



# SOPHIE AND THE SOIL DATA ADVENTURE

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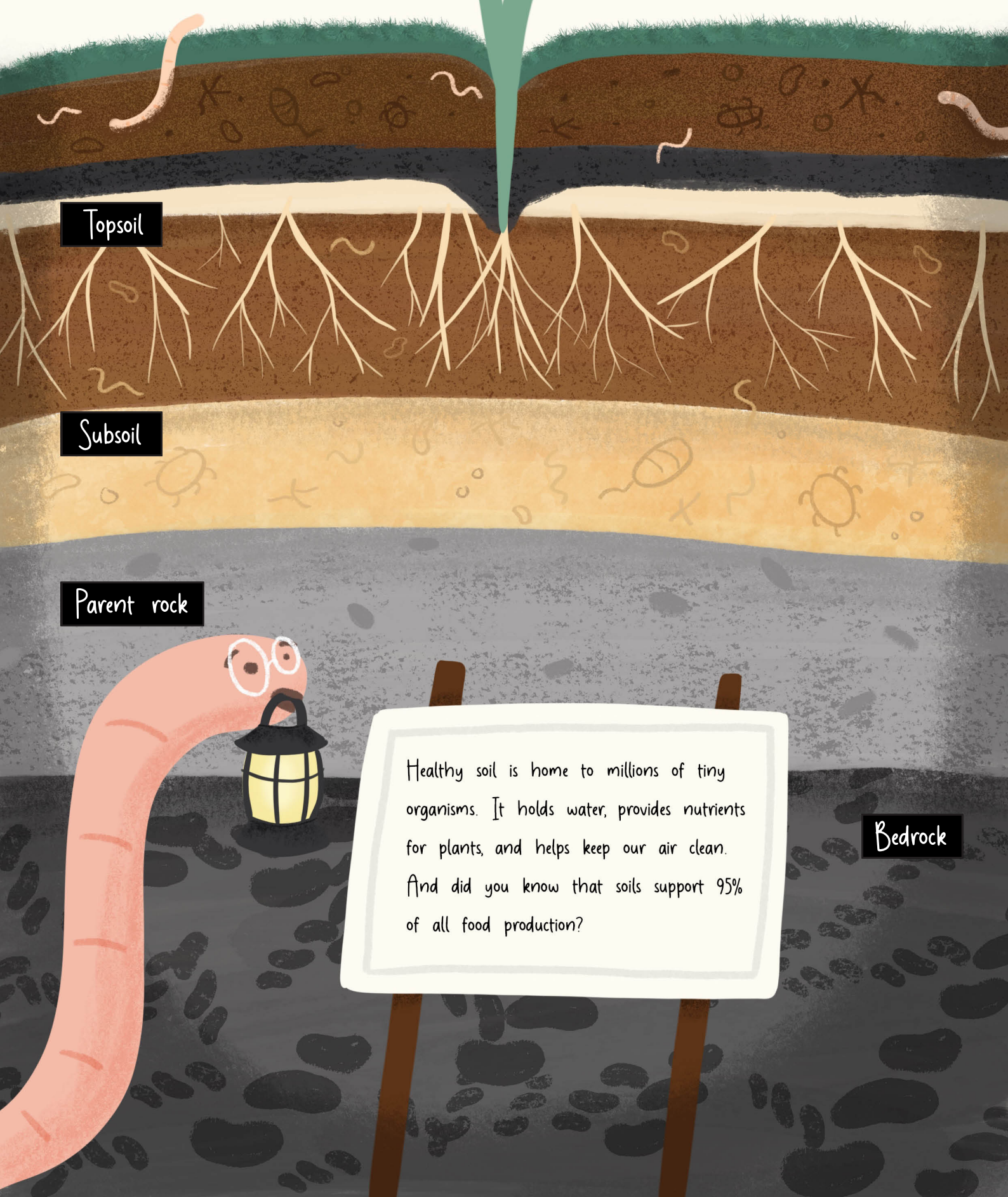

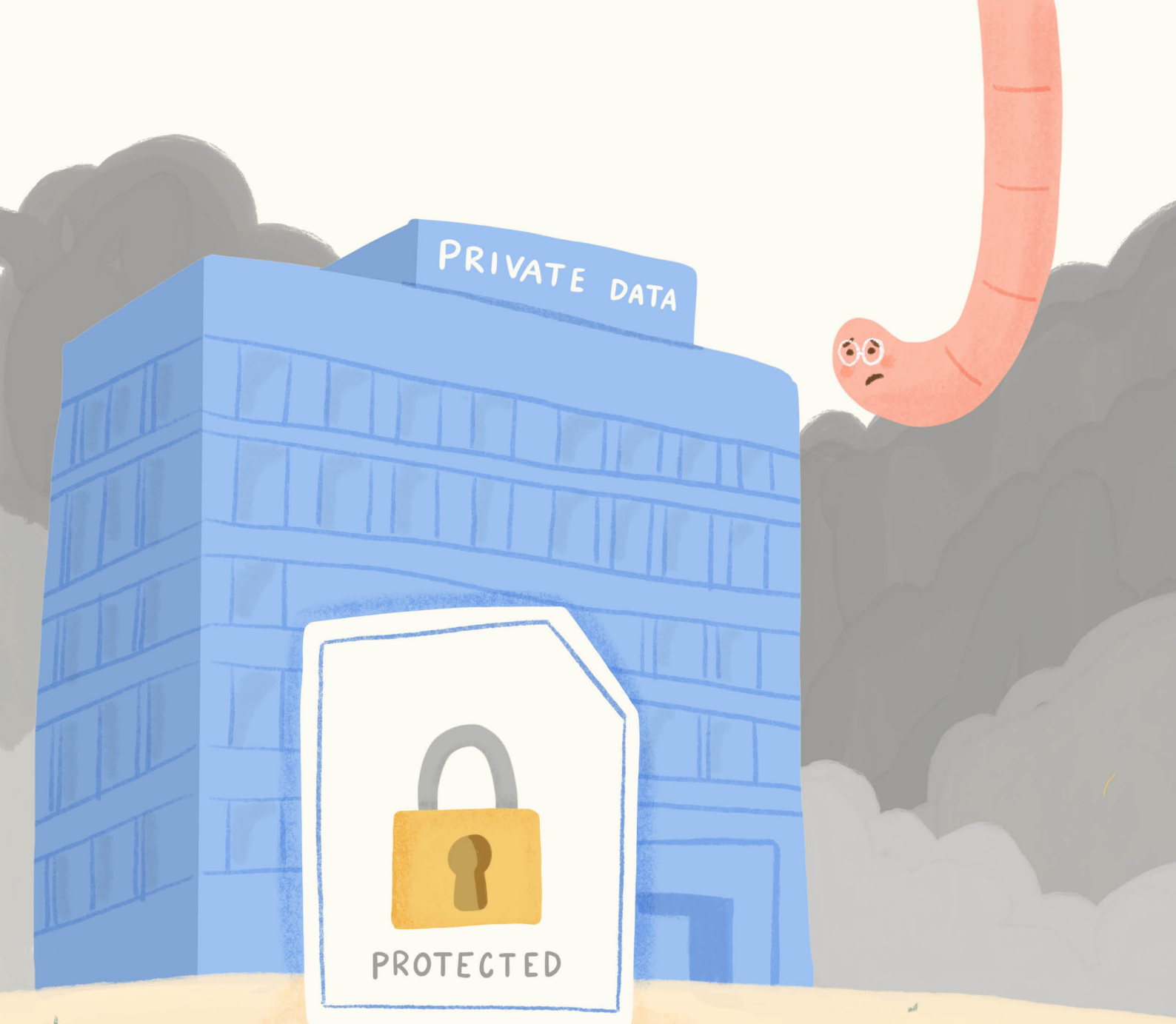

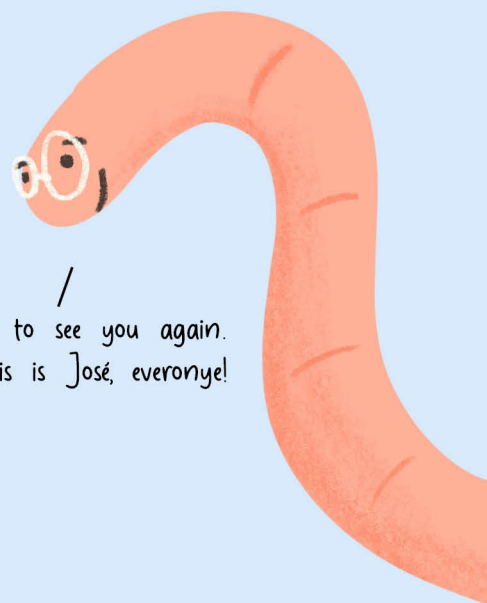
“Unfortunately, not everyone plays fair,” Wig-
