IWC CLUB HOUSE AVAILABLE FOR RENTAL

Just to let you know ...

Since September of 2003, when our new club house building was ready for us, our first year's total amount of rental fees was \$95. Our all time high was in 2012 at \$7,859 when a church met every Sunday morning until they outgrew our space. Last year we came close to that amount, mainly because of weekly Weight Watcher meetings which are held every Friday morning and Tuesday afternoon.

The IWC club house is *THE* place to hold Bridal and Baby Showers. In fact, this past year there was a Baby Shower for a lady who had her Bridal Shower here. We'll stay tuned for that baby's first birthday party. Now that's a tradition! Over the years we have booked many various meetings from annual post office gatherings, Mary Kay sales groups, various associations to memorial services, church services, a few weddings, Christmas parties, a 95 year old lady's birthday party and a 10 year old little girl who wanted a birthday tea party. We have the absolute best renters in Citrus County and many repeat bookings.

We charge \$115 for four hours (giving renters an hour ahead at no charge so they can set up). If they need more than four hours the cost is \$25/hr. We also ask that they take home whatever garbage they generate and leave the building clean the way they found it. If they don't want to clean it, there is an extra \$50 charge. The best deal in town!!! Bottom line to renters: respect the care and upkeep of the building. And they do.

People seem to be heeding the warnings about gatherings of more than ten, which has certainly been reflected in our rentals.

So far nothing. Pray we get better!

Plastic Caps and Lids Collection

The collection day is around the corner! I will be at the IWC clubhouse on **Tuesday**, **January 12**, from noon -2pm to accept the caps and lids that club members have been saving.

Did you know?

- •Americans use approximately 2.5 million plastic bottles each hour.
- •Plastic caps don't biodegrade, meaning it will take hundreds of years for them to decompose in a landfill.
- •Caps are among the most common trash items found in our oceans (which often end up in the food chain when ingested by sea life).

However, recycling caps and lids can help to minimize plastic waste. Our collection of caps and lids will be given to Crystal River Harley Davison. The company is supporting a program that creates school and park benches from the recycled plastic, thereby, supporting the community as well as the environment. Thank you for your conservation efforts and for supporting our caps/lids campaign!

What caps and lids are being accepted?

- •<u>Acceptable caps</u>: Milk jug/creamer caps, detergent, non-pump hairspray, toothpaste deodorant, drink caps such as water, soda, sports drinks, etc., spray paint, flip tops (i.e., Ketchup) ointment, baby food, shampoo and conditioner caps.
- <u>Acceptable clean plastic lids</u>: cottage cheese, yogurt, sour cream, Cool Whip, Pringles, nuts, butter, spices, plastic jar lids (mayonnaise, peanut butter.
- **Please make sure all caps and lids are clean.

Ten Commandments for Volunteers Jan, Feb, Mar 2021

- 1. **Be purposeful.** Know what skills you have to contribute before you arrive on the scene.
- 2. **Be flexible.** This includes being prepared to do administrative grunt work. (Sorry, not all aid work involves washing babies and hugging orphaned children.)
- 3. **Be reflective.** Constantly question your motives. Ask yourself why you are helping, think of your motivation, and keep that at the forefront of your mind.
- 4. **Be receptive.** Learn as much as you can. That said, be wary of engaging for too long with NGO veterans who have become hardened and cynical from their work. Instead, find long-termers with hope still gleaming in their eyes. Then, latch on with open ears.
- 5. **Be positive.** Take pride in your idealism—it's the only thing that can ward off the inevitability of cynicism's approach in your difficult environment.
- 6. **Be realistic.** Your idealism can be balanced only by the knowledge that you are not here to save the world, but to play one specific role and that you may never witness the effects of your efforts.
- 7. **Be independent.** Much of your work will depend on your personal initiative. Be a team player, but do not rely on others to guide you every step of the way.
- 8. **Be empathetic.** Your ability to succeed will depend entirely on your connection to and understanding of the people you work with.
- 9. **Be humble.** Don't speak much. Listen. Avoid grandiose conclusions about a problem, community, or philosophy that you were recently introduced to. Act. Think. Feel. But don't come to too many conclusions—they will only halt your experiential learning process.
- 10. Have a ball. Just be sure you've earned it.

March is Woman's History Month



Women's History Month has grown from a week in March to the entire month itself. If you want to celebrate, educate yourself about women's history. **Do reading online or read books on women and women's history. You can also celebrate with others by attending events or having movie nights with friends.**

Women's History Month is a celebration of women's contributions to history, culture and society and has been observed annually in the month of March in the United States since 1987. Women's History Month 2021 will take place from Monday, March 1-Wednesday, March 31, 2021.

Why Do We Celebrate Women's History Month?

Women's History Month is a dedicated month to reflect on the oftenoverlooked contributions of women to United States history. From <u>Abigail</u> <u>Adams</u> to <u>Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth</u> to <u>Rosa Parks</u>, the <u>timeline</u> <u>of women's history milestones</u> stretches back to the founding of the United States.

The actual celebration of <u>Women's History Month</u> grew out of a weeklong celebration of women's contributions to culture, history and society organized by the school district of Sonoma, <u>California</u>, in 1978. Presentations were given at dozens of schools, hundreds of students participated in a "Real Woman" essay contest and a parade was held in downtown Santa Rosa

Did you know? To coincide with Women's History Month 2011, the White House issued a 50-year progress report on the status of women in the United States. It found that younger women are now more likely than their male counterparts to hold a college degree and that the number of men and women in the labor force has nearly equalized.

A few years later, the idea had caught on within communities, school districts and organizations across the country. In 1980, President <u>Jimmy Carter</u> issued the first presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as <u>National Women's History Week</u>. The U.S. Congress followed suit the next year, passing a resolution establishing a national celebration. Six years later, the <u>National Women's History Project</u> successfully petitioned Congress to expand the event to the entire month of March.

International Women's Day

International Women's Day, a global celebration of the economic, political and social achievements of women, took place for the first time on March 8, 1911. Many countries around the world celebrate the holiday with demonstrations, educational initiatives and customs such as presenting women with gifts and flowers. The United Nations has sponsored International Women's Day since 1975. When adopting its resolution on the observance of International Women's Day, the United Nations General Assembly cited the following reasons: "To recognize the fact that securing peace and social progress and the full enjoyment of human rights and fundamental freedoms require the active participation, equality and development of women; and to acknowledge the contribution of women to the strengthening of international peace and security."



Love, Respect, and Kindness for All is the GFWC Florida President's Project for 2020-2022. The goal is for all of the clubs in Florida to reach out to their local communities and support any and all special needs that are occurring.

The words "special needs" extend far beyond GFWC Florida's usual definition, especially during this Administration and the pandemic. Florida has special needs under every Community Service Program area and most Advancement Plan areas. Projects that GFWC Florida clubs have already supported in their communities range from helping people with Alzheimer's and autism to raising awareness about domestic violence, working to prevent human trafficking, and supporting GFWC Affiliate Organizations St. Jude and Operation Smile. Florida clubwomen are also actively supporting causes concerning libraries, scholarships, fostering/sheltering animals, a cleaner environment, and veterans (both men and women).
