

## INTRODUCTION FOR TODAY'S READINGS FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

**1 Samuel 16: 1, 6-7, 10-13** It is about 1000 B.C., 250 years after Moses brought God's people from slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. It took a long time for these people from different tribes to unify as a nation. The turning point came when David became their king. The story of how he was chosen is told in today's reading. Samuel was a venerable old prophet. Jesse was a resident of Bethlehem who had eight sons, the youngest being David.

**Ephesians 5: 8-14** Ephesus was located on the western coast of what today is Turkey. The Christians there existed in a society dominated by pagan values, which today's reading equates with darkness.

Things continue to change rapidly regarding how public authorities are responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. An increasing number of reported COVID-19 cases in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania have led public officials to discourage people from leaving their homes so as to prevent the further spread of the coronavirus. As of Thursday evening, March 19, all non-life-sustaining businesses in Pennsylvania are required to close their physical locations. Bishop Mark and the priests of our diocese are making the safety and wellbeing of parishioners a top priority. Please stay home as a way of avoiding COVID-19 for yourself and to keep from becoming an unwitting source of infection to others. This does not mean isolation. You are encouraged to contact one another through phones and other media, and you can still contact the parish office. But please limit your personal physical exposures.

## There will be no public Masses. Masses will continue to be celebrated privately every day by Fr. Alan.

Proclaim! will continue to air every Sunday at 10:30 a.m. on WATM ABC 23. The show will continue to be posted on the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown Facebook and Twitter social media platforms as well.

Bishop Mark will celebrate Sunday Masses, which will air every Sunday at 11:00 a.m. on WATM ABC 23 and at 9:00 p.m. on Atlantic Broadband Channel 9. The Masses will also be posted on the diocesan website and Facebook and Twitter social media platforms. Audio of the Liturgies will air Sundays at 10:00 a.m. on WFBG AM 1290. Also during this time, daily Mass, celebrated by Father Matthew Baum at Prince of Peace Parish in Northern Cambria, will be streamed on their parish website and the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown Facebook page.

## Fourth Sunday of Lent - Year A FR. ALAN'S REMOTE HOMILY

I find a certain similarity between our lives at present and the life of the man born blind about whom we hear in today's gospel. Jesus unexpectedly comes to him and things get turned upside down. That's sort of the case for us right now as well. Things are turned upside down. Who would have thought a week ago that we would be communicating in this fashion this weekend? Even a short week ago, at least for me, it was hard to imagine not having public Masses, curtailing all parish events, canceling penance services, and preparing to celebrate the most important liturgical events of our entire Church year privately! Who would have imagined? Who could have foreseen that Rome would not publicly celebrate Easter this year? Who could have imagined that we would be longing to have our lives back the way they were just a short week ago?

But, things have been turned upside down. Like the blindness that afflicted the man born blind, we would like to know the whole story about the virus that wages war with us. I think it is important to hear the Lord remind us that evil things, whether blindness or coronaviruses, are not easy to understand. What is easy is to lay blame—mistakenly—just like the disciples do. Evil is far more complex than we sometimes allow ourselves to believe.

It is important, I think, that we again hear for ourselves the Lord's words that even what we are going through right now is not meant for our destruction. Rather, our current dilemma is so that "the works of God might be made visible" through the hardship we are experiencing.

In the midst of our encounter with evil, we are asked again, "Who or what is the light of my life?" In whom do I trust? In whom do I seek liberation from evil? I am convinced that God's way is always one of bringing healing and peace, just as Jesus did for the blind man. I have faith that the Lord Jesus will also bring us healing and peace. In our case it may not involve washing in the pool of Siloam, but might be in seeking out appropriate medical care and making sure we do what we can to defend ourselves against this tiny viral menace.

This experience of physical liberation—physical healing, however, is only the beginning step. The Lord wishes to liberate us from the darkness of evil so that we might come to the full sight of his glory. This means affirming over and over again, and learning more deeply each time, that Jesus is Lord, the Christ, the One sent by the Father.

I think that we can expect our challenges to intensify over the next several weeks. It will be tempting to second-guess our civil authorities, political figures, and even our Church leaders. We may be afraid, just like the parents of the man born blind. However, if we endure in hope, we will find that, like the blind man who sees better than others, we too will have new insight into Christ and a far deeper trust in him.

I hope that today you will invite this Lord, the Christ, the Son of Man who turns things upside down, into your lives through a spiritual communion so that, when we at last can come together again in Eucharistic community, we will be ready to worship him with joy.

#### STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

The curing of the Blind Man gave hope to the community that they were deserving of God's love no matter what their circumstance. Reflect on the words of Pope Francis this week, "To protect creation, to protect every man and every woman, to look upon them with tenderness and love, is to open up a horizon of hope; it is to let a shaft of light break through the heavy clouds; it is to bring warmth of hope!" (Pope Francis, March 19, 2013) May I be the light in the darkness of this world by generously sharing my time, my talents, and all of my resources, in the name of Jesus.

#### FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

This Sunday, we continue in the Gospel of John with the story of the man born blind. It's an amazing story of reversal. The man who was born blind is able truly to see who Jesus really is.

Meanwhile, the ones who can physically see, who have all the Scriptures right in front of them, are completely blind to the reality of who Jesus is.

The man who was blind was completely dependent on others for nearly everything. He was a beggar, yet he had a personal encounter with Jesus Christ. He knew beyond any shadow of a doubt what had happened. He had encountered the true light of the world, and now he could see, and no one would be able to tell him different. Meanwhile, the leaders of the synagogue had decided that because Jesus didn't honor the Sabbath the way they expected, he couldn't be from God. They had become so blinded by their own personal way of looking at things that they missed the miracle right in front of them.

There's an old joke that if you want to make God laugh, tell him your future plans. Are we open to the very real possibility of our own blindness? When someone else tells me something happened that I have a hard time believing, does it cross my mind that they might have had different experiences than me, that my way of seeing the world might not be the only way? Am I open to the reality that I might be the blind one in need of the light of Jesus in my own heart and mind?
