Over the years Richie created many new programs for Club Med. While enjoying dancing, Luce and Richie found that their friends would like a Club Med adventure



S.O.S. Fall Migration 2007 First in a Series

Some twenty-seven years ago, before North Myrtle Beach became a "place to be", an event occurred that would change the lazy ocean resort both for the *bad* and the *good* for the decades that followed. The event was Hurricane David. Arriving in September of 1979, Hurricane David was one of those storms that many people misjudged and for those many who did they never were able to realize their mistake until they were consumed by the storm. Many of those who attended hurricane parties along the coastal strips were never found. Whole building foundations laid bare of their structures after being swept away by the fury of the ocean and the driving winds. That by all measures was the *bad*.

Along some areas of the coast, pockets of people endured the storm though were cut off from the mainland by the surrounding waters that had not yet retreated to the ocean or the Intracoastal Waterway that acted as a barrier in everyday life and everyday weather. Bridges that connected the coastal strips to the mainland were not passable or knocked out altogether. They were left stranded. Until rescue could be put in motion, supplies had to be provided for a time to sustain the survivors. Through all of the death and devastation that they had witnessed and experienced many of the survivors would count their blessings, collect themselves and go back to the task of living their daily lives back in Anytown, USA, wanting to put their ordeal behind them and hoping never to be reminded of the tragedy.

Though many who were there would leave with no thoughts of returning to the area, at least not anytime soon, some found that they had formed a bond with others that shared the same piece of history, at the same time and at the same place. This they wanted to remember. As horrible as the experience had been, there was a reason to share thanks. It is said that one such person, Gene (Swink) Laughter, issued an invitation to those who had survived the ordeal, the beach residents, shop owners, life guards and even the beach drifters, to return to the beach strip along Ocean Drive in North Myrtle Beach for a reunion. The call to gather was expected to reach many of the hundreds of locals that were left to rebuild their lives but it was never expected that several thousand people would respond ranging from neighbors down the street to large numbers of those who felt the bond and lived as far away as Anytown, USA. This would become the *good*.

Over the years the survivors returned to Ocean Drive to celebrate and share the reason to party. In time they would become known as the Stranders, those that had been stranded waiting for rescue. To identify them-




selves they banded together to become the Society Of Stranders, S.O.S. The Society still exists today, though their numbers have grown far beyond the original Stranders. As the word got out, hundreds and thousands of friends of friends began to be drawn to the activities and the party grew and grew and the sum of it all became known as S.O.S.

As the numbers grew, the need to entertain the masses grew. The area of North Myrtle Beach and Myrtle Beach in general have become famous for the quantity and quality of golf that is available to existing residents, new retiring residents, visitors and certainly, the resident and visiting Stranders. But, not everyone plays golf so what becomes of the nongolfers? They have become dancers. With dancers comes the need to have a place, or places, where they can dance. What a concept! Who was it that said "If you build it, they will come!?" No really, who said that? So a number of clubs came to be and the dancers came and danced and danced and danced and...yada yada yada. After a time S.O.S. became too big to be just a once-a-year party The party became so popular that it expanded over the course of a year to where a party arrived with the change of the seasons except for summer when the masses of golfers and beach goers roam and rule. The events and dates are...Mid-Winter Migration, January 17-20, 2008; Spring Safari, April 18-27, 2008 and Fall Migration, September 12-21, 2008.

Christopher Hemmer is almost back in dance form! He attended the SFSDS November dance and it was great to see him.


