## It's time for Washington Mardi Gras!

This week's festivities surrounding the 73rd Washington Mardi Gras might look and feel slightly different, but that's not stopping King **Richard Lipsey** from enjoying what will be a royal reign to remember.

Following a luncheon at the Kennedy Center, Thursday night will feature a private, invitation-only King's Dinner at the Mellon Auditorium. There's a bit of secrecy surrounding the shindig, but Lipsey let slip on Talk 107.3 FM this week that "one of the best entertainers in the country" is attached to the event.

That kind of buzz, in concert with Washington Mardi Gras being canceled last year, has politicos boarding flights early tonight with growing anticipation. "Everyone is anxious," Lipsey said during his radio interview, "and we're probably going to have one of the biggest crowds this year."

Lipsey, who was selected as king by Congressman **Garret Graves**, the chairman of Mystick Krewe of Louisianians, said he has attended Washington Mardi Gras 10 times. "Almost everybody who's anybody in Louisiana goes to Washington Mardi Gras, particularly the politicians," Lipsey said, adding, "It's a heck of a celebration."

Graves also selected **Madison Smith** of LaPlace, to serve as queen. "It's a very busy schedule," her majesty told her hometown newspaper. "One of my favorite events in DC is going to the Arlington Cemetery to pay our respects. The King and the Queen lay a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and we walk around to pay our respects to others who are buried there."

While some events have been canceled and a few personalities (elected and otherwise) will not be attending, there are still several high-profile — and high-dollar — events to add to your calendar.

For example, there's a Friday afternoon "Private Bourbon Tasting" at the Sazerac House benefitting Senate Commerce Vice Chair Cameron Henry, SGA Chair Sharon Hewitt, Senate Transportation Chair Patrick McMath, SGA Vice Chair Barry Milligan, Rev and Fisc Vice Chair Mike Reese, Senate Insurance Chair Kirk Talbot and Senate Finance Chair Bodi White.

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**Stormwater Management is the Solution** 

Louisiana can solve its litter & flooding problems

The Louisiana Stormwater Coalition is an all-volunteer, grassroots group advocating for permanently funded stormwater management programs to help solve Louisiana's litter and flooding problems.

Louisiana is most often #1 in rainfall. If we don't strive to be #1 in stormwater management, we will continue to have flooding and litter issues.

The first step to funding stormwater management is to declare stormwater a utility like 41 other states. This will give small towns and cities that have litter and flooding problems a local option to permanently fund a stormwater management program. It's not a mandate; it's a local choice.

What begins as litter reduction turns into programs that prevent flooding and improve water quality.

When litter from the streets enters the watersheds and mixes with organic sediments, storm drains and canals get clogged and "litter dams" and impermeable flood-causing layers are created that cost millions to remove.

Cities across the U.S. implement and fund stormwater management programs that provide the equipment, dedicated personnel and public-private partnerships to remediate litter and flooding. These stormwater programs bring in millions for other cities to properly manage and sustain stormwater management programs. Furthermore, these program make cities cleaner and safer – increasing the economies, improving the environments and increasing quality of life.

Louisiana needs a two-pronged stormwater management approach to reduce litter and prevent flooding.

It's time for Louisiana to pivot. It's time for action.

# **POLITICAL CHATTER**

• TUESDAY'S TOP #LaLEGE STORY: Lawmakers heard recommendations today from the Edwards Administration on how \$2.8 billion in one-money could be spent. There are as many moving pieces as there are dollars, and the competition during the regular session will be fierce. The short-term fiscal picture is so flush that the state may actually rub up against the spending cap. (If so, the cap can always be suspended.)

- MAJOR STORYLINES: Conservatives from rural areas voiced concerns about some of the administration's big ticket items, like a \$500 million jumpstart on a new Mississippi River bridge in Baton Rouge. Speaker **Clay Schexnayder** did not. "Building an additional bridge to reduce I-10 congestion is one of many critical and muchneeded investments in infrastructure, and it has my full support," he said. Other proposals, like a \$1,500 pay bump for public school teachers, prompted different worries from the GOP. Most notably, Schexnayder and others publicly questioned whether the state could afford such a pay raise in the longterm. "Without a doubt, our teachers deserve more," said Schexnayder. "However, before we can commit to a pay raise, we need to ensure we have the necessary recurring revenue to ensure this is a permanent raise and that we are not misleading them with a one-time bonus." The \$38.6 billion executive budget presentation also detailed an additional \$104 million next fiscal year for higher ed.

- **REDISTRICTING COMETH**: There will be no shortage of local, state and national politics on display, beginning with election speculation over the two people leading the process: Senate and Governmental Affairs Chair **Sharon Hewitt** and House and Governmental Affairs Chair **John Stefanski**. Both are being urged to run for statewide office Stefanski for attorney general and Hewitt for governor but first they'll have to endure the mapping mayhem to come...
- PAC FILING CHANGES: "At their open meeting last week, federal campaign finance watchdogs agreed to a minor yet long overdue change that will save PAC registrants some paperwork in the future. The FEC approved a motion from Chair Allen Dickerson to amend the agency's Form 1 for statements of organization to allow a committee to file as a super PAC or a hybrid PAC within the form." (More in *Politico*)
- **HISTORY**: When viewed through the long lens of history, it's clear that Louisiana lawmakers have a fondness for making changes to how and when they meet in legislative sessions...
- **THEY SAID IT**: "(Pierre) knows what he did." —*Speaker Clay* **Schexnayder**, when asked why Rep. Vincent Pierre was removed as transportation chair, in The Advocate (Pierre said he does not know)
