In January at the annual AKL Presidents Academy event in Indianapolis, we learned that Delta chapter was awarded AKL Chapter of the Year for its outstanding performance across all criteria. This is obviously an incredible honor that was earned by our men over the past several years of successive work.

Later that month, a fire suppressor valve burst in the attic causing a tremendous amount of water damage throughout the chapter house. Due to the quick response from the men in the house, we were able to mitigate the damage to the best of our abilities. All repair work has been substantially completed as of this writing; however, the new hardwood floors on the main level and in the House Director suite will be replaced this summer.

In March, we learned that AKL's Delta chapter won awards in several different categories at the annual Sorority & Fraternity Life awards banquet. This suggests the strategic "Team"-centric organizational partnership between the alumni board advisors and the chapter leaders and their teams provides a foundation for our continued success.

During that same month, we mourned the passing of brother AJ McDonald, who suffered fatal injuries as part of a skiing accident while on Spring Break with several of his AKL brothers. As you can imagine, this tragic event was devastating for all involved.

It is not only during our best times that we enjoy the true spirit of fraternal brotherhood; rather it can come from our worst times. I am very proud of the tremendous leadership demonstrated by of our chapter president, Lance Weigel and his Executive Board along with the time, energy and resources provided by our alumni board in working together to navigate our way through this challenging season.

The platform and group are free to join and will help our members, students and alumni, connect with and support one another in the career development space.

It is simple to join:

- Visit mentoring.ku.edu and create a free profile using an email address. Current KU students can use their single sign-on to create a profile. Alumni should use a work or personal email account and are usually approved within 24 hours.
- During the sign-up process new users will be asked to answer questions about educational and work history. New users will also be asked to choose from a list of help topics they are willing to discuss with other Jayhawks. Please create a detailed profile (including professional photo), because detailed information helps students and other alumni best identify the Jayhawks with the right expertise and experiences to help them with specific questions and needs that they have.

Once approved, explore the platform. Visit:

- Career > Jobs to see the job board (please note the majority of positions on this job board are for experienced job seekers. Students looking for work or internships should visit hirejayhawks.com).
- Career > Career Paths for detailed information on the skills, common levels of education, personalities, and work responsibilities associated with specific industry areas. The platform will also suggest individuals you might want to network with and open job positions within the industry you are exploring.
- Connect > Community to search and filter for the nearly 10,000 KU alumni (and growing) on the platform. You can use location, industry, help topic, and dozens of other filters to search for the right fit for your networking and mentoring needs.

Alumni Spotlight



John Yorke Delta '62

John Yorke, an accomplished alumnus and proud accounting major, has lived a life defined by service, leadership, and lifelong connections. After graduating, he attended law school at the University of Kansas, but his path took an unexpected turn when he was drafted to serve in the Vietnam War. Following his military service, John began an impressive 34-year career headlined at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, where his legal expertise and dedication led him through a series of key management roles.

Initially working in the trust, consumer law and lending function, John's journey took him to Denver and back to Kansas City, where he rose to the position of senior vice president at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City. His work frequently brought him to major cities across the country, including New york, Washington, D.C., Boston, San Francisco and Chicago, reflecting the scope and importance of his responsibilities. Along the way, he participated in various advanced education programs to expand his skills and knowledge (including degrees from Northwestern and Rutgers).

Even after retirement, John continued to make a global impact. He provided valuable expertise to the Philippines Central Bank, and served as the President and CEO of the Economic Club of Kansas City. He remains active through volunteer work, especially his involvement with abused children through CASA (court appointed special advocates), a cause he is still deeply committed to.

John's dedication extends to his fraternity, Alpha Kappa Lambda, where he has served on the board since 1999. During his time in the fraternity, he experienced the importance of diversity and inclusion, as their house became one of the first to welcome an African American brother. The fraternity was also rich in culture, filled with talented musicians, and even had a piano and harp in the house.

Perhaps one of the most enduring aspects of john's story is the lifelong friendships he forged during his time at AKL. Since 1971, a group of friends has reunited every Fourth of July and New Year's Eve, a testament to the strength of their bond.

John Yorke's story is a powerful reminder to be open to new adventures, welcome new people, and never stop learning. His message to current members in the house is to stay curious, and take full advantage of the college and fraternity experience.

The Alpha Kappa Lambda Delta Chapter at the University of Kansas strives to build upon a tradition of excellence and leadership. We implement these ideals into all chapter operations through scholarship, philanthropy, community service, brotherhood and social events while providing leadership opportunities for all men.

This semester posed one of the biggest challenges imaginable. Over Spring Break, we had to say goodbye to one of our brothers, AJ McDonald. During his Exec Board role as Chaplain and Brotherhood Team leader, AJ made a tremendous impact on anyone he would come into contact with. He had the ability to lighten up any room and he is greatly missed. Times like this are when brotherhood is needed most. As a chapter, we have been able to lean on each other as well as receive support from parents, and the alumni board.

At the annual AKL Leadership Academy held in January, we were honored to be recognized as the AKL Chapter of the year. This award is given to the chapter that best demonstrates the Five Ideals and is the highest honor an AKL chapter can receive across the nation.

This year, we were able to open up our new finished basement and expand our housing numbers from 60 to 62 men located at 1505 Sigma Nu Place. Our new basement consists of a pickleball court, pool table, table tennis, foosball, and a poker table. You will also find 3 TV's and a finished bar. We are finishing up our exercise room and plan to have that done this summer. Our house director, Sara Russell, and house manager, Evan Bannister do a phenomenal job of upkeeping and decorating the house to make it feel like more of a home.

Led by our newly elected Philanthropy Team Leader, Liam Mitchell, AKL was able to raise a total of \$3,500 for These Hands Don't Hurt, Pancreatic Cancer Research, and the Special Olympics of Kansas. These efforts have come from multiple percentage nights at nearby restaurants, a "Polar Plunge" for the Special Olympics, and our big event, Pancakes for Pancreatic Cancer.

The chapter welcomed 7 new members this Spring thanks to the efforts of our recruitment team. Led by AJ Payton, Ian Coe, Andrew Murray, and Sam Koenen, the Recruitment Team is looking to add 30 new members in the Fall to maximize our live-in capacity at 67 men

Kansas Special Olympics

In February, AKL supported the Kansas Special Olympics with 18 members participating in its "Polar Plunge" event at Lawrence High School.
