KGAM Group visit to The Medway Queen – the Heroine of Dunkirk by Andy Wyles

It was the afternoon of Saturday 27th September when we met in the car park of the visitor centre of the Medway Queen Preservation Society. Once we were all present, we made our way into the visitor centre to be greeted by the society's volunteers.

Before the tour, we were given a quick talk about a little of the ship's history, she was launched in 1924 and worked on the River Medway with trips down to Herne Bay until the outbreak of war where she was requisitioned for the Royal Navy and converted to a Minesweeper and also played her part in Operation Dynamo in the May and June of 1940 where she evacuated an estimated 7000 men from the beaches of Normandy. She carried on her minesweeping duties until 1943 when she was replaced with a timber hulled vessel, less likely to attract magnetic mines than The Medway Queen's metal hull. After the war she returned to the River Medway offering tourist trips until she was retired in 1963.



It is thanks to a Heritage Lottery Grant that the Medway Queen is still with us, after her life as a paddle steamer she was sold to three businessmen and towed to the Isle of Wight where she was used as a restaurant and night club until a newer larger vessel was bought to replace her. It was then she returned to the River Medway, but unfortunately dreaded rust has caused unrepairable damage and whilst the Grant was awarded, it was on the understanding that she would be re-hulled but must be built in the traditional method and be riveted. Whilst she has a new hull as much as possible was salvaged from the original and in fact over 65% of the ship was saved.

We started our tour in the society's workshops, where a lot of the restoration work has been carried out by the volunteers, many of whom are self-taught in their skills. After being shown this, we were split into two groups for the tour of the ship and headed our separate ways. We began on the quay side at the bow where our guide told us about the work involved in rebuilding her and how she had two rudders, one in the usual place on the stern, but also one in the bow to allow her to be steered whilst in reverse. When we reached the paddle, we were told how the volunteers rebuilt the paddle box due to the amount of rot in the original.

Once aboard, we were shown around the main deck including the lovingly recreated captain's office, which you could clearly see was better appointed than the other areas. We were told how the seats also doubled as buoyancy aids should they been needed. Below deck we were shown the rear saloon which had been re-created after all the superstructure had been removed for the WW2 mine sweeping equipment, working our way forward we shown a lovely model of the ship in her time during the war and then the engine room followed were they hopefully will install a replacement boiler, so she can return to the river under her own steam. We finally all met in the forward saloon where we enjoyed a drink and a cake and a chat with the others.



All in all, an interesting visit and we learnt a lot about one of Dunkirk's Little Ships.-
