AN EYE OPENING MEMOIR

Can a 15-second "incident" that happened to an 11-year-old altar boy in his parent's bedroom a half-century ago forever change the course of his life and the trusting relationship he had with his _two_ fathers: his biological one and the beloved parish priest who sexually molested him?

In "My Fathers: Letters of Healing on a Quest for the Truth," Len Prazych shares his story in a series of intimate letters to his recently deceased father, while trying to learn what _really _happened on a sweltering August night in 1971 in Bayonne, NJ.

Unlike salacious tales and tabloid headlines that describe multiple incidents of horrific sexual abuse at the hands of priests who preved upon unsuspecting altar boys and other vulnerable children over years or decades, "My Fathers" is a story healing told by "one who got away," and his 50-year quest to learn the truth about his perhaps not-so-pious father and his predatory priest. Ontario Opening New School in Oshawa Maamawi iyaawag Public School!!!

Maamawi iyaawag Public School will be welcoming students in September for the 2024-25 school year.

This project is a part of Ontario's ongoing efforts to build and improve local schools, with the province providing Durham District School Board with \$22.2 million to build the new school in Oshawa.

This project delivers 536 elementary spaces and 73 licensed childcare spaces for local families for the 2024-25 school year.

The investment is part of Ontario's commitment to providing about \$16 billion to support school construction, renewal and improvement over 10 years. Since 2018,

the government has approved or supported the development of over 300 school-related projects including childcare, of which more than 100 are actively under construction.

"The completion of another school in our community is great news for families in

Oshawa - The newly built Durham," said Todd McCarthv. MPP for Durham. "This is the latest example of how our government is delivering on our promise to ensure children across Ontario receive an excellent education and reach their full potential."

Additionally, Ontario is taking action to ensure that school board capital assets are used effectively and efficiently to meet the needs of growing communities, support student learning and ensure value for taxpayer dollars.



Ontario secured a \$13.2 billion agreement with the federal government that will lower fees for families to an average of \$10 a day for children under the age of six under the Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care system.

Oshawa Power workers union reach agreement

Oshawa Power and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) Local 636 have ratified a new three-year collective agreement, the utility provider announced. The collective agreement was not set to expire until February 2025 and was negotiated in advance, it said.

The new collective agreement provides union members with wage increases, as well as increases in benefits, premiums and allowances. The percentages of increases was not mentioned.

Oshawa Power and IBEW negotiations began on July 8, with meetings concluding on August 14. The contract is set to start November 1 and will run through to November 1, 2027, Oshawa Power said.
