



There will also be a free Beginner WCS lesson upstairs for our new people each dance. This will probably always be WCS but may vary as well.





S.O.S. Fall Migration 2007 Third in a Series

If you haven't been following along in the series you're probably wondering what's this article that refers to something that took place last year and what does it have to do with now. The second article of the series closed in stating the next article, being this article, would deal with the clubs that play an important part in the success of S.O.S. See the first and second articles on S.O.S. to get caught up.

The dance clubs that cater to the series of major dance events, in this case the events of S.O.S. in North Myrtle Beach, S.C., as a group are for the most part the life of the party. S.O.S. is not a single event but a series of events. The events follow the seasons of the year, Fall, Winter and Spring. There is no event held currently in the summer which is probably a good thing. I say that because after experiencing the S.O.S. Fall Migration 2007, hence the name of this series, I can easily understand how it could be hazardous to one's health. I don't know if N. Myrtle Beach could supply enough drinking water to replenish the amount of dance perspiration lost on a daily basis during a two-week dance-a-thon in the hot Carolina summer. I lost about five pounds several times during a week of dancing. The only problem of that is that it all came back.

The two dance clubs, and the most famous, that I think are the staples in N. Myrtle Beach are Ducks and Fat Harold's. Others such as the OD (Ocean Drive) Beach Club, OD Café, OD Ballroom, Spanish Galleon and Pirates Cove round out the list of hosts for the thousands of dancers that pass through their doors. At times all of them combined seem to be inadequate to handle all those happy feet. The dance floors are not the biggest and some as small as half of the size of Goldcoast Ballroom, have dancers dancing elbow to elbow. All of the clubs mentioned are a strong arm's stone throw from each other which makes it easy to bounce back and forth depending on where the favorite DJ is playing. As crowded as it gets everyone seems to accept it and enjoy themselves. The only other choice perhaps is to walk the beach. On second thought the beach could be a tripping hazard, especially after dark. Not everybody dances all night.

This article should arrive in the next issue of the Swing Time Newsletter in time for preparation of the next S.O.S. event which is Spring Safari being held

April 18-27, 2008. By the time you read this if you haven't made reservations for rooms you may find it hard to find one without having to drive back and forth from an adjoining state into N. Myrtle Beach. If this is too short of a




notice, think ahead for S.O.S. Fall Migration 2008, if you're interested. In either case, you should start preparing yourself for the event by practicing your dance routine in the shower, partner optional, because that's about as much space as you'll get at S.O.S. You must also become proficient in defensive dancer training. This can be done by a few practices of your routine in the middle of I-95.

If and when you go to a S.O.S. event, it is best to go in a group. Aside from the obvious benefits of sharing expenses, possibly sharing the driving duties if you drive, or the ordering of drinks if you fly, it is easier to set up a tag team system of staking out an empty table at one of the clubs. If you're first in line when the club opens on any given day, stake your claim to a table and don't leave it unattended unless you are leaving to return home or you get swept out for the closing of the evening. Once you have made an unattested claim to a table maintain custody of the table by rotating members of your group to and from the table from dawn to the time you crash. And crash you will. The only accessories I recommend you take with you to go dancing is a good 30-day deodorant and a heavy-duty chain with pad lock to secure the chair next to you when your friend gets up to dance or go to the potty. Guns must be checked at the door. If you forget the deodorant you wouldn't need a gun anyway. If the chain would be too much of a hassle, go to Spencer's Gifts and buy some rubber dog poop and place on the chairs. It may deter someone from taking the chair but only until he or she figures out that the odor is not the poop.


The next and final article will provide a perspective to my first impression of S.O.S. and the Shag dance community. Until then...Y'all dance on!






