The Ontario Command Service Officers and staff pride themselves on the fact that once receiving the required info on a homeless Veteran they can have that Veteran placed in either a temporary or permanent shelter within 72 hours, which I think is quite remarkable. This 72 hour window is very important for the fact that they have found that in a lot of cases, they will lose contact with that Veteran if it takes over 72 hours to respond. Hopefully with more contacts available this will produce fewer failures.

At our last SEO/LA Meeting, Comrade Lynn was tasked, or should I say there were suggested, many different ideas and topics for training and workshops. Already suggested were sessions on Branch Inspections and Branch Regulations. We need to improve our communication with each other, yes, at all levels. We all tend to slip up once in a while we just need

to keep it to a minimum. While on this subject, I would



like to thank Comrade Roy Eaton for taking the time to put these very useful newsletters together which certainly help with the communication part of our work. Thank you Roy.

In closing, Trish and I would like to wish everyone in Ontario Command, and beyond, a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and certainly all the best for 2023, and let's keep, "**Working Together**".

I would like to give you a small update on a few very important programs that I am sure are of the greatest interest to Veterans and all Legion members. Before I get into that however I would like to thank the many volunteers at Branches, Zones, Districts, our Ladies Auxiliaries - and of course many, many thanks to our fantastic staff at Provincial HQ and locations around the province, for helping with this important work! Without all of you, our work just could not continue. Thank you again!



Leave The Streets Behind

The Mission Statement of the Leave the Streets Behind program is to *ensure that every Veteran who is homeless or near homeless finds the help they need to leave the streets behind.*

Through the generosity of our Legion Branches and Ladies Auxiliaries, throughout our Command, money has been raised through various events to support the Homeless Veterans Program. To date, approximately 3 million dollars has been dispersed from the Ontario Command Homeless Veterans Fund and over 100,000 dollars from our Ladies Auxiliary. There has been no financial support from any level of government. More than 1056 Homeless Veterans have been identified, in 190 communities of which 119 are female Veterans since the beginning of the program. (Note figures shown are as of 01 December 2022).

Property Committee

At the PEC meeting in November, a motion to amend the amount requiring approval for renovation from \$10,000 to \$25,000 was approved. This was felt necessary for several reasons but mostly because of inflation and the need to keep the workload of the committee to a reasonable level.

I would like to note that Property Committee issues are governed in Ontario by the Legion Act and federally by the Act to Incorporate. Ontario Command Officer's Manual page A45 to A52 has the policies and procedures.



Please become familiar with this section of our manual. I would also like to thank everyone for the get well wishes and the wonderful words of encouragement to me during my recent health issues. You cannot know how much this means to me during this difficult time.

On behalf of Linda and myself, I want to take this opportunity to wish everyone a Happy Holiday Season. We are hoping 2023 will be a great year for The Royal Canadian Legion, all its members and our many wonderful friends!

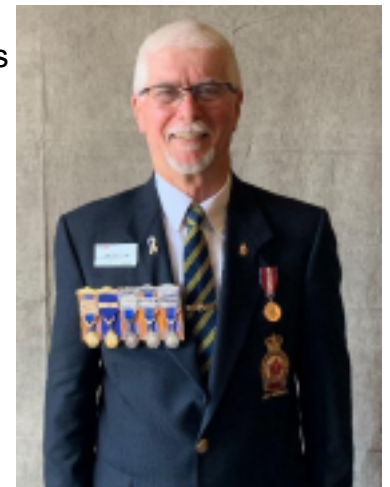

I am excited to announce that the Provincial Public Speaking will be happening on May 6, 2023 at Br. 459 Stouffville.

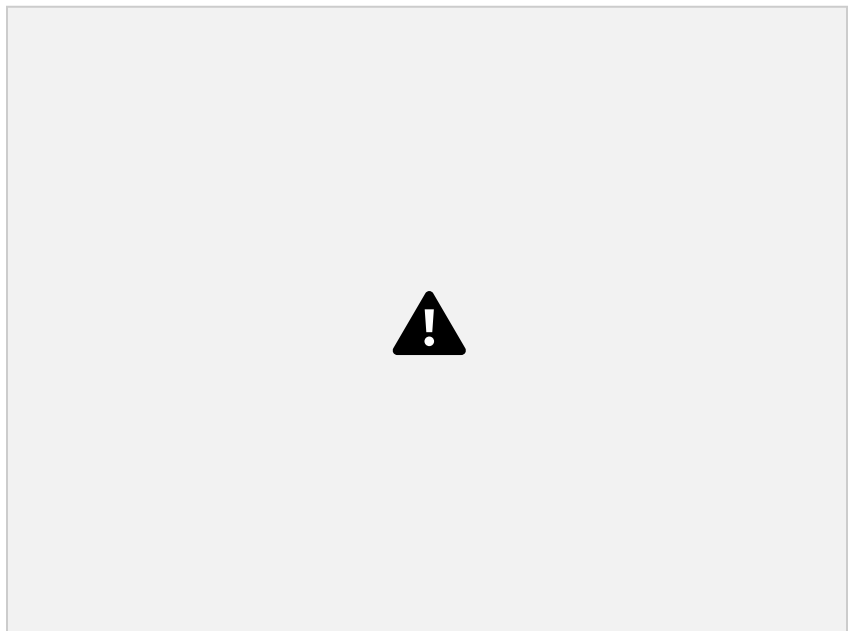

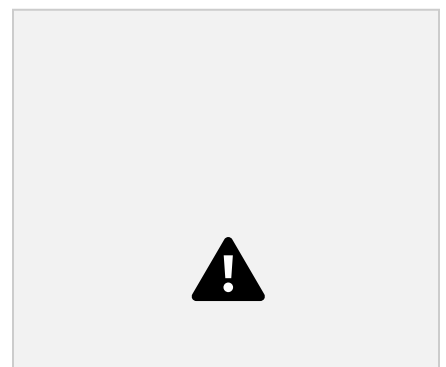

2022 has been an exceptional year for The Royal Canadian Legion and myself and my family personally. Finishing my term as District A Commander brought a sense of relief that our branches were able to make



it through the pandemic with only a few bumps and bruises. With the hard work of members and volunteers, our branches were able to come through the rough times with a renewed sense of purpose and the realization that life within the Legion has changed and must continue to adapt in order to reach our full potential as the most important Veterans Organization in Canada.

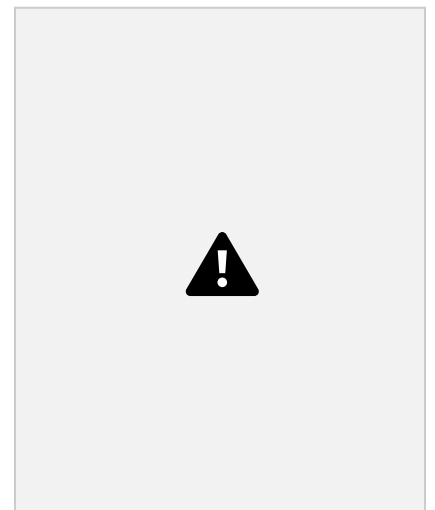

Ontario Command continues to work to ensure our officers and staff have the financial resources to complete their various duties.

This term we will focus on changes to the processes we use to produce our annual budgets and to reduce costs. As an example, budget 2023-24 will be completed and tabled at the March 2023 PAC for approval, rather than beginning in July 2023 with approval at the August 2023 PAC. This will mean that for the first time in many years the budget will be approved before we start the term. We will also be adding a projected budget for the 2024-2025 term. Hopefully, these changes will help to streamline the command budgeting process and save important staff time.



We are also pursuing other cost saving initiatives with several external service providers in a further effort to reduce costs. I am pleased to relay that there will be no per capita increase for 2023. 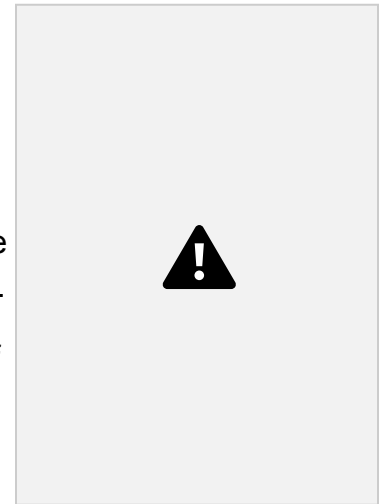

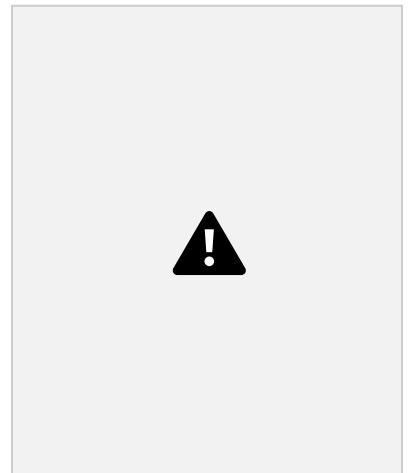
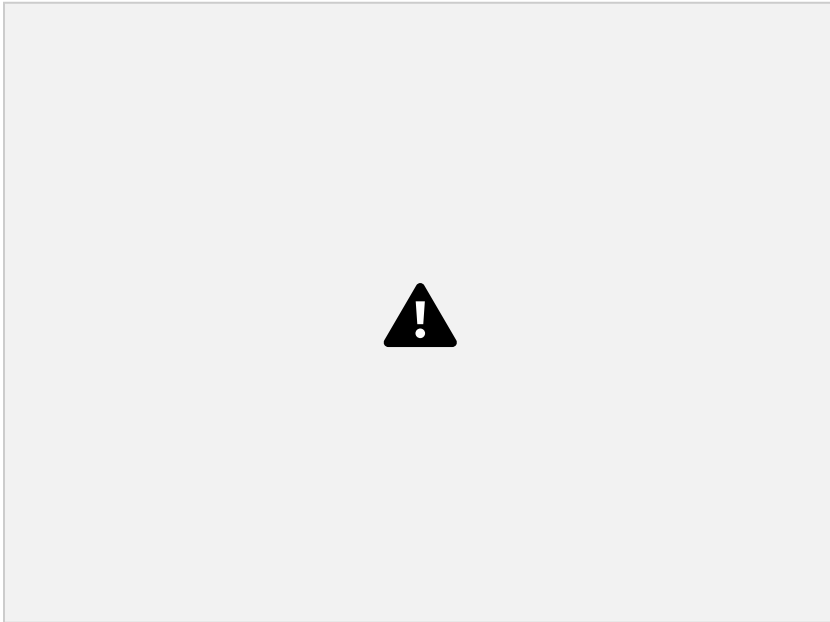

Marg Emery, President, of The Royal Canadian Legion Ontario Command Branches and Ladies’ Auxiliaries Charitable Foundation

First, my thanks to Comrade President Derek Moore for re-appointing me to this position. It is an honour to be a part of the Charitable Foundation and serve with our dedicated committee members both Legionnaires and Ladies Auxiliary.

The following programs fall under the financial umbrella of the Charitable

Foundation so the Legion can issue tax receipts. The Veterans Comfort Fund received total donations of \$124,125.00, donations for VCF were up 11.4% from last year. (JSF) - the Joe Sweeney Fund (Leave the Streets Behind) received total donations of \$75,345.65, donations for the JSF Fund were up 5.2% from last year. (SDP) - The Service Dogs Program received total donations of \$3,071.25 from the public. Donations from Legion levels for the SDP go to the Provincial Poppy Fund to be kept there until needed which is why this figure seems low.



I never cease to be amazed by the fact that CF and Bursary puts \$1 million into the economy in Ontario annually. Add to that the programs mentioned above, as well as others, means **the Legion and its Ladies Auxiliary put \$3 million dollars into the economy of Ontario every year.** That is absolutely amazing!

Just recently I was invited to be the guest speaker at the Ladies Auxiliary 59th Biennial Provincial Convention in Kingston. This was my first L.A. Provincial Convention and it was so exciting to learn so much more about the LA. I am happy to say it was a great experience for all of us. I was thrilled to have the opportunity to explain the workings of the Charitable Foundation. Special thanks to the Provincial Command Ladies for the \$10,000 cheque and the many Ladies Auxiliaries of the Ontario branches for another \$10,000 making the total donations from the Convention of \$20,000. Thank you Ladies!

By the way, I have heard the comment “don’t” donate to the CF, it has too much money; actually I have heard it from my own District so I need to do better. Yes there is a considerable amount of funds in the bank account but that money is there in perpetuity so the program will always be there for those who come after us. That is how it was set up. You see we take all the donations we receive each year plus the interest earned and any grants approved but not awarded then minus the expenses and that is what we have to donate for that year. So if you withhold donations it will affect our program immediately that year. So please do not let anyone tell you we have lots of money so you should not donate. Those persons do not know all the facts and I would be happy to talk with you anytime.

We have updated our by-laws and documents to ensure we are gender neutral. This was an item from last year’s Committee of the Whole meeting and was confirmed that last night on the Friday night of PEC weekend. The Committee considered 91 applications and **approved \$621,302.00 in grants.** We are looking at the possibility of accepting on line applications within the next two years.

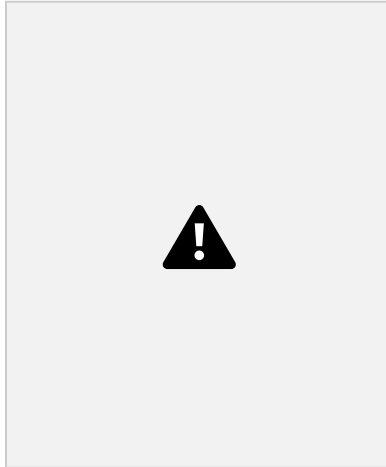

Hopefully now that our annual Poppy Campaign and Remembrance Day activities are completed, branches will place more attention in doing what they can to recruit Veteran submissions for our important Remembrance program. Branch Veteran Service Officers and PRO's can also be a big help with accomplishing this.

Our program should also be talked about and promoted at branch general meetings and all branch functions. As mentioned, we just recently distributed our Volume #9 book to all branches. This is a great tool to use in promoting our program with the membership and especially with Veterans and family members of Veterans. Many communities also had Veteran Banners lining their streets during our Remembrance period. Another great source for having these Veterans included in our books.

Comrades, we should be doing what we can to make our Volume #10 a special edition and ask for everyone's assistance and cooperation in doing what they can to make this happen. All Veterans deserve to be recognized and with the number that we have in the Province of Ontario, we have a long way to go before we have included them all in our special books of Remembrance.



Keep in mind Comrades that through our publisher, we have raised a lot of money for our Command through this program. And these funds are being utilized to give back to our Veterans through various Veteran transition programs that we at Ontario Command support.

In his acceptance speech at our Provincial Convention held in North Bay, our Provincial President stated that he would be using the theme **Working Together** for his term of office. By doing so with our MSRB Program, I am sure that we will be successful.

Financially, our program has been most successful over the past nine years thanks to the efforts of our publisher, Fenety Marketing. As of the end of October, we had received a total net income in the amount of \$1,701,214.38. Our total expenses during this time amount to \$446,73.58 which includes \$267,620.00 donated to 9 various Veteran Transition programs that we at Ontario Command support. Through these donations, it has assisted us in fulfilling our mandate of funding such Veteran programs.

The success of our program is also dependent on each branch having a Branch MSRB Coordinator who is continually promoting our program and actively involved in recruiting Veteran submissions. What has been somewhat disappointing is to see that there are still several of our branches who have not submitted as much as one Veteran submission over this nine-year period. I put out the challenge to any branch that has yet to submit any Veteran submission to recruit submissions and have them submitted for publication in our Volume #10 book. Of course, we also ask that all branches do the same. And please do not hold onto submissions until the last minute. Please submit them to your Provincial Coordinator as soon as you have received them.

A memorandum had been sent out to all branches recently regarding the change in format of our books on our provincial website. The change is for us to go to a new “flip book” format. This makes for a much easier read in being able to flip through the pages rather than scrolling up and down to read the pages in a PDF format. I am happy to report that all of our volumes have now been converted to the ‘flip book’ format on our command website. To view our books in this new flip book format, just click onto our website at www.on.legion.ca and on the left-hand side under Remembrance, click on Military Service Recognition Book and follow the prompts.

I do want to thank all of you who have been involved in our program to date to make it the success that it has been. Your support and dedication is truly appreciated. I ask that you continue to promote the program through a concentrated effort during year #10 of our program.

Sharon McKeown, Seniors/LTC Chair

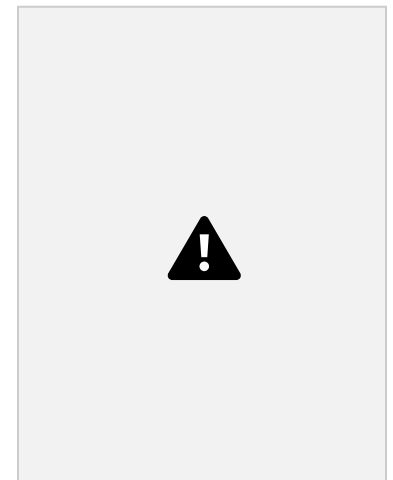
Comrades All,

There is a wealth of easily accessible information on everything pertaining to Seniors available free of charge to anyone interested, simply by striking a key! That said, a word of caution to all, there are those eager to 'steal' our dollars. Check out seminars on cyber security, a common and growing problem.

Seniors today are healthier and better informed, with more time and disposable income than generations past, though we may joke a dollar saved is a government oversight! Seniors comprise the greatest percentage of our membership and are too vital to our organization to lose them for lack of attention.

We introduced the **Seniors' Literary Competition** in 2019. This is an activity without expense for those Seniors not interested in sports. The program starts at branch, with competition at zone, then district levels. It is not a 'Provincial' Program. Last year, District E took over the program from Branch 270, which grew from 20 to over 100 submissions, with entries from across the country and beyond, during a pandemic and with minimal promotion! It can work. The program saved the sanity of several Seniors in the cottage country community of Coldwater, during the isolation of Covid. There are Seniors and aging Veterans in every community with a story to tell and need mental stimulation. Adding a category for art and photography, as suggested by a couple of Veterans, is on the agenda.

Please contact me with any ideas for programs/activities to attract more Seniors into our ranks. Our goal nationally is to achieve a membership of 300,000 by 2026. It is within reach! Just as we reach out



to Veterans, reach out to this largest segment of our population, who generally, have the time to volunteer, the experience to offer, and money to spend!

In the words of Jonathan Swift, there comes a time when “everything old is new again”, age can be an excuse and a stigma, let’s rejuvenate our Seniors, bring them into the fold and find a way to keep them.

A brief in the past Long-Term Care concentrated on issues facing our aging Veterans. Today, long term care, its availability and necessity concerns all. We know long term care for the general population is in high demand and short supply. Anyone not aware of the situation is ignoring it! We are in a health care crisis in Ontario, not getting better fast! It was a given that baby boomers would grow into Seniors, going from Pampers to Depends, over their lifetime. Who was going to look after all these ‘old’ people?

The lack of planning for this natural evolution concerns each of us, one way or another going forward.

The pandemic revealed the catastrophic shortcomings of our LTC institutions. The lack of government watchdogs, and monitoring practices in long-term care facilities, was realized! The Ontario government responded with \$20 million to the long-term care sector and the launch of a proactive inspection program, with the hiring of 193 inspectors by fall. To date, 58 of 627 homes have been inspected and 104 inspectors hired. Perhaps, too little too late.

New legislation passed in the Fall permitted ‘temporary’ relocation of hospital patients designated for long-term care, into homes not of their choosing. Bill #7, sped through the legislature, without answers to basic questions, such as how long is ‘temporary’? What if a patient refuses? How much is that refusal going to cost? Though temporary is still undefined, we know that as of Nov. 20, patients who don’t consent to a move can be [charged a \\$400 daily fee](#). These new rules are an effort to free up hospital beds for acute care patients and create space for the backlog of surgeries driven by the pandemic.

Appreciating ‘dire straits require desperate measures. This decision directly affects our most vulnerable. It does not take their interests into consideration. Moving elderly people away from family, friends and their community increases the likelihood of isolation and detrimental impacts. Decisions intended to improve, enhance, or better the lives of Ontario Seniors should not be made without our input!

Legionnaires can take pride in the accomplishments of our organization to improving the quality of life for Veterans in general. The wheels of progress turn slowly. Our organization has challenged the government and continues to do so, for defaulting on the promises made to Veterans, for benefits and future care and comfort. Below, is an update on the status of beds at the three designated Veterans Health facilities in Ontario: **Sunnybrook Veterans’ Centre** reports that Veterans Affairs approved an increase in preferred beds from 80 to 100, of which 84 were occupied at that time. Occupancy continues to decline and is currently at 72%. **Parkwood Institute** in London reports an increase to 50 preferred beds a year ago, 40 are occupied, 92 of 141 beds are occupied, by 52 WWII Veterans, 11 Korea Veterans, 13 Peacekeepers and 16 Other Qualified Veterans (OQV). Any Veteran coming to them and needing to be hospitalized is accepted. Ages in contract beds range from 84 to 102, and in

preferred from 62 to 102. **Perley Health** encompasses 3 Veteran units Rideau, Ottawa, and Gatineau. Some Veterans are assigned to rooms in the Gatineau secure wing due to their condition. All Veterans accepted into the facility are or will be housed in the 'Rideau Veterans Residence' unless their conditions dictate a more secure accommodation. To date, 159 beds are available for qualified veterans (WWII and Korea) and other qualified veterans (OQVs, Peacekeepers). There is no wait list for QV. There are 72 OQVs occupying beds with 19 on the waiting list. Perley Health is continuing to negotiate with Veterans Affairs Canada and the Government for an additional 70 beds to accommodate more OQVs and veterans. Perley Health is also responsible for Seniors Village, a LTC which has agreed to accommodate, although not mandated, 25-28% Veterans and their spouses who qualify for LTC. A program managed by the City of Ottawa Long Term Care department. I thank Comrade Aubrey Callan for the info update on Perley Health.

In closing, from my family to yours, Merry Christmas, and Happy New Year, travel safe, stay well, keep smiling, and living the dream.

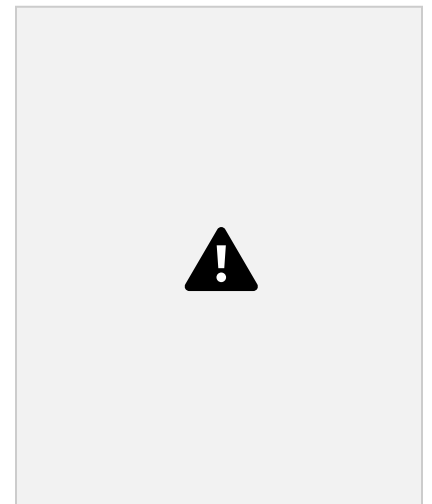
National Championships Sherbrook Aug 2022

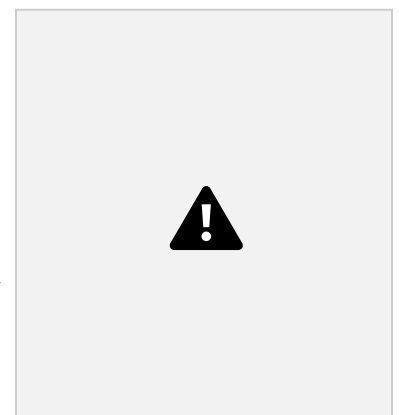

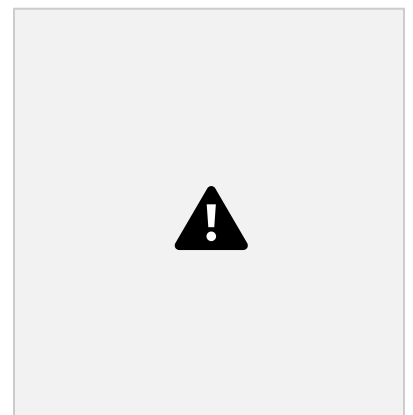

On behalf of my wife Sue and I, we wish you a Merry Christmas and a Healthy and Prosperous new year.

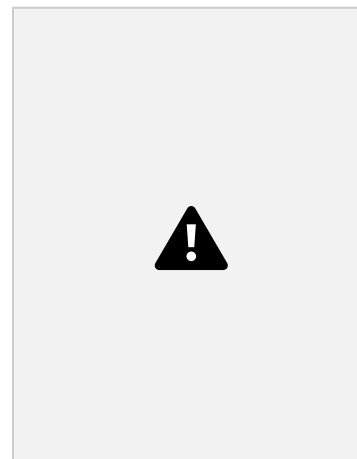
