KIDS' NONVIOLENT PROTEST AGAINST RACISM

Saturday, June 13, 9:00 a.m.

Please note this is not a festival, carnival or other entertainment activity. There will not be fun activities for kids. It is a protest. Additionally, this is NOT a protest that is meant to bash or attack police.



Purpose

This protest was not formed out of a desire to give our kids a civics lesson. It was formed out of the loss of our Black children's innocence. They brought the harsh reality of racism to us and they wanted answers. The question, "Why, mommy...?" rung all too loudly in our ears. Our children are hurt, angry, suffering and wounded, but most of all our children have had enough. Our children deserve and are demanding better. So, our children are making their Stand for Justice. We have dealt with racism, now our children are going to put an end to racism.

Racism in America is systemic and can only be dismantled by active engagement and rejection of it by all generations. As parents, we must show our children that their right to peacefully protest is just one of the many ways required to bring about sustainable change.



GARBAGE


We all live here, so please don't litter. There are Garbage bags at the end of each block on the west side of Drexel.

Racism is prejudice, discrimination, or antagonism directed against someone of a different race based on the belief that one's own race is superior.


An Activist is a person who works to bring about political or social change.
