

# “Thou Shalt Not Covet”: Its Spirit, Depth, and Understanding

To keep this commandment in spirit is to live in a state of deep, worshipful contentment, rejoicing in the prosperity of your neighbor while trusting that what the Creator has given you is perfectly sufficient for your journey.

*“Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry.” — Colossians 3:5*

*“But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain*

*we can carry nothing out. And having food and raiment let us be therewith content.” — 1 Timothy 6:6–8*

By killing the seed of envy, we validate His lordship. We prove that He is our ultimate shield and exceeding great reward.

## **The Engine of Envy: How Man-Made Consumerism Serves Another God**

The ultimate violation of the tenth commandment occurs when individuals or entire societies design systems, laws, and cultural practices that run entirely on the engine of envy and artificial discontentment. *“What shall we say then? Is the law sin? God forbid. Nay, I had not known sin, but by the law: for I had not known lust, except the law had said, Thou shalt not covet.” — Romans 7:7*

*“From whence come wars and fightings among you? come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members? Ye lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not.” — James 4:1–2*

*“Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee.” — Hebrews 13:5*

## **Conclusion: The Sanctuary of the Heart**

The spiritual depth of the Tenth Commandment brings the entire moral law to its true destination: the human heart. You cannot clean the outside of the cup while the inside is full of greedy extortion.
