

Called to Action: Collies Needed Immediate Rescue in New Mexico

Our Eastern New Mexico contact received a call on Friday, August 28, 2020. A collie breeder had suddenly died and the extended family wanted the breeder's dogs taken into rescue promptly. The situation was changing moment to moment all day Saturday, as the family waivered about which dogs they would keep, and which they would surrender.

Kathy Wallis mobilized volunteers and vehicles to drive out to the property. In the end, SWCS Rescue volunteers picked up four adult dogs (one male and three females) and three puppies (one is a blind double-dilute). The dogs appear skittish and not well socialized.



All the animals will be kept in a boarding kennel for a few days while they are checked for health and dental issues They will need to be neutered/spayed, to receive vaccinations, and to be tested for heartworms. The dogs will then be assigned to foster homes.

Please be patient while we assess this situation. We will send out another newsletter with an update, in the next 10 -12 days.

As you might imagine, this operation needs your support to pay for boarding and veterinary bills. Any amount of donation is greatly appreciated.





Can you give us a home? Please?



We were recently saddened to hear of the passing of our long-time supporter, Roger Woodle. Our thoughts are with Roger's family at this time.

Our volunteer Kathleen knew him well and shared some memories with us:

I was in 5th grade when the school's music teacher, Roger Woodle, introduced me to strings. My parents rented me my first violin that year. I played in high school in Rogers' showcase 'Strolling Violins' group and I went on to play with several college symphonies.

My own experiences as a violinist, and the time I taught so many others to play as he had taught me, are among the fondest memories of my life.

Roger had always told me that he missed having a dog, and that when things slowed down, he would talk to me about getting one. He eventually submitted an application to SW Collie and Sheltie Rescue. A few days later he stopped by my house for a visit (we lived only a few blocks apart).

Ah, Fate! I was fostering a sheltie named Bo at the time. Roger came into my living room, and that little dog made a beeline up over the couch, perched himself on the back of the recliner, and put his paws on Roger. It seemed like they had been friends forever.

Rodger and Bo had been together for ages, and then a little tricolor Sheltie, Toby, came to SWCSR from a family in El Paso. Roger and Bo agreed to foster Toby, and soon Toby became a permanent member of the family.

Those two little dogs were Roger's constant companions after his wife died. He made it a point to always tell me when his SWCSR newsletter arrived in the mail, and he regularly donated to our rescue efforts. In addition, he sometimes provided his minivan to us so we could do a rescue transport.

Roger was 90 when he passed away this summer. He was a composer, arranger, and talented musician. His passion for music - and his love for his Shelties - are an inspiration to many.
