

The Bible: Old Testament and New Testament

Introduction

David

King David, writing through the promptings of the Holy Ghost, recorded specific features of Christ's execution centuries before crucifixion was adopted as a method of capital punishment, highlighting the piercing of hands and feet.

Psalm 22:16 (KJV): "For dogs have compassed me: the assembly of the wicked have enclosed me: they pierced my hands and my feet."

Part II: Canonical Validation by Jesus Christ

During His earthly ministry, Jesus did not distance Himself from the Hebrew scriptures; rather, He established them as the absolute standard of truth. He validated the traditional three-part division of the Hebrew Canon, known as the TaNaK (Torah, Nevi'im, Ketuvim), comprising the Law, the Prophets, and the Writings (represented foremost by the Psalms).

Part V: Additional Prophetic Books Cited by Jesus

Daniel the Prophet:

Jesus references Daniel's end-time prophecies regarding the final desecration of the temple.

Part VII: Apostolic Application in Acts and Epistles

Where Christ spoke with firsthand authority as the Author and fulfiller of the Law, the Apostles operated as heralds, weaving scriptural proofs to convert the lost and anchor New Covenant theology.

Evangelistic Proving in the Book of Acts:

Peter at Pentecost utilized Joel 2 and Psalm 16 to demonstrate that the resurrection of Jesus was the predetermined plan of God.

Acts 2:27 (KJV): "Because thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption."

Theological Framing in the Epistles:

Paul turned to Genesis 15 to prove that justification has always been by faith, long before the codification of the Mosaic ritual laws.

Romans 4:3 (KJV): "For what saith the scripture? Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness."

The Author of Hebrews relied heavily on Jeremiah 31 to argue that the Levitical priesthood was structurally temporal, designed to yield to the permanent Melchizedekian priesthood of Christ. *Hebrews 8:8 (KJV): "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah:"*
