Executive Actions Under a Stein Administration

1. Climate and Environmental Policy

- **Declare a National Climate Emergency** to reallocate federal resources.
- Invoke the Defense Production Act to promote renewable energy production.
- End Fossil Fuel Subsidies through executive orders.
- Ban New Fossil Fuel Infrastructure (e.g., pipelines) and halt fracking through EPA regulations.
- Block LNG Exports and Offshore Drilling Leases.

2. Foreign Policy and Military Reform

- Withdraw U.S. Troops from Conflicts Abroad and reduce global troop presence.
- Cut Military Spending by canceling Pentagon programs through executive discretion.
- End Arms Sales to countries involved in human rights abuses (e.g., Israel, Saudi Arabia).
- Refocus Diplomacy toward non-interventionism and multilateral conflict resolution.

3. Justice Department Reforms

- Investigate Police Departments for civil rights abuses through the DOJ.
- End Federal Use of Private Prisons by canceling contracts.
- Decriminalize Non-Violent Drug Offenses by deprioritizing federal prosecution.
- Stop Civil Asset Forfeiture Programs to reduce police militarization.
- Block Military Equipment Transfers to police departments.

4. Immigration Policy

- Halt Deportations using prosecutorial discretion through the DOJ and DHS.
- Limit Cooperation with ICE by instructing federal agencies to reduce detainment efforts.
- End Use of Title 42 and restore access for asylum seekers.

5. Antitrust Enforcement

- Initiate Antitrust Lawsuits against Big Tech monopolies like Google, Amazon, and Meta.
- Investigate Media and Telecom Monopolies to promote net neutrality.
- Block Mergers in healthcare and pharmaceuticals to lower costs.
- Challenge Agribusiness Monopolies for exploiting workers and harming the environment.

6. Environmental Justice

- **Prosecute Polluters** through the DOJ's Environmental Division.
- **Investigate Environmental Racism** with federal oversight into discriminatory corporate practices.
- Strengthen EPA Regulations on air and water quality to protect public health.

7. Reparations for Descendants of Black Slaves

- Establish a Federal Commission on Reparations by executive order, if HR 40 fails to pass Congress.
- Redirect Military and Police Funds toward education, housing, and healthcare programs for Black communities.
- **Direct DOJ to Investigate Stolen Black Wealth** and litigate cases involving historic land theft, housing discrimination, and economic exploitation.
- Return Federal Lands to Black descendants where applicable.
- Use the Bully Pulpit to Build Coalitions with civil rights organizations, grassroots movements, and public allies to pressure Congress for reparative legislation.
- **Issue a Formal Federal Apology** for slavery, Jim Crow, and systemic racial oppression to build national momentum.

8. Executive Actions to Protect Abortion Access

• Executive Orders Expanding Access to Medication Abortion

- The president can instruct the FDA to ensure access to abortion pills (like mifepristone) through telemedicine and pharmacies across states, even where bans exist.
- Push for abortion pills to be made available by mail, countering state-level restrictions.

Federal Use of Public Lands for Clinics

- Federal facilities (like VA hospitals, military bases, and national parks) could potentially offer abortion services in restrictive states.
- This would face legal challenges but could act as a temporary measure to provide access.

Direct Federal Agencies to Support Reproductive Rights

- Direct the **Department of Justice (DOJ)** to file lawsuits against state-level abortion bans that violate the right to travel for medical care or infringe on bodily autonomy.
- The DOJ could also prosecute individuals or organizations blocking access to clinics under the Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances (FACE) Act.

• Leverage the Hyde Amendment Loopholes

- Although the Hyde Amendment restricts federal funds for abortions, a president could use discretionary funds to support **travel costs** and logistical assistance for those seeking abortion care in other states.
- The **Department of Health and Human Services (HHS)** could expand access through programs like Title X to offer contraceptive and abortion-related care.

• Defense Against Legal Challenges to Abortion Access

 The president can instruct the Solicitor General to defend legal challenges in court to protect abortion access. This is critical in navigating lawsuits challenging state laws post-Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization.

• Establish Federal Protections for Data Privacy in Reproductive Health

 Direct the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to limit how tech companies collect and share location and health data, protecting those seeking abortion care from surveillance and prosecution by anti-abortion states.
