Watershed Update

Benthic Mats

We did it! As part of our Song Lake Action Plan, we worked with Nathan Sgouris to rent benthic mats for the open water season. Nathan installed mats for 20 homeowners this spring. Weed Removal

A Word or Two about Healthy Living with Nature

Living near the woodlands and lakes is a delight, and as we enjoy nature's beauty, our chance encounters with wildlife increases. This may include animals with disease.

Healthy Animals in the Wild Will Keep Their Distance from Humans

Already this year, there have been suspicious reports of rabid animals. Rabies virus causes an acute encephalitis in all warm-blooded hosts. Signs in any animal with rabies may be seen as seizures, difficulty breathing, difficulty swallowing, excessive salivation, abnormal behavior, and aggression.

Ticks Abound

Ticks, once only seen occasionally, are now common in CNY, and the incidents of tick borne diseases are a growing concern. Most of us on the lake have encountered them in our yards or around wooded areas, and many of our neighbors have already had a tick bite with the need for antibiotics.

Here are some basic precautions: <u>Always do a "tick Check,"</u> behind and inside ears, along the hairline and around the scalp, back of the neck and armpits, belly button, waistband area, behind the knees and between the legs. <u>If you find a tick</u>, use fine-tipped tweezers to grab the tick as close to the skin as possible, then use a steady, upward motion to pull the tick out and kill the tick in rubbing alcohol. <u>Wash the bite area</u> well along with the tweezers and your hands. Monitor the site, but there are any doubts, see a doctor.

<u>Use insect repellant</u> that contains the appropriate, non-toxic ingredients, Permethrin can be used on clothing and it will remain through several washes, but remember that the permethrin as a liquid is lethal to cats. <u>Only use the repellant that your veterinarian recommends</u> for your pets.

CyanoHABs Are Back

We have had two certified shoreline blooms so far this year. If you suspect a bloom, simply stay out of the water until there is no sign of the bloom. This is especially important for children and pets. If you do come in contact with a bloom, wash the exposed area well. To help us understand our risks, take a picture and call Carl Grillo so that we can get a toxicology sample.
