“Thou shalt fear the Lord thy God, and serve him, and shalt swear by his name. Ye shall not go after other gods, of the gods of the people which are round about you;” — Deuteronomy 6:13–14

“And, Let every one that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity.” — 2 Timothy 2:19

By treating His name as holy—not just with our lips, but through unwavering obedience to His statutes—we acknowledge that He is our absolute Master. We prove that His reputation is the most valuable asset in our lives.

The Hypocritical Caricature: Wearing His Name While Practicing the Laws of Men

“And when they entered unto the heathen, whither they went, they profaned my holy name, when they said to them, These are the people of the Lord, and are gone forth out of his land.” — Ezekiel 36:20

“Thou that makest thy boast of the law, through breaking the law dishonourest thou God? For the name of God is blasphemed among the Gentiles through you, as it is written.” — Romans 2:23–24
