20 DAYS TO GO

June 6 is coming in hot

You know the end is near when the governor begins endorsing bills.

That's what Gov. **John Bel Edwards** started doing today — signing his first batch of bills from the regular session. Roughly a dozen or so low-profile measures received his seal of approval, with more awaiting further review on his desk.

At the same time, Senate leaders spent the day preparing for the session's big budget bills, which will be heard on the floor tomorrow afternoon. Senators want to get their amendments squared away and the bills back to the House as soon as possible. (That will allow lawmakers to address any possible vetoes from the governor while they're still in session.)

On the other side of Memorial Hall, in the House, representatives advanced one of the more controversial instruments of the session — SB 44 by Sen. **Beth Mizell**, or the Fairness in Womens Sports Act. <u>The vote was 72-21</u>, with 12 members absent. Transgender athletes would be prohibited from participating in girls' sports, according to the bill, which generated an emotional debate today.

Another emotional issue on the move involves abortion policies. The House Health and Welfare Committee passed two bills this morning: SB 342 by Sen. **Katrina Jackson** to increase certain criminal penalties for abortion providers, if Roe v. Wade is overturned, and SB 388 by Sen. **Sharon Hewitt** to ban out-of-state prescribers from providing patients with abortion-inducing meds.

With just 20 days remaining in the regular session, these controversial and emotional social issues are headed for final passage or conference committees right alongside the main budget bills. Luckily, lawmakers have prioritized the latter, which will leave plenty of time for everything else.

POLITICAL CHATTER

- **BILLS THAT PASSED**: SB 418 by Sen. **Stewart Cathey** to repeal the state's "Raise the Age" law, and allow law enforcement to send 17-year-olds to adult detention, passed the Senate 29-8 today... HB 774 by Rep. **Cedric Glover** to make certain marijuana-related convictions easier to expunge was also advanced by the House 78-19... HB 427 by Rep. **Beryl Amedee** to strengthen parental confirmation rules for vaccines at schools was approved by the House too, by a vote of 65-31... The House likewise gave an 81-6 vote to HB 31 by Rep. **Phillip Tarver**, a constitutional amendment to use nonrecurring revenue for supplemental pay...
- BILLS THAT DIDN'T PASS: HB 747 and HB 1014 by Rep. Ray Garofalo, two bills that sought to address critical race theory, were involuntarily deferred by the House Education Committee... Falling one vote shy of passage in the House today was HB 29 by Rep. Richard Nelson, a constitutional amendment to apply surplus dollars automatically to unfunded accrued liability...
- **RESIGNED**: Rep. **Danny McCormick** resigned from the House Civil Law Committee this week and questioned the chair's ethics because he felt members weren't taking one of his bills seriously. The bill in question sought to allow the state of Louisiana to ignore the highest court in the American judicial system on matters related to one case.
- **HIRED**: **Tyler M. Bosworth**, the legislative analyst for the House Natural Resources Committee, has been hired as the new advocacy director for the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana.
- TREASURER ON AUDIT: Treasurer John Schroder released the following comments on the latest audit report on the Main Street Recovery Grant Program, which has provided \$262 million in federal pandemic relief dollars to more than 20,000 Louisiana business owners: "At the program's inception, the industry standard for governmental programs was a 7 percent fraud and waste rate. When selecting a vendor, we were adamant that the program's fraud and

waste rate would be no more than 3 percent. By design, we worked with Legislative Auditor's office, embedding them in the program and thereby enabling us to respond promptly as fraud was detected. This collaboration contributed to our reduced overall fraud rate of 1.32 percent. We continue to aggressively pursue the fraudsters. Industry averages told us to expect expected thefts of \$8 million. Instead, we minimized fraud to \$1.1 million and have recovered more than \$400,000 to date. We did not compromise speed or efficiency. I refuse to punish the 98.7 percent with unnecessary of bureaucratic red tape to stop the 1.32 percent."

- URGING CAUTION: Treasurer John Schroder also released a statement this week advising the Legislature to be cautious about increasing recurring expenditures based on the additional money recognized by the Revenue Estimating Conference. "Three of the next four fiscal years will have a decrease in revenue according to the REC, and the State General Fund Five-Year Forecast shows deficits approaching \$700 million by FY 26," Schroder said. "Reductions of that magnitude would largely fall on higher education and health care to balance the budget... Excess funds should be used in a manner that will reduce future state budget pressures when revenue inevitably decreases. The .45 sales tax rolls off in FY 26. If we don't plan for that now, we will have some deep cuts."
- POLICE WEEK: Congresswoman Julia Letlow and Mississippi Congressman Michael Guest have introduced a resolution to recognize National Police Week and pay tribute to the 619 officers, including 10 Louisianans, who have made the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty over the past year.
- IN THE COURTS: Via AG PR: "Louisiana Attorney General Jeff Landry has joined Connecticut Attorney General William Tong and other state attorneys general in two amicus briefs defending affordable drug prices before the United States Courts of Appeals for the Third Circuit and District of Columbia."
- **MEETING TOMORROW**: Lt. Gov. **Billy Nungesser**, as chairman, will lead tomorrow's meeting of the Governor's Special Committee for the Anti-Litter Task Force. With 26 members, the committee is preparing a report of recommendations and accomplishments since the initiative began earlier this year. The meeting begins at 9 am at the Capitol Park Museum.

Our History (Circa 1960s)

The Number of Senators in Lafayette

Just to show us once again there are truly no new issues at the Capitol, our friends at the State Archives dipped into the William A. Delgado Collection for <u>a clip</u> that dates back to the mid 1960s, but sounds like it could have been recorded this year.

That's because the interview with late state Sen. **Dudley "Coozan Dud" LeBlanc** focused partly on a big feud that was brewing amongst Acadiana lawmakers over the number of Senate seats that should be assigned to Lafayette.

Of course, a similar conversation was had during this year's redistricting process, as lawmakers from Iberia, Lafayette, St. Martin and other parishes jockeyed to redraw the latest Senate map.

This week's clip, which features similar chatter from Coozan Dud, was likely filmed between the 1964 and 1965 regular sessions, when LeBlanc chaired a committee that oversaw redistricting activities.
