## LONDON CALLING

# JBE follows Saints across the pond

Gov. **John Bel Edwards** and a "delegation of business and state leaders" will fly to London tomorrow for a multi-day "economic development mission" that just so happens to coincide with Sunday's matchup in Tottenham Stadium pitting the Saints against the Minnesota Vikings.

The game is part of the National Football League's International Series. The London Mission, as delegation members are calling it, is part of the Edwards Administration's plan to address insurance issues, among other topics.

According to the Governor's Office, this will be the third international trip of Edwards' second term and the sixth of his governorship. (His most recent was a weeklong resiliency and economic development mission to the Netherlands and France.)

As for who's traveling with the governor, the delegation is said to consist of folks from Louisiana Economic Development, Louisiana Offshore Terminal Authority, Port of New Orleans, Port of South Louisiana and the Committee of 100.

After he arrives in London Thursday morning, the governor will meet with representatives from Lloyd's of London, the world's leading insurance marketplace, to explore a broad range of insurance-related topics.

Among the planned items of discussion: "current factors affecting insurance and reinsurance protection for companies doing business in Louisiana; legislative and regulatory changes that would improve the state's attractiveness to insurers and reinsurers; and how the risk modeling utilized in Lloyd's insurance marketplace impacts the state."

A press release also outlined some of the governor's schedule for Friday:

"The governor is scheduled to meet with top executives of Shell about its expanding portfolio of clean energy investments, including the conversion of its old Convent oil refinery to a renewable fuel plant. He will also meet with Cheniere Energy, the No. 1 liquefied natural gas producer in the U.S., about LNG market changes and what they mean for its Sabine Pass facility in Louisiana. He will meet with Linde, which merged with Praxair in 2018, about the shift to sustainability in its approach to industrial gas production and engineering. And he will meet with Drax, a renewable power generation company in the UK, about its wood pellet production operations in Louisiana."

- PCEJ PR: "Yesterday, Monday, September 26, 2022, the Power Coalition for Equity and Justice started an on the ground canvassing initiative in major cities like New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Shreveport, Alexandria and Lake Charles. The campaign is part of a statewide GOTV strategy currently underway ahead of the November 8, 2022 Primary Congressional election. In the beginning of September, PCEJ onboarded over 100 phone bankers and canvassers statewide to help register voters and educate about key ballot initiatives. The state chief legal officers slammed the proposed legislation by U.S. Senator Joe Manchin as a back-door attempt to impose the failed Clean Power Plan."
- CRT PR: "In an effort to ensure the safety of shrimp imported to the United States, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) says it

signed an agreement with Ecuador in August to share confidential information including inspection records, draft rulemaking and guidance, and other non-public documents. 'Our Louisiana shrimp processors have lobbied to improve the current inspection system to a more holistic approach where the burden is on the exporting country or company to prove its product is safe before it's exported to our country. In 2019, as chairman of the National Lieutenant Governors Association, I introduced a resolution calling for seafood inspection fees that would prevent other countries from selling cheaper and less safe seafood. As a result, we have successfully obtained funding for the FDA to adopt such a system,' said Lieutenant Governor **Billy Nungesser**."

#### **Our History:**

# The *I-Ain't-Done-Yet*Constitutional Amendment

This fall marks the 56th anniversary (Nov. 8, 1966) of the moment modern Louisiana governors were afforded the opportunity for a second, subsequent term in office thanks to nothing more than constitutional law.

Prior to the late 1960s, governors were confined to a single four-year term in office — unless they wanted to sit out an election cycle and attempt a comeback, much like late Govs. **Earl K. Long** and **Jimmie Davis**.

But it was late Gov. **John McKeithen** who paved the way for the possibility of two terms back-to-back, like those later enjoyed by Govs. **Edwin Edwards**, **Mike Foster**, **Bobby Jindal** and **John Bel Edwards**.

McKeithen made his push for "Amendment 1" in 1966, as his first term was concluding. He convinced the Legislature to send the proposal to voters and immediately announced his re-election campaign, should the concept gain favor.

The amendment ultimately passed on Nov. 8, 1966, following an allout electoral war. Opponents included former Gov. Davis and then-Congressman **Gillis Long**, but they were outworked by supporters like the AFL-CIO and most of Louisiana's major newspapers. Roughly a year later, in the fall of 1967, freshman Congressman **John Rarick**, an Indiana transplant who called St. Francisville home, attempted to capture the Democratic nomination, but McKeithen's country politics and trademark "Won't you 'hep me?" won voters over. Again.

When voters finally reached the general election in February of 1968, no gubernatorial runoff was required because Republicans failed to field a candidate to take on McKeithen.

This history feature was made possible by the office of Secretary of State Kyle Ardoin.
