.m. service. (Did you notice the new beautiful sign alerting new families of its location?) This allows flexibility to parents training their young ones to sit in the pew, as well as the opportunity for these children to participate in the children's sermon! The 11:00 service is staffed each week by Tanya Snitzer and Isobel Letizia.



Vacation Bible School 2017 was a bit different than the previous year. We met for five DAYS in June and learned about Jesus in a program called Maker Fun Factory. We had a customized adult program running side by side. We also had the help of the teens escorting the children from center to center and interacting as older siblings would. A handful of our VBS volunteers and children then brought our program on the road to the Tsyei Bidaa Presbyterian congregation on the Indian Reservation in Del Muerto, Arizona. VBS 2018 is already in the planning stages and will be Group's Shipwrecked. Plan now to join us June 11th — 15th from 9:00 a.m. — 12:30 p.m.

Montlure Presbyterian Camp was held at Camp Colton in Flagstaff in summer of 2017. Three youth attended through our church and we were able to sponsor them with \$525 in scholarship funds! Registration for the 2018 camp season is currently underway. Montlure has the dates published for 4th – 12th grade overnight camp in summer 2018. FPC offers a \$200 discount on camp fees for any student that attends as long as a request form is submitted.

Discipleship Commission: Youth Report

2017 was a very active year in the life of the FPC Youth Group under the direction of Anita Ramsey. The Junior and Senior High students grew in faith as they studied the Word of God, served their community, and socialized with friends.

STUDY:

During the spring the youth would gather on Sunday morning and Wednesday evening each week to learn about God's plan for them through the study of His Word. Sunday mornings during the spring semester was spent with curriculum centered around various stories of the Bible. During the summer and fall months the class continued to meet using a curriculum that covered biblical solutions for common problems teenagers encounter. Robert Harding assisted Anita each Sunday morning.

On Wednesday evening, many youth participated in FPC's midweek program, Wednesday WRAP. During the Bible Study portion of the program, Anita led the kids through devotionals, study, and prayer.



SERVICE:

The year also brought many opportunities to serve the church and the community. One of the ways the youth served the church was by presenting the annual youth service. This was held the last Sunday in April. It was a service devoted to the Apostles Creed and what it means. Other forms of church service included serving on the youth cook team for Wednesday WRAP and serving dinner for the Dinner Theater in the spring.

In July, several of the youth participated in the all-church mission trip to Chinle under the direction of Sue Eisenklam. The youth acted as group leaders for the VBS that was being provided for the local church. When they weren't working with VBS, they were busy building relationships with the Native Americans at the church.

The youth participated in the annual Mesa Make a Difference Day and helping other church groups with their projects such as the Annual Parking Lot Sale.



The youth have an ongoing mission to support the organization Feed My Starving Children by packing food and by raising funds to donate. During the Lenten season the youth distributed small plastic tubes and requested that the congregation members keep these on their dining table and each day give thanks for their food and place a quarter in the tube to pay for a meal for a starving child. On Easter Sunday, the members returned their quarter-filled tubes. Over \$700 was raised for the FMSC organization.

SOCIALIZING:

The youth enjoyed many different activities throughout 2017. We went rock climbing, bowling, spent a day at Sunsplash, and hosted game nights, Several of our event evenings have been spent enjoying the amenities of the youth room. We have watched many movies on the projection system, played numerous games of pool, ping pong, air hockey and foosball.

In the fall the parents were called on to plan and host some of the social events for the youth. The families planned frisbee golf, a trip to the Arizona Science Center, a pool party and a Christmas Party. The Holy Rollers bicycling group has continued this year when the weather has permitted. The group includes the general congregation and is one of our multi-generational activities.



2017 has been a good year for the youth group. We continue to experience God's grace and blessings as we study, serve and socialize here at FPC.

Discipleship Commission: Preschool Report


We truly feel blessed with our preschool as we look back at what 2017 has given us! We started out 2017 in the preparation phase for our Quality First Assessment Cycle at the Preschool. We are thrilled to announce our results earning the 4-Star Rating and Distinction, which is an increase in quality from our last assessment in 2014! Congratulations to all of our teachers and the overall program for earning such high distinction in the Early Childhood community and the State of Arizona!

BUILDING A BETTER FUTURE SINCE 1986 farewell to Rachelle Schuster who had been with us since 2012. She went on to full time employment that suited her

family's needs at the time. We will miss her! We would like to introduce our newest staff member, Sara Wheat. She comes to us highly qualified in infant/toddler and special needs experience. She has worked in the early childhood field for ten years and has joined Debbie Warneke in the 3-year-old classroom. They make a great team!

In the fall of 2017, we started a professional development plan that focuses on utilizing the unique skills of each teacher by pairing them with another teacher for mentoring and support. Some of the things that we focused on were classroom management, routines, lesson planning, transitions, curriculum development and powerful interactions with the children. This has proven to be a huge success, and we have seen each one of our teachers share their expertise with each other. We will be continuing this practice over the

2018 year as we prepare, once again, for the Quality First Assessment in the spring of 2019.



At the end of the school year in May 2017, there were 31 kids enrolled. For the second year our program

kept its hours from 9:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m. At the start of the 2016-2017 school year in August, we only had 18 children enrolled. Within the first two weeks of school, enrollment jumped to 29 children! As of the end of December 2017, there are 31 kids enrolled. We are working with the Preschool Board to devise a plan for the next school year to consider what the needs truly are for our program and families.

Our funding from the Quality First Grant was increased for the 2016-17 school year! We were previously allotted eight full-time slots. Then, that was increased to 11 full-time scholarships which can serve up to 22 children. This is great news! However, we have had the hardest time filling all of those scholarships with families who qualify and who maintain the attendance requirement. As of the end of December, we still have availability for 2 more



children to attend on the scholarship. If we do not fill all of the spots, we run the risk of the state taking

away the unused scholarships and giving them to other programs who can use them.

In the fall our staff and program participated in a national research project for the US Department of Health & Human Services Assessing the Implementation and Cost of High Quality Early Care and Education. Only 36 centers nation-wide were chosen for the study. We feel honored to be a part of such important work. We also were invited to showcase a collaborative art project from both classrooms at the Herberger Theater in



downtown Phoenix in the spring. These pieces of art are now part of a touring art exhibit for the First Things First Early Childhood Education community outreach at the Department of Education.

There have been a few physical changes around the preschool as well. We are pleased to announce the purchase and use of brand new child-sized tables and chairs for our 3-year-old classroom. You may have



noticed a few subtle changes on our playground, too. Did you notice the colorful chalkboard flowers or the garden boxes around our yard? We were able to purchase these things through the use of the Quality First Incentive funds as part of our participation in the Quality First program. It is a refreshing feeling to see the improvements and know that our children and families will be able to enjoy the benefits of that for a long time!

This year we welcomed our new pastor, Rev. Ann Conklin in the summer of 2017 and have been enjoying her spirit during our chapel time with the families. We love the creativity that Pastor Ann brings to the children during each sermon! She encourages the children to grow in their faith and love of God. Dr. Mark Ramsey is also a huge blessing because he shares his great musical talents with us and the kids really enjoy it! Our attendance by the parents has slightly increased this year, and we have enjoyed having those parents stay with us during that time. The energy that we foster with these children is unmeasurable! We would like to see many more families join us as we worship each week, but sometimes the needs of the parents at drop-off time differ from the experiences that we offer to them. Here's to next year's parents and welcoming them to our weekly chapel time!

As we look forward to 2018, we are hopeful that the Lord will continue to bless us by bringing the children of this community to our program. We know that God has good things in store for all of us. We know that He is present in all that we do here, especially in the hearts of these little children!

Lastly, we appreciate all of your love and your willingness to continue to make the Preschool a ministry of the church. We are very blessed and know that God has so much in store for these children, families and the staff that work with them.

Mission Commission: Annual Report Submitted by: Sue Eisenklam, Mission Chair

Marketing (formerly known as Evangelism)

We continue to maximize our online presence. The congregation has been encouraged to "check in" on Facebook Status. This is one more way that we continue to increase our Facebook presence as a way of getting the word out about FPC. We conducted another campaign to invite neighbors to the church. In October, three local apartment buildings distributed postcards of upcoming events. One of the events was to invite them to participate in a neighborhood yard sale event by signing up for a table to sell their stuff as well as shop the event. FPC mission commission had several tables of donations from the congregation to sell to raise money for the 2018 Mission Trip. Presbyterian Women also joined the event with their annual bake sale. \$439.90 was raised for the Mission Trip. PW also did well. While the event was successful in fund raising and interacting with neighbors who shopped, no one from the neighborhood had a table set up to sell their stuff.

Mission Trip

In June seventeen youth and adults (6 youth, 11 adults) went to the Tseyi Bidaa Presbyterian Church in Del Muerto, Arizona. With the main objective of the trip to build relationships among ourselves and with out mission partners, the mornings working together to prepare for afternoon VBS, as well as to have different cultural experiences. The afternoons were very busy with between 22 and 32 children each of the four days! We finished our time with a community dinner. When we left this year, it felt like we were leaving family. We have been invited back in 2018, and they are hoping to grow the numbers of children up to 50. That means we will need more FPC participants!



Assimilation

There was one new member class in January of 2017. There were five new members as a result.

Seasonal Ministry

Angel Tree: We sponsored three families this year. One family was from the Preschool. One family was from the FPC neighborhood. One family was from the FPC Congregation. As is our tradition, we provided gifs to each of the family members, as well as a holiday meal, other food stuffs and an assortment of household and personal items.



Mesa Make A Difference Day

On October 28th, a team of 11 FPC volunteers painted house numbers on curbs as part of the city-wide Make A Difference Day.

Mesa Presbyterian Ministries

Mesa Presbyterian Ministries (MPM) had a busy year in 2017. We receive as many as 70 calls a week for rental assistance while funds are available. 174 people received assistance. 136 received rental assistance and 38 received utility assistance.

I Help

For the year 2017, our many awesome volunteers at FPC have hosted 20-25 women three Sundays per month. This includes dinner, showers, a safe place to sleep, movies, sack lunch for the next day and a full breakfast on Monday mornings...and they are all so grateful. Janet Verch, the program coordinator, attends the church sponsor meetings every other month (with Lutheran Social Services). She learns what works and what doesn't and re-

ceives suggestions on how we can improve the program. In the January meeting, she learned from the women's caseworker that five clients obtained permanent housing in December alone! Thank you to our congregations and all the I-Help volunteers for all your support for this program. Thank you, Janet, for coordinating it all. We truly make a difference right in our own back yard.

From Robert Sanders, Regional Director of Lutheran Social Services we learned the following information about 2016-2017: There were 231 first time women at I Help. Forty I Help women obtained permanent housing. Sixty seven women found employment. Overall, with all the churches involved, the women received 7,777 shelter nights. Wow! We are certainly part of a bigger picture!

Deacon's Food Cupboard



The Food Cupboard continues to have a high demand, with approximately 65 bags given out each week. Since we were only closed three weeks this year, we distributed 49 weeks for a total of 3,185 bags in 2017. We served 9,605 people in 2,161 households. The value of each bag is \$32.00 x 3,185 bags equals a value of \$101,920. The dollar value from the United Food Bank was \$43,000. The dollar amount from FPC congregation and Sagewood donations was \$44,000. Contributions totaled \$87,000. We are always thankful to be blessed with wonderful workers who bag the groceries and who give them out. We have strong workers who unload many pounds of heavy boxes to help keep the pantry stocked. Our church can be very

proud of our ministry in feeding the needy. Thank you, Sandy Clark for all you do to coordinate all these efforts, a huge job!

Mesa Adult Literacy (formerly known as Laubach Literacy)

This past year Mesa Adult Literacy had 55 active volunteer instructors/tutors. There were 1,310.5 hours of instruction. Tutors and support staff spent another 2,207 hours in preparation, training, travel, meetings, etc. There were 64 active students. 56 students received one-to-one instructions. Eight participated in small group instruction. There were 13 students on the waiting list. Many students met goals. Five students got a better job; 10 advanced levels in curriculum series; 1 obtained citizenship; 1 registered to vote/voted for the first time; 1 obtained a driver's license; 41 increased involvement in community activities; and 12 increased involvement in children's educational activities.

One Great Hour of Sharing: 2016 giving was \$3,040. 2017 giving was \$3,107

Pentecost offering: 2016 giving was \$2,466 with \$990 of that SPECIAL OFFERINGS going toward 2016 FPC Mission Trip. 2017 giving was \$2,233 with \$893.20 going toward the 2017 FPC Mission Trip.



Global Peace and Witness Offering: 2016 giving was \$1,594 with \$398 going to the work of Leslie Vogel, FPC Mission Co-worker. 2017 giving was \$1,227 with \$386.75 going to work of Leslie Vogel.

Christmas Joy Offering: 2016 giving was \$3,508.02. 2017 giving was \$2,711.

Property

After the Sanctuary roof was replaced, the church experienced quiet necessary maintenance and minimal projects, like any other home. Our church encountered the usual catching up by correcting deferred preservation items from the previous year and only day to day repairs, such as carpet cleaning, pest control, door repairs, landscaping, and toilet issues.

We did have to address a few unexpected air conditioning problems, such as replacing the Fox Chapel Air Conditioning unit at a cost of \$4,865.00 and the A/C motor for Head Start at \$475.00. Property also made some improvements regarding our church campus lighting.

We replaced the parking lamps with LED lighting, in-

stalled three standing light poles from the Southside of the

Sanctuary to the office, and a light that shines from the top of the entrance to our sanctuary into the east parking area for more security. The steeple lighting has been an on-going issue, but I believe that problem will be rectified in the very near future.

In addition, our church's Columbarium has gone through a beautiful restoration with new lighting fixtures, a re-planted garden, re-painted fencing, and a new gate lock. These improvements have ensured our memorial the proper and respectful dignity it deserves.

Next year, we are looking at improving our campus and street signage, emergency preparedness, and continued up-keep on our church families' home, our House of God. I would also like to recognize the work, and dedication, of our brother Allan Schultz to our church, who for the last three years, as Property Elder, did so much to improve and main-



tain this campus.

Session Linda Hayball

During 2017, session met in ten Stated Meetings and one Called Meeting. In addition to the Annual Congregational Meeting in February, there were two Called Congregational Meetings. One in March was to approve the call to Reverend Ann Conklin. In November, we approved her 2018 call. We met with the Deacons and church staff for our Annual Retreat in September. Three new members were added to the Active Roll and 16 members were transferred or removed. Membership as of December 31, 2017 is 279.

Endowment

The members of the Endowment Committee are Jack Gunter, David Frederick, Brent Gregory, Renita Jurgensen, Ron Peyton, and Skeets Throckmorton, with Bob Gerlach, stewardship elder, serving as an ex-officio member. The committee met three times during 2017 and approved the following actions:

Continued oversight of the investments for the Endowment Funds including the Kissinger, Mehlhop,
 Stubblefield, and Montlure funds with a total value of \$132,412.06 as of December 31, 2017. In addition,

the General Endowment value was \$109,956.00 and the Capital Endowment was \$18,768.12. The end-of-year value of the Worship Arts fund was \$16,047.19, the Organ Maintenance fund was \$5,234.44, and the Columbarium fund was 22,515,19.

- Received contributions of \$2.847.34 for the General Endowment and \$1,000.00 for Montlure camp scholarships.
- Dispersed \$525 of the Montlure fund for camp scholarships. Used \$600 from the Kissinger fund for the Grief Share class. Contributed \$42,000 toward the new roof for the sanctuary. Allocated \$18,041 to refurbish the pipe organ. Spent \$5,500 on improvements to the prayer garden.
- Used the Endowment brochure and Minute for Mission to convey to the congregation the need for future contributions to the endowment funds.



Personnel Jeanne Partida

The Personnel Committee consists of Personnel Elder. Jeanne Partida. Personnel Deacon. Susan McMichael, Brent Gregory, Renita Jurgensen and Marcy Snitzer. The committee has hired Bryan Hickey as the set up custodian for Sunday mornings and Wednesday WRAP. We hired Rob Kjar for the position of bookkeeper. Anita Ramsey has given notice that she will be stepping down as Youth Director no later than May of 2018. We are actively looking for her replacement. We have developed a new Child Protection and Sexual Misconduct Policy and Procedures. This policy was approved at the November 2017 Session meeting. We are in the process of developing a new Code of Conduct and Ministry Standards. All three of these documents are to be reviewed annually as required by Grand Canyon Presbytery.

Barbara Walker Nominating

Our committee is composed of Michael Gerlach, Renita Jurgensen, Chuck Michel, Steve Post (Nominating Deacon), Helen Thielke, Janet Verch, and Chairperson, Elder Barbara Walker. In June, Janet Verch's term will expire and Anita Ramsey will be the new committee member. Michael will stay on for another three year term. Our responsibility is to fill all the elder and deacon positions, plus nominating committee positions. They are for a three year term with the ability to serve a second three year term. When there is a resignation, it is our responsibility to fill the unexpired term. At this time we have filled all positions except the new designated Moderator of the Deacons. We always appreciate the prayers of the congregation as we work year round to fill positions. We will present a new slate at the February congregation meeting.

Thanks Be To God: A lot of great accomplishments in 2017. First and foremost we called our new Pastor, Reverend Ann Conklin, who arrived from Grand Rapids, Michigan, in June. We want to thank the Pastor Nominating Committee

for all their hard work and dedication.

The Contractor completed the new Steel Roof on our Sanctuary in April. In the process, the existing asbestos roof was removed, finding the underlying wood was in excellent condition after fifty four years, requiring no repair work. Last but not least, the cost was \$155,196.18, way below the original estimate of \$250,000.

As far as Stewardship is concerned we closed the year with a surplus of \$16,930, the first in many years.

Mesa Presbyterian Ministries added Brent Gregory to the Staff and are in the process of adding new members to the Board. We look forward to 2018 with renewed Faith.
