MUDDY CREEK ROAD WILL BE DESTROYED

## 35 FLOOD-PRONE PROPERTIES NEAR



Metropolitan Sewer District of Greater Cincinnati has been awarded a grant to demolish 35 floodprone properties near Muddy Creek in Green Township and Cincinnati.

The \$4 million grant from FEMA and the Ohio Emergency Management Agency announced Friday, plus \$570,000 from MSD in

local cost share, will be used to purchase those properties along Muddy Creek Road between Glenway Avenue and Westbourne Drive. This move will address years of flooding and sewer backups in the affected homes. MSD explained that the homes, constructed in the 1950s, were built in a former creek bed, which was enclosed in a sewer.

MSD said the property owners have volunteered to participate in the program. MSD plans to acquire the properties and relocate the residents to "safe, comparable housing," beginning in early spring. The plan is to then "restore the area as a natural floodplain or storm water management area." The project is expected to take about two years to complete. Meanwhile, MSD is working with OEMA to purchase another five properties in the area.
