

Feast of Trumpets, Day of the Lord and the Year of Recompenses

A Biblical Study of the Day of the Lord, Covenant Warfare, and the Sound of Alarm in the Old and New Testaments

Introduction: The Sound of Cosmic Alarm

Throughout the text of Holy Scripture, the blowing of a trumpet serves as a foundational signal of divine intervention, institutional mobilization, and royal decree. - **Amos 5:18:** “Woe unto you that desire the day of the LORD! to what end is it for you? the day of the LORD is darkness, and not light.”
- **Obadiah 15:** “For the day of the LORD is near upon all the heathen: as thou hast done, it shall be done unto thee: thy reward shall return upon thine own head.”
- **Zephaniah 1:14-16:** “The great day of the LORD is near, it is near, and hasteth greatly... That day is a day of wrath, a day of trouble and distress, a day of wasteness and desolation, a day of darkness and gloominess, a day of clouds and thick darkness, a day of the trumpet and alarm against the fenced cities, and against the high towers.”

- **Zechariah 14:1, 3:** “Behold, the day of the LORD cometh... Then shall the LORD go forth, and fight against those nations, as when he fought in the day of battle.”
- **Malachi 4:1:** “For, behold, the day cometh, that shall burn as an oven; and all the proud, yea, and all that do wickedly, shall be stubble...”
