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### Toronto Man Charged with Human Trafficking

A Toronto man has been charged with human trafficking offences and investigators are attempting to confirm there are no other victims.

On Tuesday, November 17, 2020, members of the DRPS Human Trafficking Unit were conducting a proactive initiative and located a 19-year-old female victim being forced to work in the sex trade and all of her money was being taken. The victim had met the accused on a dating app. She was brought to various hotels in Ontario.

Investigators located the suspect on scene; however, he fled on foot. On Thursday, November 19, 2020, the male was located and arrested without incident at Toronto Pearson Airport. The accused was attempting to flee to another province with the victim. The accused has ties to Hamilton, Barrie, Toronto, and Peel Region.

Sydney BUNKUNA, age 22 of Toronto, is charged with: Trafficking Person Over 18, Material benefit from Trafficking in Person over 18, Procuring-Recruit person to provide sexual services, Procuring-Exercise Control, Obtain Sexual Services for Consideration, Advertising Sexual Services and Material Benefit from Sexual Services.

## DURHAM REGION MOVES INTO RED-CONTROL CATEGORY

Whitby, Ontario – The following statement is being issued on behalf of John Henry, Regional Chair and Chief Executive Officer: "As cases continue to rise across the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area, Durham Region was notified that the Province of Ontario is taking additional steps to help prevent the spread in Durham Region.

23, the Region will move into the Red-Control category of the provincial framework. This means broader-scale measures and restrictions across multiple sectors, to control transmission.

It's a necessary step to help us continue the fight against COVID-19 and flatten the curve.

This means that there will be several changes coming to

Durham Region, in order to help keep you and your family safe.

Gatherings are limited to five people indoors and 25 outdoors. Workplaces will have expanded restrictions, screening and planning requirements. There are new capacity restrictions in place across many different establishments, such as restaurants, gyms, and other venues like those for weddings and

religious services. Non-essential travel from areas of high transmission to areas of low transmission should be avoided.

I urge you all to make informed decisions to help keep your family, your friends, and your neighbours safe. Please, keep your social interactions to those within your own household and avoid hosting guests.

Wash your hands frequently, stay six feet apart, wear your mask, and download the COVID Alert app.

Stay home – avoid non-essential travel. Limit trips outside of your home to only essential reasons like medical appointments.

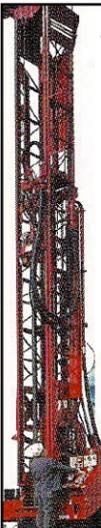
Stay apart - Maintain 2-metres distance from anyone who doesn't live with you or is not your essential caregiver.

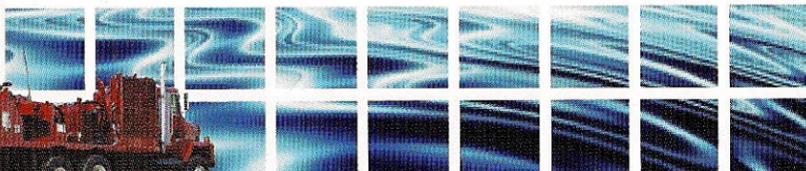
