

A picture is worth a thousand words, right? So without a bunch of words, we can still tell the stories of the dogs from SW Collie-Sheltie Rescue.



He followed us everywhere. Into the bathroom, into the kitchen, made circles around the table during every meal, and waited at the bottom of the stairs each morning as we came down.

He was our shadow. I can not think of a time when he was ever home alone, and that makes me happy for him. We loved him. The house feels incredibly empty now...we can sense that a soul is missing."

### The Ambassador by Kathy Wallis

About twelve years ago, I was finishing up my first year with SWCR as a volunteer. A pretty tri-colored rough boy came in from a family in Hobbs. They had said Ziggy was too rough with their smaller dogs. I fostered Ziggy and quickly discovered he was a happy and exuberant guy.

Soon after, Ziggy and I were at the dog park. While watching Ziggy romp around, I was approached by a retired gentleman. "Beautiful dog" he said to me while watching Ziggy. He introduced himself as Wayne Anderson. "He's a rescue, doesn't have a home yet. Where's your dog?" I asked. Wayne pointed down toward his feet, and sitting next to him was a pretty tri-colored Sheltie...who looked just like a miniature Ziggy.

The rest is history. Wayne submitted an application and was approved after a home visit. Ziggy was renamed **Duke** in memory of John Wayne, and became best buddies with Cody the Sheltie immediately.

That Collie brought Wayne into my circle of friends and thus allowed many great dogs to be fostered here in our area. Duke became one of our Collie Rescue ambassadors, attending adoption events, parades, and so forth. Duke is also the Collie Celebrity who appears in the Grooming the Collie video posted on YouTube and the SWCSR website.

This morning, Tim and I accompanied Wayne and Duke to Dr Miller's office, where we helped Duke ease out of his struggle with old age. Duke was almost 13 years old; Wayne has chosen a nice spot for Duke on the property. It's been a difficult day for all of us.

## **Been Waiting a While?**

In 2020, SWCSR adopted out 21 collies and 20 shelties. As you might imagine, during the pandemic we have had many, many more adoption applications than we have dogs. Most of these applicants are very qualified people, with extensive prior history with the breeds. This has created a strong demand, even for our loveable seniors.

The practical result is that when we adopt out a dog, we make one adopter very happy, and then we have many disappointed applicants.

In response, the Board has to manage expectations and to focus our program on good outcomes; we need to reduce our incoming applications. We have decided, with rare exceptions, to only accept applicants in Arizona, New Mexico, and West Texas. This practice of 'staying in territory' is currently used in many other rescues, so there is precedent for it.

Also under consideration by the Board: maintaining applications on file for only a limited period of time (perhaps six months). We find that applicants waiting for extended periods often tend to find dogs from other sources. How to update and notify applicants is a process still in development.

In summary, we sympathize with your desire to own one of our wonderful shelties or collies. We remain vigilant for at-risk collies and shelties, and continue to help all the collies and shelties that we can.

If you find a rescue sheltie or collie from another source and SWCSR can assist you in securing that dog, please let us know. We can perform a required home visit, for example, and SWCSR may be able to assist with transport. Our goal is to help the breeds survive and thrive, and to that end we are willing to do the work.

We wish to thank you for your continued enthusiasm for these breeds and your support of our operations.
