

KNOXVILLE, Iowa (July 6, 2024) - Scott Bogucki won an electric feature Saturday at the Nolan Wren Memorial Presented by Higher View Enterprise, Inc. at the Knoxville Raceway. The driver from McLaren Vale in South Australia shot by Aaron Reutzel coming

for the white flag to win \$6,000 aboard the Liebig Motorsports #10. Sawyer Phillips nailed down the 360 main event. It was the fourth win in the class for the Pleasantville, Iowa native, but the first in seven years. Altoona's Chase Young won for the second time this year in the Pro Sprints class, and

Brown and went flat. Coolest corner in town

Reutzel shot out on the restart on the high side and cruised by Zomer in turn three to take the lead. Kelby Watt spun with a flat tire five laps in to set up another restart. Bogucki jumped at the chance to move by Zomer into second on lap seven, and Gio Scelzi and Rico Abreu moved into the top five on lap eight. Scelzi continued his strong run on the high side, grabbing third from Zomer with nine to go.

Bogucki reeled in Reutzel as the pair entered traffic with four to go, but could not make the pass. Things really jammed up with two to go, as Scelzi joined the battle for the lead. Coming for the white flag, Bogucki made his winning move on

the fourth time in his career. Dusty Zomer led lap one of the 20-lap 988 Lifeline 410 A main ahead of Reutzel, Sawyer Phillips, Brian Brown and Austin McCarl. Bogucki quickly moved into third and fourth before Kaleb Johnson stopped with a throttle problem four laps in. At the same time, Brown relinquished his third place run when his right rear tire

> Phillips held off Higday to take the win, with Ball, Leavitt and Clint Garner trailing. Ryan Giles, Riley Beaver, Goodno, Joe Kaleb Johnson and Cam Martin completed the top ten. Reutzel set quick time over the 35-car field. Ball, Martin, Christopher Thram and Beaver won heats. Timothy Smith won the B main. Ben Brown crashed in hot laps. He was uninjured, but done for the night.

"It was a busy week in the shop," said Phillips, who crashed hard here a week ago. "The 360 has had speed and I've really qualified well

the last two years, we just haven't been able to race well. I just wish I could have been able to race Reutzel for that win. He's the best in the 360 right now, and I was looking forward to racing him for the win."

The 15-lap Pro Sprints feature went non-stop. Chase Young took the lead from the start from the pole, ahead of Mike Mayberry, Brandon Worthington, Rob Kubli and J Kinder, who advanced from tenth on lap one. Kubli snagged third from Worthington on lap

Young was into lapped traffic on lap eleven, and that's when Kinder went into action. He passed for fourth with four to go, third with two to go and used the high side to move by Mayberry coming for the white flag into second.

Young maintained his advantage to seal the \$800 prize. Kinder, Mayberry, Kubli and Worthington followed. AJ Johnson, Josh Jones, Matt Allen, Devin Kline and Toby Mosher completed the top ten. Allen set quick time for the sixth straight week, tying Jerry Hayes (1960) for that honor. Koddy Hildreth and Kinder won the heats.

"You were going to have to go around me," said Young of his drive. "I was going to hold the bottom as tight as possible. We were the last car out there, because in the heat race, we had zero brakes. We got lucky with the invert (four) for once. We spent the whole time changing the caliper and changing the brakes. We really didn't get a chance to work on the car.'





July Nature Notes: And..It's Summer

Can you believe it is already July? The sporadic weather has so many of us confused, but always be certain, nature will do its "thing". Enjoy the magnificent insects this month. The prairies are blooming, and the flowers will be dancing with butterflies and amazing insects!

July's full Buck Moon will appear on July 21, 2024. This moon is called The Buck Moon because the antlers of male deer (bucks) are in full-growth mode. They are magnificent to see all covered in velvet. According to the Almanac, there are several other names given to the month's Moon, including the Feather Molting Moon and the Salmon Moon. There are so many names given to this

moon that reference animals, plants, and weather.

Most songbirds nested and fledged except Iowa's State bird that waits until late July to early August to nest. Their cupshaped nest is made of many plant fibers, thistle down, spider webs, and caterpillar web strands. Their favorite food sources are seeds that come from flowers that we call composites (the head of the flower brings together several tiny florets, so that they look like just one large flower). These types of flowers become more abundant in the late summer, such as sunflowers, coneflowers, asters, chicory, ironweed, black-eved Susan's, and goldenrod.

The young bald eagles of the year are being seen

trying out their wings and hunting skills. For some, we call this the "toddler" stage, unpredictable and a little clumsy. It's great to see the eagle families out and about again.

The prairies will be bursting with color this month as the blazing star, pale-purple coneflowers, black-eyed Susan's, compass plants, and Rattlesnake master are swaying the prairie breeze.

The common milkweed bloomed heavily in June, the purple milkweeds, butterfly weed, whorled and swamp milkweed are, or will be blooming soon within the prairies and roadsides. Monarch eggs and caterpillars are continuing into their second generation. Numerous insect species, and hummingbirds can be found around all types of milkweed.

The buttonbush and wild bergamot will be teaming with butterflies this month. These plants are amazing at attracting our beautiful insects.

Numerous butterflies are being spotted, and more will flourish with the summer flower bloom. Here is a list of some that have been located around the area and the banks of Red Rock: Black swallowtails, monarchs, buckeyes. painted ladies, red admirals, American ladies, orange sulphur, cabbage whites, summer azures. gray E.-tailed blues, coppers, viceroy, Great Spangled fritillaries, American snout, and numerous species of skippers.

National Moth Week will be July 20-28, 2024. Always a good time to explore nighttime nature. Visit a prairie area, or a large area with fragrant flowers to watch the White-lined sphinx moths, clearwings, and other beauties through the day!

Wetlands and surrounding areas are a great place to discover some of our most unique and ancient insects. Our real-life dragons and damsels are amazing insects that benefits the natural world and assist humans with valuable information about the environment. To begin with, the earliest fossils discovered from Upper Carboniferous (Pennsylvanian) sediments in Europe formed about 325 million years ago. The dragonflies and damselflies are a vital part of the aquatic food chain and are predators of mosquitoes and other pests. Spending much of their life under the water in a larval stage where it molts numerous times (approx. 6-15 times) the larvae development can vary from one to six years. Keeping track of some of the most interesting insects has been a big part of citizen science and has been most helpful in learning about climate change, dragonfly migration, and noting areas of thriving and/or declining species. And, most of all... they are just cool!

Oh! Don't forget to listen for the song of the annual cicadas in camouflage and keep watch over the fireflies! Enjoy your summer, more next month!

Water tower at former VA campus demolished

The skyline has again been altered on the west side of the city of Knoxville. The iconic baby blue water tower was torn down on Monday, July 01.

The original plan was to keep the water tower standing as a symbol of what once was. Knoxville Mayor Brian Hatch released a statement regarding the water tower.

"After many discussions with potential developers and contractors, it became clear that due to the condition and location of the water tower in relationship

to future development, it was in the best interest of the city and county to remove the water tower while we had an opportunity to do so. Just like the entire former campus area, it is always difficult to see pieces of our past removed, but it is important and exciting to focus on the new life and vibrancy that new development in that area will bring. I hope this first phase of housing, paired with the new splash pad park, serves as a perfect example of that new life."

Knoxville City Manager

Heather Ussery had this to say about the change of plans.

"It's just been more and more apparent that the remaining of the water tower doesn't fit with the overall future of our development. What might happen back there someday is still unknown at this time. Overall a non functioning water tower just doesn't make sense within that. It could be some large safety hazards at some point as well."






