But when she saw Casper, her heart instantly wanted to take him home and love him.



In May, we took a senior rough collie from the Maricopa County Animal Control on a medical release. The dog had obvious eye issues as well as generalized muscle loss, dental disease, and a matted coat. An eye specialist confirmed that this dog had Collie Eye Anomaly; essentially, his eyes had never fully developed. At most he might only see light and shadows.

His foster mom, Amy, worked with him and actively helped to market this loyal and sweet guy.

Ultimately, we found a generous couple willing to adopt him and to continue his recovery. **Ranger** has moved to a loving home and adopters Laura and Steve say he is adjusting well.

She came to us in spring, a sorely neglected senior collie. **Tess** had an infection in her mouth that had spread throughout her head. There were other problems too, but we quickly addressed them. Soon Tess was adopted and thrilled to be on a morning walk each day. Her coat was coming back and she was making friends. By autumn she was gone - struck down by a sudden stroke. Though the loss was painful, we are proud we made her final months happy and comfortable.
