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British Field Championships 2017

An Archer's Tale

The All British Field Championships, which included the 15th Junior All British Field Championships, was held on 27-28 May and was hosted by Pentref Bowmen at the Glyncornel Archery Centre, South Wales. It is a World Record Status event over 24 marked and 24 unmarked targets and shot to World Archery rules.


This year to celebrate the 50th anniversary, there was an additional day's shooting on Monday 29 May with a Finals for All shoot off.



This was an opportunity for a road trip and 3 of our members, Michael Ferguson, John Kenny and Raymond Brown took the opportunity to take part in this prestigious event. But I wasn't there, so let's hear the archer's tale.

A great weekend was had by a number of archers from NI at the 50th All British Field Championships in Pentref in Wales last weekend. I took a trip over to it and was





accompanied by John Kenny and Raymond (where is my ID) Brown (he is not going to live that down, just ask him about it). We had a very early start on Friday morning, leaving Ards at 4.30 am and not reaching the shooting grounds until 5.45 pm.








Hitting the Right Note — Arrow Tuning

As you progress in archery you will start to make adjustments to your bow to achieve greater consistency. Arrow flight has an important impact on where your arrows hit on the target and your groupings. They may PORPOISE in flight or hey may **FISHTAIL** in flight. You can make adjustments for these with **BARE-SHAFT** tuning. It is important to make sure you have set your bow up correctly before moving to bare-shaft tuning.

Diagrams Easton Arrow Tuning Guide 2nd Edition

The **first step** is to test for **Porpoising**. If the arrow leaves the bowstring with the nock too high or too low, a motion known as Porpoising occurs. Porpoising is caused by the nocking point being to high or too low . Shoot three identically fletched arrows at a distance of 15 to 20 yards (or meters). Then shoot two identically aimed unfletched arrows. If the unfletched arrows hit above the identically aimed fletched arrows, move the nocking point up on the bowstring until both fletched and unfletched arrows strike at the same level. See Dia.1 . If the unfletched arrows hit above the identically aimed fletched arrows hit at the same level or slightly lower than the fletched shafts. To assure you have eliminated Porpoising, repeat the test, shooting first the fletched, then the unfletched and u fletched shafts, and make adjustments to the nocking point until both fletched and u fletched shafts hit at the same level.




The **next step** in bare shaft tuning is to check for **fish tailing** which means the nock end of the arrow will appear to move from side to side in flight. See Fig. 11. Shoot three fletched arrows at a distance of 15 to 20 yards (meters), then shoot two identically-aimed, unfletched arrows. If the unfletched shafts hits to the left of the identically aimed, fletched shafts, your arrow reaction is too stiff as seen in Fig. 11 (for a righthanded archer), If the unfletched arrows hit to he right of the identically-aimed, fletched shafts, as seen in Fig. 11 your arrow reaction is too weak (for a right-handed archer), Your equipment is basically tuned when the bare shafts and fletched shafts impact at the same or very near the same location. It is common on a well-tuned bow to have the bare shaft impact a little low and to the left of the fletched arrows for a right-handed archer). If, after completing the adjustments, the bare shaft impact is more than 4-6 inches (10-15 cm, some guides say 4", others suggest 6") to the right (weak) or left (stiff) of the fletched shafts you may need to revisit your arrow spine.

Arrow Tuning Adjustments

- Arrow Reaction too stiff
- Decrease the spring tension on cushion plunger
- Slightly increase the draw weight of your bow
- Increase arrow point weight
- Use a lighter bow string
- Increase brace height

Arrow Reaction too weak

- Increase the spring tension on cushion plunger
- Slightly decrease the draw weight of your bow
- Decrease arrow point weight
- Decrease brace height

Everything in Line

In the fifth of our coaching articles, club coach Arthur Halligey brings to our attention the importance of the lines of archery





The Lines of Archery

Line of Sight—Once set cannot be moved

Plumb Line— Archers need to stand straight

Primary Force Line — Elbow can be higher but not lower

Arrow Line—Must be in plane with target center

Hip Line—Should either line up with heels and shoulders or be mid-way

Heel Line— Can be used instead of toe line

Toe Line— Can be misleading if feet flared



Plumb Line—Archers head must be straight up and down

Shoulder Line — Parallel to Arrow Line for Compound, points to Center of Pressure on Grip for Recurve

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Scapula Line

Spine Line— Should be flat and plumb

While this shows Olympic style Recurves the alignments referred to are advised for consideration in all styles as it gives stability to the shot while making use of the 'shooting' muscles. Compound archers often adopt a more open stance - i.e. the shoulder line may be parallel to the Draw Force (Arrow) line depending on the set draw length of the bow.

The 'Hip Line' (left hand image) may vary between that shown (engaging the core muscles) to aligning with the shoulders which some may find results in helping to engage the muscles acting on the scapula. The flared 'Toe Line' refers to the rear toe being angled back and away from the front.

The Lines are suggested in order to achieve greater consistency in the shot leading to greater consistency in the score.

So - practice often but practice smart and don't be afraid to ask a Coach.





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Archery NI and Open Indoor Championships 2017

The inaugural Archery NI indoor championships took place on the weekend of the 1 April . This was the inaugural indoor championships for the newly formed Archery NI body which oversees archery in Northern Ireland in association with their parent body, Archery GB. The championships consisted of a UK Record Status 18m qualification shoot and a knockout head-to-head for senior archers. Junior archers shot a UK Record Status Portsmouth round at 20yds. Various types of archery styles were present at the competition including:- Recurve, Compound, Barebow, Longbow, Traditional and American Flatbow.

We had 3 Senior and 5 Junior archers competing and they managed to bring home 4 gold and 1 bronze medals between them. This may not seem like much but you need to consider that this was the first major indoor championship shoot for 3 of the gold medal winners. The medal winners were:

- Conor Hall, Gold, Senior Gents Recurve
- Sophie Benton, Bronze, Senior Ladies Barebow
- Alice McKay, Gold, U 18 Ladies Compound
- Bethany Evans, Gold, U 18 Ladies Barebow
- Ryan Leathem, Gold, U 12 Gents Recurve.

I must also mention the excellent performances from Megan Simpson, U16 ladies Recurve, Raymond Brown, Senior Gents Recurve and John Kane, U12 Gents Recurve.

As a coach I am very proud of what all these archers did last weekend and especially as I have coached a number of them but I am not taking any credit for these medals as it was purely down to them on the day. They entered the event, trained for it, overcame nerves on the morning and shot brilliantly. Well done to you all. (MF)

Target Archery

https://worldarchery.org/ Target-Archery Probably the most recognisable form of archery is target archery with the gold, red, blue, black and white target face, sometimes referred to as imperial colours. Target archery can be shot both outdoors and indoors and over distances of up to 90 metres, using the traditional five-colour, 10-ring target. With international target archery there are two recognised bow styles: recurve and compound. Recurve target archery is the only format currently included in the Olympic games.

Standard WA targets are marked with 10 evenly spaced concentric rings, which generally have score values from 1 through 10 assigned to them, except in outdoor Imperialrounds under AGB rules, where they have score values 1, 3, 5, 7 and 9.



OUTDOOR TARGET ARCHERY


Recurve archers will shoot at targets set at 70 metres and compound archers shoot at targets at 50 metres. Both bow styles shoot at the traditional yellow, red, blue, black and white target that scores 10 for the inner ring and one for the outer ring. The recurve target is 122cm in diameter with a 10 ring 12.2cm in diameter.

The compound target is 80cm in diameter with a 10 ring 8cm in diameter. In international competition, compound targets only include the yellow, red and blue rings. This is to reduce the size of target mat needed for each target face, in order that each athlete has their own target to shoot at.










INDOOR TARGET ARCHERY

Indoors recurve and compound archers shoot at targets set 18 metres away. Archers of both bow styles will shoot at the traditional yellow, red, blue, black and white target that scores 10 for the inner ring and one for the outdoor ring. There is a smaller 10 ring, measuring 2cm in diameter, for compound athletes as opposed to the 4cm diameter recurve 10 ring.

In international competition, targets only include the yellow, red and blue rings and are often referred to as a triple face. Archers shoot a maximum of one arrow at each target face.





COMPETITION FORMATS

There are a variety of formats for Outdoor and indoor target archery and includes individual,

team and mixed team competitions. World Archery also recognises a number of competition rounds not or no longer used at international events.

INDIVIDUAL COMPETITION FORMAT

Athletes shoot a qualification or ranking round to ascertain seedings in their division: bow style and gender. The ranking round consists of 72 arrows outdoors or 60 arrows indoors, cumulatively scored. The athlete in each division who finishes with the most points is given the top seed, the athletes with the least the lowest seed.

Athletes then advance to eliminations and finals of head-to-head matches shot in brackets. In indoor competition, only the top 32 seeded athletes advance. In outdoor competition, the top 104 seeded athletes advance, while the top eight seeded athletes are given an automatic bye into the third round.

Recurve matches are decided using the set system. Athletes receive two set points for winning each set of three arrows. If both athletes score the same in a threearrow set, they both receive one set point. The first athlete to reach six set points wins the match.

Compound matches are decided using cumulative scoring. Athletes shoot 15 arrows in five ends of three arrows. The athlete with the highest 15-arrow score wins the match.

If a recurve match is tied on five set points or a compound match is tied on cumulative score then the match is decided in a single-arrow shoot-off. Each athlete shoots one arrow and the arrow that lands closest to the middle wins the match. If no winner can be decided, the process is repeated until a winner is found.

The elimination brackets advance until there are four athletes remaining to shoot the semi-finals. The losers of the two semi-finals compete in a bronze medal match while the winners of the two semi-finals compete in the gold medal match to decide who wins the tournament.

TEAM AND MIXED TEAM COMPETITION FORMAT



As well as the individual competition, international events can also include team and mixed team competitions. (Mixed team competition is currently included in outdoor archery only.)



Teams comprise three athletes of the same division. It is usually the top scoring three athletes in qualification, however team managers may choose to substitute athletes.

Mixed teams comprise two athletes of the same bow style, one of each gender. It is usually the highest scoring athlete of each gender in qualification, however team managers may choose to substitute athletes.

Teams and mixed teams are seeded for their elimination matches using the total of the individual ranking round scores of their athletes.

Recurve team and mixed team matches are decided using the set system. Teams receive two set points for winning each set of six arrows (two each); mixed teams receive two set points for winning each set of four arrows (two each). If both teams or mixed teams score the same in a six- or four-arrow set, they both receive one set point. The first team or mixed team to reach five set points wins the match.

Compound team and mixed team matches are decided using cumulative scoring. Teams shoot 24 arrows in four ends of six arrows; the team with the highest 24-arrow total wins the match. Mixed teams shoot 16 arrows in four ends of four arrows; the mixed team with the highest 16-arrow total wins the match.

If a recurve team or mixed team match is tied on four set points or a compound match is tied on cumulative score then the match is decided in a shoot-off. Each athlete in the team or mixed team shoots one arrow. The team with the arrow that lands closest to the centre wins the match.


If no winner can be decided with each team's arrow that is closest to the centre, then the second closest arrows are decided, then the third. If no winner can be decided, the process is repeated until a winner is found.

OTHER COMPETITION FORMATS

While there is a standard format generally shot at international competitions, there are a wide range of competition rounds shot throughout the world.

Below are some of the indoor competition formats, GNAS and FTTA (WA) some of which you will be familiar with.

Columcille signals our last field shoot of the season. This year we decided to have a 3D shoot. The club had not hosted a 3D for quite a few years and it was decided that this would be a good opportunity to introduce our new members to this discipline of field archery.

This was to be a World Archery 12 target round shot twice. The field team under Noel did their usual thorough preparation in setting up the course. 3 D Field Archery

The discipline of 3D Archery is a form of Target Archery. In 3D archery 3D representations of animals are used as targets. These are close to life sized animals. The types of animals will vary depending on the club. You may see everything from Antelope, Deer, Sheep, Snakes, Beaver, Skunk, Moose, Elk, Cougar, Bobcat and much more. Some shoots may also include some more novelty 3D targets such as dinosaurs. 3D Archery can be set in the woods, fields and sometimes even indoor ranges. The aim of 3D Archery is the same as target and field archery – to get the highest possible score.

Most bow styles are accepted in 3D archery and include, longbow, barebow, recurve, compound and archers can shoot trad and instinctively.

Generally, most 3D shoots will be unmarked, requiring you to use your skill in estimating the distance. In Marked 3D Archery, they will tell you at each peg, how far

the target is. Some clubs may even

put a small dot on the highest scoring ring. Your object is to hit the highest scoring ring.

Each 3D Target will have a set of scoring rings on it. The rings though visible will not be as visible as on

a standard target face. When you

come to the marker board for a target there will normally be a picture of the 3D target and from it you can see where the scoring zones are. While there maybe variation in the scoring according to the club or association, the most common format is the smallest circle scores 11 or 12 points, the next ring 10 points, the outer ring is 8 points and the body is 5 points. The hoof or antlers on deer score a zero.


Distances will vary according to the association, for example in World Archery the maximum distance is 30 metres for Barebow. 3D archery is very enjoyable for young and older archers alike and worth having a go if you haven't tried it.

In the World Archery 3D rounds there are 4 scoring zones. 11, 10, 8 in the scoring zone and 5 for the body.







3 D Hunting Trail

One of the 3D rounds a is a Hunting Trail. This is shot on a field course and consists of a number of trails which are set out on the course. Each trail varies in length and within each trail the are an unspecified number of 3D animals partially 'disguised' which archers have to discover. The distances are unmarked, however the maximum distance is 15 metres. Archers go round the trails in groups of 4, with each archer taking a turn to lead the group through the trail. Once inside the trail, archers follow a direction tape and have to remain within an arms length at all times apart





from collecting arrows of course. Once an animal is spotted it can then be shot. However if you go past an animal, you cannot turn and go back to it. If you can get a shot on it, then you can take it, assuming it is safe to do so.

From personal experience I would recommend the trail to anyone who enjoys 3D archery. The trail is a relaxed and fun shoot with the animals being shot between 5 and 15 metres. So why not have a go!

Next Hunting Trail

Ballyvally have 2 Hunting Trails scheduled for the summer.

The first is on the 23 July and the second is on the 27 August.
