







'Captain my Captain'

A very important role at the club night is that of Target Captain. Before any shooting can take place a Target Captain needs to be in place. The role of the target captain is essentially to ensure that the rules of shooting are carried out. Safety is always very important and it is the role of the target captain to call archers to the line, make sure 'good' order is maintained while archers are at the line and signal when it clear for archers to collect their arrows.

We would like to encourage as many senior members as possible to take a turn at being target captain. We have a group of dedicated members who regularly take on the role each week. All we ask is for each senior member to take a turn and if we had 4 members each club night that would be 30 minutes each, if we had 6 that would only 20 minutes each. If you would like to help out but, are not sure what to do, just speak to a Committee member and they will help. You can also 'buddy' with a more experienced member while they are acting as target Captain until you feel comfortable in the role.



So what would I do?

- At the club night, indicate to a member of the committee that you would like to be Target Captain.
- You will stand at either side of the hall at the shooting line (the side which gives the clearest view of the range).
- When the 'range' is clear, call the archers to the line with the phrase, 'To the line.' The archers will come forward and shoot.
- Observe that good practice is being observed by all archers, shooting and waiting to shoot. An archer not shooting should be behind the waiting/equipment line.
- If you see something that you consider unsafe, e.g. someone in front of the shooting line or an archer turning away from a target with an arrow on their bow, in a very loud voice shout "FAST".



Always Keep in Mind

Safety

- Never put an arrow on your bow unless you are pointing down range and you are going to shoot it.
- 2. Never shoot until the Field Captain has indicated it is safe to do so.
- 3. Never move in front of the shooting line unless indicated to do so.
- 4. If you see something that you consider unsafe, e.g. someone in front of the shooting line shout "FAST".
- 5. NEVER shoot alone, you always require someone else to act as Field Captain while you are shooting. Note that an adult can act as Field Captain for a Junior but not the reverse. If a Junior is shooting, an adult MUST be present.
- When all archers have shot and returned behind the equipment line call, 'clear' or 'clear to collect.
- Archers will collect their arrows and return behind the equipment line.
- When the range is clear and everyone is behind the equipment line, shooting can recommence.

Previous editions of the magazine have covered shooting indoors and the Target Captain. So if you would like to read up, request an electronic copy from Bill.






What were you reading over Christmas?

Sometimes it is difficult to choose a book on archery as you are not quite sure if it will too simple or too technical or meet your needs as an archer. Books shops (if they stock books on archery at all) may well have a limited range. So often you have to buy over the internet and it can sometimes be a risk. A recommendation is very useful. So we would like to encourage to submit a book review on a book you have found useful. Doesn't have to be very long, the key points and why you found it useful.

Santa must have thought I needed a bit of help with my shooting and popped a copy of 'Archery The Art of Repetition' in my stocking. The book by Simon Needham was originally published in 2006 and I thought it might be a bit dated, but it proved to be a very good resource. One or two parts are slightly dated but the general advice on archery I found to be very helpful. It is written essentially for recurve freestyle, but I was



still able to glean lots of useful tips and information from it to challenge me to think about my approach to archery. It is very comprehensive and covers topics from, how to get started and choosing basic equipment through to tuning, arrow selection, fitness and nutrition, psychology, biomechanics of shooting and more. For anyone wanting to improve their Knowledge and skills of recurve archery it is a very good resource. It is a book I think I will be coming back to on a regular basis.


Club members, as many of you know two of our Juniors, Conor and Sophie, represented GB (and LCB) at the European Field Championships in Poland. This was Conor's first time representing Great Britain, while Sophie's had represented GB at the World Field Championships. Conor, shooting in the recurve class and Sophie in the Bare bow class both won bronze medals. This is a great achievement for both of them.

Conor was also part of a 3 man team that included Jamie Cole and Craig McCreery. They managed to beat Sweden to earn a gold medal match but, in the end, were just edged into silver position by an on-form Austrian team.




