

Righteous Judgment: Developing the Divine Mind

Introduction

The ultimate purpose of human existence is to be conformed to the very image of Jesus Christ, transforming from physical flesh into spirit-born children in the Family of God. To fulfill this destiny and reign as kings and priests in the Kingdom of God, humanity must learn to think as God thinks.

Nowhere is the mind of God more clearly laid bare than in the foundational legal frameworks of Leviticus and Deuteronomy. These books are not mere ancient history; they are a direct transcript of divine logic.

By studying these statutes, we discover that God's judgment is not driven by emotional erraticism or raw power. Instead, it is an architectural blueprint of absolute truth, equity, and discernment.

God does not want us to remain passive observers of His justice. He commands us to internalize His perspective so that we can execute true, righteous judgment under His guidance.

The Pillars of Divine Discernment

To build the mind of Christ within us, we must systematically examine the judicial instructions God gave to Israel. Each statute targets a specific flaw in human nature and replaces it with a divine standard.

1. The Standard of Absolute Holiness

Human judgment changes with cultural trends, but God's baseline is His own immutable, flawless character. He demands complete separation from anything that defiles.

"For I am the Lord your God: ye shall therefore sanctify yourselves, and ye shall be holy; for I am holy: neither shall ye defile yourselves with any manner of creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth. For I am the Lord that bringeth you up out of the land of Egypt, to be your God: ye shall therefore be holy, for I am holy." (Leviticus 11:44–45)

To judge righteously, we must learn to distinguish between what is spiritually clean and unclean, refusing to compromise with the corruptive influences of the world.

2. Blind Impartiality and Strict Equity

Human beings are prone to bias, often favoring the wealthy out of fear or compromising truth out of emotional pity for the poor. God completely levels the courtroom.

"Ye shall do no unrighteousness in judgment: thou shalt not respect the person of the poor, nor honour the person of the mighty: but in righteousness shalt thou judge thy neighbour." (Leviticus 19:15)

Furthermore, His judgments are perfectly proportional, ensuring that justice corrects the wrong without escalating into personal vengeance:

"And if a man cause a blemish in his neighbour; as he hath done, so shall it be done to him; Breach for breach, eye for eye, tooth for tooth: as he hath caused a blemish in a man, so shall it be done to him again. And he that killeth a beast, he shall restore it: and he that killeth a man, he shall be put to death." (Leviticus 24:19–21)

3. Universal Application and Daily Honesty

God does not possess a double standard. The same rules apply to the native leader and the wandering outsider. He also demands this absolute integrity in our daily financial and personal interactions.

"Ye shall have one manner of law, as well for the stranger, as for one of your own country: for I am the Lord your God." (Leviticus 24:22)

"Ye shall do no unrighteousness in judgment, in meteyard, in weight, or in measure. Just balances, just weights, a just ephah, and a just hin, shall ye have: I am the Lord your God, which brought you out of the land of Egypt." (Leviticus 19:35–36)

4. Diligent Investigation and Evidentiary Certainty

True judgment requires patient, meticulous examination. God strictly forbids rushing to a verdict based on rumor, hearsay, or emotional panic. A matter must be fully investigated and verified by multiple independent sources.

"Then shalt thou enquire, and make search, and ask diligently; and, behold, if it be truth, and the thing certain..." (Deuteronomy 13:14)

"One witness shall not rise up against a man for any iniquity, or for any sin, in any sin that he sinneth: at the mouth of two witnesses, or at the mouth of three witnesses, shall the matter be established." (Deuteronomy 19:15)

5. Protection for the Vulnerable and Retribution for Falsehood

Because God sees what is hidden, He fiercely protects those who cannot defend themselves. Concurrently, His system naturally turns the weapon of a malicious liar back onto their own head.

"Thou shalt not curse the deaf, nor put a stumblingblock before the blind, but shalt fear thy God: I am the Lord." (Leviticus 19:14)

"And the judges shall make diligent inquisition: and, behold, if the witness be a false witness, and hath testified falsely against his brother; Then shall ye do unto him, as he had thought to have done unto his brother: so shalt thou put the evil away from among you." (Deuteronomy 19:18–19)

6. The Higher Standard of Spiritual Accountability

Those who are brought close to God are held to a rigorous standard. When Nadab and Abihu treated God's explicit commands with carnal presumption, immediate judgment followed to preserve the sanctity of divine truth.

"And Nadab and Abihu, the sons of Aaron, took either of them his censer, and put fire therein, and put incense thereon, and offered strange fire before the Lord, which he

commanded them not. And there went out fire from the Lord, and devoured them, and they died before the Lord." (Leviticus 10:1–2)

To ensure this standard remains pure, humanity is strictly forbidden from editing, modernizing, or altering God's words to suit personal preferences.

"Ye shall not add unto the word which I command you, neither shall ye diminish ought from it, that ye may keep the commandments of the Lord your God which I command you." (Deuteronomy 4:2)

Christ as the Living Manifestation of the Law

When Jesus Christ walked the earth in human flesh, He perfectly modeled these Old Testament judicial principles, showing how they operate in spirit and truth. Rather than abolishing the laws of Leviticus and Deuteronomy, He elevated them to their highest spiritual intent.

1. Upholding Diligent Investigation and the Rule of Witnesses

In John 8, when the scribes and Pharisees brought a woman caught in adultery, they attempted to weaponize the law out of malice. Jesus did not bypass Deuteronomy; He applied it with flawless accuracy. He challenged the integrity of the accusers based on the law of malicious witnesses. Later, in John 5:31-37, Christ defended His own messianic claims by refusing to rely on single-source testimony:

"If I bear witness of myself, my witness is not true. There is another that beareth witness of me... the Father himself, which hath sent me, hath borne witness of me."

He directly honored Deuteronomy 19:15 by presenting John the Baptist, His miraculous works, and the Father as the multiple necessary witnesses to establish His identity.

2. Christ's Application of Church Discipline

Jesus structured the governance of His Church upon these exact same Old Testament legal requirements. In Matthew 18:15-16, He outlines the process for resolving offenses and executing righteous judgment within the congregation:

"But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established."

By carrying the statutes of Deuteronomy directly into the New Covenant, Christ demonstrated that the standard for divine verification never alters. Rumor and unverified accusation have no legal standing in the family of God.

The Indwelling of the Holy Spirit: The Engine of Transformation

Humanity cannot achieve this level of righteous judgment through sheer willpower. The carnal mind is completely incapable of mastering divine law because it operates on a fundamentally different frequency.

1. The Natural State of Enmity

The Apostle Paul notes the severe limitation of the unrenewed human mind in Romans 8:7:

"Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be."

Without a structural change in human nature, the statutes of Leviticus and Deuteronomy remain external restrictions rather than internal motivations. The natural mind reacts with emotion, selfishness, and cultural bias.

2. Writing the Law Upon the Heart

The Holy Spirit is the literal mechanism by which God changes human nature, bridging the gap between carnal instinct and divine judgment. As prophesied in Ezekiel 36:26-27:

"A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you... And I will put my spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes, and ye shall keep my judgments, and do them."

The Holy Spirit does not replace the law; it provides the spiritual capacity to understand and execute it. It illuminates the mind, allowing a person to see situations from God's cosmic perspective rather than a limited human viewpoint.
