## **Background**

I was born in Tacoma, WA Hilltop area in 1972 to a young mother Ruby Jean Guidry who had no support from her biological blood relatives. As she only had an older brother Louis Guidry in the State of Washington as he was married to an uncaring woman and her abusive family who made a relationship between the two brother and sister non existing. Having been denied by my biological father Walter White until March 4th 1990 when I gave birth to my only child Onteryo Guidry,

there was also no support from my biological father and his family.

My mother and I were left to the concrete jungle of the Hilltop to fend for herself with a child at the age of 15 yr of age, my mother and I lived a life of hardship and much difficulties surviving on public assistance. Shelter was provided by Juanita Butler (aka grandmother), Dale Moore (aka Aunt) and Willie Bryant (aka step father).

Due to my tough circumstances, I myself was not afforded the simpler things in life as a child, such as shelter and clothing. This included shirts, pants, shoes and socks. I relied on handouts and hand me downs. I attended Bryant Elementary, Jason Lee Jr High and Lincoln High school. Despite having worn out shoes, I still ran track for all three schools.

This brings me to why I am so passionate about my charity called Hilltops Ten Toes Down. I myself understand the hardship of not having your own anything. Shelter, food, clothing and family are not to be taken for granted. I learned early in life the importance of compassion and empathy and the support of others.
