Nahar Torah Niddah Series # 10 Kesem 3 – Size of A Gris

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Welcome back! Last *shiur* we dealt deeply with the critical concept of *teliya* while mentioning the word "*gris*" – we said that for less than a *gris* we can be *toleh*; today we are going to give a better explanation of what a *gris* is.

The *Gemara*¹ tells us:

רב הונא אמר כגריס כיתר מכגריס ורב חסדא אמר כגריס כפחות מכגריס

Meaning:

"Rav Huna says 'k'gris' means more than a k'gris (including the gris) and Rav Chisda says 'k'gris' means less than a k'gris (not including the gris)."

The Beis Yosef brings down that the Rashba, Rambam, Rosh all paskin like Rav Chisda, unlike the Sefer Ha'Teruma who paskins like Rav Huna. Therefore, you have up until and including a gris.

Practically, some say that a *gris* is 14mm, 18mm, and some even say its up until 20 mm. The general way *Poskim* check the size of a *gris* in America is by taking out a penny² and putting it over the *kesem*; in Israel they take a *shekel*; in South Africa they use a 5 rand coin.

Regarding the *thickness* of a *gris*, *L'maysa*, we *paskin halacha* based off of the *surface area* of the *kesem*, not the volume.

Before moving on in *hilchos kesamim*, it is fitting to also define the size of a flow – i.e. the amount of blood which would make a woman a *niddah*. Rav Moshe paskins that the size of a flow of blood which is metame amounts to half of a dollar bill³.
