### STATISTICS CANADA REPORTS THAT **TOURISM SPENDING IS GROWING IN CANADA**

Statistics Canada releases national tourism indicators for third quarter 2018.

Canada's tourism sector is a driver of the Canadian economy: it contributes to economic growth and creates opportunities and jobs for the middle class across Canada. The tourism sector is an important source of employment for Canadians, supporting 1.8 million jobs across the country.

Yesterday, Statistics Canada released a report that highlights the latest numbers for Canada's tourism sector.

From January to September of 2018, tourism spending in Canada was \$80.8 billion, an increase of 5.9% compared to the same period in 2017. Domestic revenues edged up 6.9% to almost \$63.3 billion. and tourism revenues from international travellers increased 2.3% to \$17.5 bil-

In the first nine months of 2018, tourism activities directly accounted for \$33.9 billion of Canada's GDP, an increase of 5.9% over the same period in globally. And it's why our gov-

2017. Tourism directly accounted for over 750,000 jobs from January to September 2018, an increase of 1.3% compared to the same period in 2017.

Tourism is a vital and growing part of the Canadian economy. From 2014 to 2017, Canada's tourism sector gained ground by almost every measure. International arrivals in Canada grew by an average of 8% per year and the tourism sector's contribution to GDP grew by an average of 4.6% per year. From 2014 to 2017. the number of jobs in Canada's tourism sector grew by an average of 1.7% per year.

### **CANADA'S CONSERVATIVES CALL FOR** EMERGENCY FOREIGN AFFAIRS **COMMITTEE MEETING ON**

CHINESE - CANADIAN RELATIONS

The Hon. Erin O'Toole, Shadow Conservative Minister for Foreign Affairs, issued the following statement after requesting an emergency meeting of the Standing Committee on and Foreign Affairs International Development to discuss the state of Chinese-Canadian relations:

"Since the December 1st arrest of Huawei executive Meng Wanzhou, Canadians have been subject to retaliatory detentions by the Chinese government, while dozens of others have been detained on administrative grounds or had their visas questioned.

"Prime Minister Trudeau confirmed that he believes that

these detentions are 'completely politically motivated' but he has still not called the Chinese President about these actions. Clearly, Justin Trudeau's naïve approach to diplomacy is not working.

"That is why Conservatives on the Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs are calling for an emergency committee meeting. The Liberals need to outline what steps they are taking to ensure the immediate release of detained Canadians and be clear whether or not it is safe for Canadians to travel to China. The Canadian Ambassador to China, the Hon. John McCallum is in Canada to brief the liberal government

on the situation and the committee should have the opportunity to hear from him as well.

Canadians are rightly concerned about family members in China and are question whether it is safe to travel there amid the present dispute.

"Canada's Conservatives will continue to urge Justin Trudeau to intervene on behalf of Canadians detained in China and to provide certainty to the hundreds of Canadians with family members working in China or those considering travel to the country."
