

April is also the month when the US recognizes child abuse and Sexual abuse. We encourage you to look below for statistics we all should know as the children are our future.

EVERY 68 SECONDS,

an American is sexually assaulted.

Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) calls attention to the fact that sexual violence is widespread and impacts every person in every community.

Statistics Show:

An estimated 17.7 million American women had been victims of attempted or completed rape.

- 82% of all juvenile victims are female. 90% of adult rape victims are female.
- Females ages 16-19 are four times more likely than the general population to be victims of rape, attempted rape, or sexual assault.
- Women ages 18-24 who are college students are three times more likely than women in general to experience sexual violence.



32.9% of adults with intellectual disabilities have experienced sexual violence.


As such, we must strive to create strong, connected communities that take care of one another and make decisions to ensure the safety and well-being of others to end sexual violence.

April marks National Child Abuse Prevention (CAP) Month, an initiative led by Prevent Child Abuse America and its national network of state chapters.

Child abuse and neglect are a serious public health crisis. They can have long-term impacts on Mental and Physical health and general well-being. This issue includes all types of abuse and neglect of a child under the age of 18 by a parent, caregiver, or another person in a custodial role (such as a religious leader, a coach, or a teacher) that results in harm, the potential for harm, or

problem

More than 600,000 children are abused in the U.S. each year. An estimated 600,000 children (unique incidents) were victims of abuse and neglect in 2021, the most recent year for which there is national data. The actual number of children abused is likely underreported because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic in 2021.

The youngest children were most vulnerable. Children in the first year of their life are 15% of all victims, and more than a quarter (28%) of child maltreatment victims are no more than two years old.¹

- Child abuse is deadly. In 2021, an estimated 1,820 children died from abuse and neglect in the United States.
- Nationally, neglect is the most common form of abuse. Three-fourths (76%) of victims are neglected, 16% are physically abused, 10% are sexually abused, and 1% are sex trafficked.

There are four common types of abuse and neglect:

- Physical abuse is the intentional use of physical force that can result in physical injury. Examples include hitting, kicking, shaking, burning, or other shows of force against a child.
- Sexual abuse involves
 pressuring or forcing a child to
 engage in sexual acts. It
 includes behaviors such as
 fondling, penetration, and
 exposing a child to other
 sexual activities. Please

- Emotional abuse refers to behaviors that harm a child's self-worth or emotional wellbeing. Examples include name-calling, shaming, rejecting, withholding love, and threatening.
- Neglect fails to meet a child's basic physical and emotional needs. These needs include housing, food, clothing, education, access to medical care, and feeling validated and appropriately responded to.
