Visioning Exercise Could See Costs Balloon by 50%

PORT PERRY – The Port Perry Agricultural Society (PPAS) is raising concerns about conflicting information and reports that the cost of the “Visioning Exercise” may have increased to \$150,000, according to the township’s capital projects status report released this week.

The project, carried out by Toronto-based consulting firm Darwin Pivot, was originally advertised as staying just under \$100,000. The possibility of a budget increase has caused confusion and concern among Port Perry residents. “At a time when everything is getting more expensive, people are sensitive to growing costs,” said Paul Puckrin, President of the PPAS. “Especially when the purpose of the project has been unclear from the outset.”

In addition to uncertainty over project expenditures, there is a lack of clarity about the exercise’s scope and objectives. While the Mayor has recently stated that no decision on the Fairgrounds has been made, her comments appear to contradict statements made previously to a PPAS member.

Furthermore, in early discussions with PPAS, a member of the Darwin Pivot team indicated that the consultant’s expertise would be used to turn community feedback into feasible design options – a role that seems to align with the original RFP. At the same time, reports now suggest that Council may not continue with the project after Phase 2 is complete.

“Scugog Council pursued this exercise despite strong public sentiment,” added Puckrin. “So far, it hasn’t produced any information we didn’t already know: that the Fairgrounds park should be protected. Instead, residents are left with vagueness and unanswered questions. Was this done intentionally, to preserve flexibility for a predetermined outcome? Or because the project hasn’t been fully thought through? Either way, it could cost the public up to \$150,000.”

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WHERE IS KIRKLAND PC MP AND FRENCH NDP MPP?

OSHAWA — Ontario NDP Leader Marit Stiles, and Oshawa MPP Jennifer French are calling for an action plan to deliver certainty for Oshawa auto workers, as GM announces massive layoffs starting Friday.

"Oshawa's auto workers will outlast Trump. GM, Doug Ford, and Mark Carney need to be planning a future that takes us further down that road. The fight for Oshawa’s auto future is not over." The current announcement has been seen by many as the last nail in the GM empire.

The people of Oshawa are being left without jobs, in a state of economic chaos. Not to mention having to deal with the environmental hazards including many of the former GM dumps scattered all over the city. Mr. John Ecker to the Police Service Board

The Durham Regional Police Service Board announced that Mr. John Ecker has been appointed to the Board by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario for a two-year term. “I welcome the honour to serve the community as a member of the Police Service Board,” said Mr. Ecker. “I look forward to supporting the Board’s responsibility to ensure that policing in our community earns the trust and confidence of the citizens of Durham Region.” “Mr. Ecker has strong connections to our community and extensive leadership and governance experience that will enable him to make an impactful contribution to the Board’s deliberations and decisions,” said Board Chair Shaun Collier. “His presence will assist the Board in achieving its objectives for a safe community.” The Durham Regional Police Service Board is the civilian governing body of the Police Service. Its responsibilities include establishing objectives for policing in consultation with the Chief of the Police, setting policies for adequate and effective policing and the administration of the Police Service, and hiring and monitoring the performance of the Chief of Police. The Board consists of seven members, three appointed by the Province of Ontario and four chosen by Regional Council. John Ecker is a semi-retired communication, marketing, branding, and fundraising executive. Most recently, he served in successive senior roles at the Archdiocese of Toronto. He oversaw brand development and marketing for the archdiocese’s highly successful Family of Faith Campaign, and led the strategic re-positioning of the archdiocese’s Office for Refugees. He also led the archdiocese’s Indigenous healing and reconciliation activities. In 2022 he was the Program and Production Lead for the Pope’s visit to Iqaluit, Nunavut, and received a Papal Medal from Pope Francis for his work. Previously, he was a Vice President at Indspire (the former National Aboriginal Achievement Foundation) and he has held director-level positions at the Ontario Trillium Foundation, ECHO: Improving Women’s Health in Ontario, and Toronto Board of Trade.

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He also serves as Chair of the Ontario Heritage Trust, the province’s heritage agency. He is a Governor on the Board of Durham College and a Board member of the Ontario Cultural Attractions Fund. Ecker previously served as Chair of the June Callwood Outstanding Achievement Awards for Voluntarism, Chair of the Whitby Public Library Board, Chair of Waterview Child Care Centre, Chair of the Lynde Marsh Alliance, Chair of Heritage Whitby, and served on the Board of Credit Canada. Internationally, he established Bimini Bound, which sent over 10,000 books and learning resources to schools on the island of Bimini, Bahamas. In 2025, the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario recognized Ecker’s service to his community, Ontario, and Canada when she presented him with the King Charles III Coronation Medal. He received his Photography Diploma from Fanshawe College in London and his BA in Political Science from the University of Waterloo.
