and sitting as a Board in the City of Los Angeles in which petition he claimed the confirmation of his title to a tract of land known by

the name of Mission of San Fernando containing fourteen square leagues situated in the County of Los Angeles and State aforesaid

land claim being founded on a Mexican deed of grant to the petitioner made on the 17th day of June, 1846, by Pio Pico then Constitutional Governor of the Department of the Californias

And whereas the Board of Land Commissioners aforesaid on the 3rd day of July 1855 rendered a decree of confirmation in favor of the claimant,

which decree or decision having been taken by appeal to the District Court of the United States for the Southern District of California and the Attorney General of the United States having given notice that appeal would not be prosecuted in the cause entitled "Eulogio de Celis appellant vs The United States appellant" the said District Court on the 15th day of March, 1855 in
