Lessons from the pandemic: Year 2

What a year this has been! As the COVID-19 pandemic continues, congregations and communities of the ELCIC continue to seek out safe and appropriate ways to serve and continue the important ministries that God calls us to. In fact the whole church has been adapting, evolving, being flexible, getting creative and partnering with one

another in many, many different ways. 2021 may have been challenging but we are people of hope. Together we will manage the challenges and faithfully live into the next chapter, responding to the needs of those around us and upholding life-giving relationships.

Summer Sermon Series

Quite often, "working together" is the means of carrying out a physical task. But as we all so quickly came to know, the COVID-19 pandemic has put its limitations on in-person gatherings, socialization and how we were able to carry out our work. Through the many challenges, bishops, pastors, leaders, volunteers and members across the church

In looking for new ways help support ordained leaders and congregations as they shifted gears to offering online Sunday services, the ELCIC synod bishops and assistants to the bishops put together 14 pre-

recorded sermons for use across the church through the months of June to September. This Summer Sermon Series resource provided relief for well-deserved summer holidays, time for leaders to focus on some of the many other needs for their congregation and an opportunity to hear from different leaders from across the church.

"At a certain point we started hearing of concerns as the pandemic wore on," British Columbia Synod Bishop Greg Mohr said. "The exhaustion and stress of our rostered and lay leaders continued to build. We wanted to figure out what we could do to help provide a sermon resource so that pastors could accommodate that to the worship they were preparing for their congregations."

The response was overwhelming. Mohr recalls countless emails and telephone conversations with members from other synods and even in other countries asking for links to the various sermons.

"This served as a way for us to be guest speakers in congregations," he says. "We were obviously unable to travel around and be with the churches in person, but this gave us an opportunity to show face in many congregations once a month. Another side goal this accomplished was the broadening of connections and relationships across the ELCIC.

People just really enjoyed hearing from us, especially out of jurisdiction. Hearing our voices and the different ways we preached helped bring online church alive."

The Feisty Saints of Bergland

Trinity, Bergland, Ont. is a unique congregation nestled in a small community on the shores of Lake of the Woods. After several years with rostered pastoral care, it became apparent in 1992 that we would no longer be able to support such a ministry. We struggled with our identity but were pleased when Bishop Lee Luetkehoelter sent a letter to us, addressed to the "Feisty Saints of Bergland." We were now a lay-led congregation with no expenses other than general maintenance. We provided full-time programs and our worship life was filled with the Spirit.

Our outreach program became our focus and remains so today. We support Luther Village, Care bags for CLWR. provide food and workers for the local food bank, church services for the residents at Long Term Care in Rainy River, supplemental food items for children's lunches at the local school, food hampers for families in need and contribute to skating ice time at the local arena. Beyond our local communities, we contribute to The Urban in Winnipeg, LAMP, the Salvation Army, Family Crisis Centre, Amythest House, and our local missionary in Bangledesh. Our passion abroad is Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR). We have made many, many quilts and a multitude of We Care bags. We have been blessed beyond belief with opportunities to give and share.

When COVID-19 drives us out — we drive-in!

As the world unexpectedly embraced the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the congregations of New Denmark Parish (St. Peter's and Bethany,) in Northwestern New Brunswick encapsulated the spirit of their ancestors and adapted to the challenging dircumstances before them.

Social distancing measures dosed the door on in-person worship and poor bandwidth allocation made virtual worship extremely challenging and often times unfeasible. In light of this, an adaptive and alternative approach was taken: drive-in style worship services held at the local recreation centre parking lot. As vehicles arrive on Sunday morning, a volunteer directs them to a parking spot and ensures that they maintain a two-meter radius from all other vehicles. People remain parked in this location and enjoy the full duration of the service from the comfort of their vehicle. Following the

service, the same volunteer directs traffic out of the parking lot, toward the driveway, where one of our treasurers waits to collect the weekly offering using a fishnet that ensures social distancing.

God continues to bless the New Denmark Parish as it strives to remain active and faithful amidst the many challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic has produced. Rather than focus on what the pandemic has prohibited, we strive to focus on the new opportunities that it creates! COVID-19 attempted to drive us out of our buildings, but has instead driven us into a wonderful opportunity for people of all ages and skillsets to work collectively in the service of Christ and the church. Pastor Munye Mtata's Report

Introduction

Greetings Good Shepherd Lutheran family in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord and companion. We look back to the year 2021 with mixed feelings; on the one hand, we feel the pinch of the disruptive nature of this seemingly endless pandemic – desperately longing for a return to the life that we call normal. Some of us have continued to lose opportunities for growth and development in different aspects of our lives, some of us have lost loved ones, not only to the pandemic, but to other challenges as well, and many of us have not been able to grieve as we needed to.

On the other hand, our hearts are filled with gratitude to God for accompanying us through most of these challenges. With the Psalmist we say, "if it had not been the Lord, who was on our side... if it had not been the Lord, when our enemies attacked us, they would have swallowed us up alive..." (Psalm 124). Not only have we been spared of misfortune; many of us have also witnessed the Lord, in a proverbial sense, 'setting a table before us in the presence of our enemies,' achieving successes that would probably not have been easy to achieve in normal times.

My hope, indeed, my prayer, is that in all the roller coaster feelings we may go through, we may still find refreshment in taking part in the life of the church as we proceed into 2022.

This report will give an overview of our experiences of the year 2020 as a church, and will provide a few recommendations for the future at the end.

Overview

We cannot thank the Congregation Management Team (CMT) enough for the sterling job that we have continued to see them do. They continued to meet on a regular basis to make sure that the different sub-structures of the congregation are functional through these unprecedented times. Through our new and very capable administrator, Corla McGillivray, many important aspects of our church life, including regular communication with the congregation, were adequately taken care of.

i) Ministry Within

The previous year brought with it opportunities to return to in-person worship with the introduction of vaccines. And I take this opportunity to applaud our members for taking the message of vaccination positively. On August 22nd we resumed in-person worship services after more than a year of only virtual worship, and it was a delight to see familiar faces again. As expected, however, not all of us were able to come back for in-person services as we continue to battle the pandemic. Thus, our Christmas Eve service attendance numbers were considerably lower than the pre-Covid times.

Nonetheless, we greatly appreciate the work of our music director, Anna Scott, who tirelessly committed to supplying uplifting hymns for our worship services. She made sure to be available when our music bands could not make it. We also appreciate the bands who were ready to lead worship once we returned. Besides, our technical resource people, Nathan and Marty, were dedicated in facilitating the production of virtual worship services, and in sorting out the technical aspects of in-person services, each and every Sunday of the year.

We held our Services of Affirmation of Baptism in June and in October for the 8 youth who had gone through two years of Christian instruction. Confirmation classes also continued, initially through zoom, then in person when we could meet again in September.

As far as Sunday School ministry is concerned, I immensely appreciate the creative and tireless work of our coordinating team led by Joel, Kara, Katie, Ruth, Debbie and others. They were able to set up virtual programmes throughout the year for the Sunday School youth, from Easter right up to the Advent Season.

With the slow reopening of life in the later part of the year, we were also able to make visits to some of our members in the care homes for Holy communion, where possible. Of course, this was done with a lot of caution and consideration to avoid putting our sisters and brothers at risk.

It was quite heartwarming seeing our congregation members getting consistently in touch with one another, reaching out and encouraging each other. And so, I applaud the love that we have all shared on this journey. We have also tried to supply daily devotionals for those connected to Facebook, though this effort has not always been consistent.

ii) Ministry Outside

Just like in 2020, our other ministry teams were not able to do much in 2021 due to the restrictive nature of the pandemic. But I must appreciate the congregation for the generous contributions towards the Food Bank as we headed towards the Christmas season. May God continue to bless you.

Conclusion and Recommendations

In view of all these wonderful acts of love and commitment by all of you, I reiterate my immense gratitude to the guidance, companionship and support of the CMT. Their encouragement, support and prayers for all of us are greatly appreciated. Most importantly, I thank you, the congregation members, for the show of love and support. You also made our Christmas a special one, and I take this opportunity to thank you from the bottom of my heart. Special appreciation goes Gladys, my wife, and our kids, for affording me the time to conduct church business, sometimes at their inconvenience.

Looking forward to the year ahead, with more and more opportunities to safely return to in-person worship, we probably do well to start thinking of creative ways to remain church, as we minister to one another and to the world around us. Covid-19 seems to be a part of our lives now, and as such, we continue to care for one another, care for the task set before us, and indeed trust God who promises to abide with us. A few thoughts come to mind for 2022:

- i) Outreach Programme AS we return to in person worship, that we engage in a deliberate outreach programme to invite people back to church.
- ii) Increased Participation One challenge that has been thrust upon us by the pandemic is to lay low and keep ourselves and our loved ones safe, resulting in diminished participation in church life. May this challenge each of us to ask ourselves how we are going to actively take part in church life, whether from home or as we come together with others in-person.
- iii) Capacity Building Some of our members coming back may have interests in joining different ministry groups that they were not part of before. As such, they may need to be capacitated to confidently take part in those ministry portfolios.

Sisters and brothers, I pray for your safety and health, and for God's guidance on your life's endeavors through the year.



Service Ministry

Purpose of the Service Ministry Team

Constitution: This congregation shall live by faith active in love. It shall motivate, equip and support its members to: minister in daily life; participate as members of a caring community; serve as Christians in all the institutions and structures of the society of which they are a part; and promote justice and reconciliation, meet human needs and alleviate suffering, both individually and corporately. It shall make certain that all its functions strengthen the motivation and ability for service.

During the 2021 year for Good Shepherd, there was a reduced capacity to serve the greater community due to Covid and the constraints that put on gathering. This area of our church organization works to identify needs in the church and broader community and allocate resources (time, talents, treasures) to help meet these needs. Work that would occur in this area would be identifying volunteers for work at the Lighthouse, organizing hampers for various charities in Saskatoon, as well as work done in collaboration with The Seven Church Councils in Saskatoon of the Saskatchewan Synod, ELCIC.

Gathering donations for the Lighthouse was organized by Karen Harilstad prior to Christmas and a full bin was sent to a very appreciative group in our city. We encourage you to bring ideas where we can improve to any CMT member or to the CMT leaders of this ministry.

Support Ministry

Purpose of the Support Ministry Team:

Constitution: Support – This congregation, in faithfulness to God, shall provide leadership, organizational structures, facilities and funds to enable fulfillment of its functions. It shall strive to maintain effective stewardship practices, recruit, equip and support members to provide for these activities while regularly evaluating its total life and ministry.

Stewardship Items:

- As we continue to navigate through Covid19, we have continued to receive offerings using email authorizations and requests, offerings dropped off at church, as well as the regular monthly donations through PAR. This has allowed us to meet our obligations for the year using the carry over funds from 2020.
- We have paid back the CEBA Loan portion of \$30,000 with the other \$10,000 forgiven amount having been recognized in 2020.

Building and Property Items:

- Use of the facility for 2021 has been minimal again as the community works through the covid restrictions. Our biggest rental was for the use of our parking lot again this summer, as the apartments next door were resurfacing the last of their parking lots.
- The support committee did a walk through of the buildings on August 25th noting the shingles on the education wing and entrance roof will need to be replaced over the next 2 years. Other fixes and changes in the education wing will also need to addressed once things are back to normal.

Caretakers and Staff:

- Kara and Chris have continued to do maintenance and painting in the church, with this year focusing on the bathrooms. Don Slind has also replaced some of the lighting in the bathrooms making it brighter and safer.
- The biggest change in the office was the hiring of Corla McGillivrey to replace Angela Friggstad. We appreciate the years that Angela served in the position and thank her for her time and dedication. Corla continues to represent our church communications in a courteous and professional manner.

Fund Raising Committee:

• It was another year in which no fund-raising activities could be organized for 2021. Hopefully we can look at something in the fall of 2022.

Treasurer:

- I have continued in the role of treasurer for the church to ensure that all requirements for CRA and ISC are submitted as required. We again engaged Marilyn Johnson with MG Accounting & Office Services to perform our accounting review for our yearend.
- A special thank you for Angela, and now Corla, for all the work they do to assist the Support Team do its job.

Saskatchewan Synod Insert for 2021 Congregational Annual Reports Year-end letter from Bishop Sid Haugen

Dear partners in the Gospel,

This year, based on a number of questions that we often receive at synod office, I would like to take a moment to say a few words about the role of the synod and the role of congregations.

Congregations or faith communities are the core of our church. At the congregational level, the Word is preached, the sacraments are shared, and service to the world is carried out. At the congregational level 'the rubber hits the road' for our church.

What is a synod? The word synod comes from the from the Greek words *sun* (with) and *hodos* (road). A synod is those who are literally 'with each other on the road.' By 'Saskatchewan Synod' we mean all the congregations and related ministries that walk together in Saskatchewan (and NW Manitoba). Congregations are remarkably independent bodies, but congregations gather themselves into synods to accomplish things an individual congregation could not. More than simply taking further care of itself, a congregation belongs to a synod to take care of other congregations who from time to time need the support offered by the wider synod.

Constitutionally, Synod council is the governing body of the synod of congregations and the bishop serves as the synod's lead pastor and chief executive officer. This synod leadership is set up to do a number of things; among them, to provide support to the synod's congregations and ministries, to inspire vision, to keep in mind the work of the church beyond the boundaries of the congregation (and beyond the boundaries of the synod), and to provide direction to its congregations and ministries.

How does the synod of congregations resource that synod leadership? Financial giving to ensure leadership for our synod is determined independently by each congregation. Each congregation contributes to the synod balancing their own resources with a strong sense of call to provide support for the synod: for congregations in need, for our national church, for our seminary. And so, as followers of Jesus, we bear each other's burdens.

Report on 2021

This report briefly addresses two items:

- 1. the benevolence received by synod leadership in 2021 from the synod of congregations
- 2. how synod leadership has worked with that benevolence.

Benevolence received from synod congregations in 2021

Rather than speak directly to this, I'm inserting here a paragraph provided by our finance manager: Congregational support remained at 2020 levels, 100% of budget but 80% of pre-COVID support. Reduced income was somewhat offset with reduction of travel and travel costs by both synod council and committees, and bishop and assistants. Sask Synod also benefitted from federal grant programs which subsidized salaries and rent to offset income shortfalls. Overall, the general fund is in the black for 2021 but staffing levels are tight. The 2022 budget anticipates a partial return to pre-pandemic congregational benevolence levels while preparing to face a deficit should benevolence remain lower than in the past. Thank you for your ongoing participation through benevolence in the work of our church synod-wide.

Synod council has directed the benevolence from congregations as follows:

Synod council continued to "pay it forward" by contributing as 'first fruits' ('off the top') 35% of congregational benevolence to support key partners in ministry: 20% to the ministry of our National Church; 15% to Lutheran Theological Seminary, our seminary in Saskatoon.

Synod council approved a budget for the work of the bishop's office. The bishop's office employs a total of 2 Full time equivalents to support the administrative and pastoral work of the bishop in supporting our synod of 102 congregations, 3 synod ministries, and 125 rostered ministers (about half of which are retired).

- The Administrative Team at our Saskatoon office consists of a .75-time office manager, a .5-time executive assistant, and a .2-time finance manager. The administrative team at the office in Saskatoon continues to develop communication channels to our synod council and committees, congregations, ministries and rostered ministers as well as assisting them in administrative and financial matters. The synod website, Share point sites, synod leadership email distribution lists, SaskSynod News, and video conferencing are key tools for their work.
- The Pastoral Team supports congregations, ministries and rostered ministers 'on the road', with a .25-time Assistant to the Bishop for the northern region of the synod, and a .25-time Assistant to the Bishop for the southern region of the synod. The pastoral team continues to connect with congregations seeking leadership: some looking to call a pastor, others seeking ways of being church when the parish could no longer afford or secure a full-time pastor. The pastoral team handles specific requests for support from members of the roster, as well as seeking to stay in contact with the roster--although the pandemic has made this work more challenging.

Two key accomplishments of the bishop's office as a whole in 2021: providing a virtual synod convention in June and providing a hybrid in-person and virtual Fall Leadership Conference for the rostered ministers this fall. It is a small but mighty team! One other key accomplishment of the bishop's office this year was the development of virtual Town Halls. The Town Halls gathered both rostered and lay leadership creating a grassroots gathering of 'synod leadership'. The Town Halls enabled us to face together the various challenges for congregations during the ever-changing pandemic and to develop shared synod guidelines for publishing on the synod website.

Closing words

So here we are. We have lived through a full 12-month year with all the challenges of the pandemic. What does the future look like? None of us can say with certainty. But God is good. So, I invite you, again, as people of faith, to enter 2022 placing the work of our synod and ourselves in God's hands in this familiar prayer:

You have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown.

Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
