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Pierre Poilievre can no longer lead the Conservatives...

Two Conservative members of parliament have now crossed the floor to join the federal Liberal caucus, being Chris d'Entremont in November, and Michael Ma in recent days. Another Conservative MP, Matt Jeneroux, also announced he would be resigning his seat altogether, and will likely be relocating to British Columbia. These events have certainly caused turmoil within the Conservative caucus and now the pressure is on their leader Pierre Poilievre to signal his intention to step down before facing a mandatory leadership review in January – a process that was already set to take place after his party failed to form a government in the last federal election.

Although the decision to resign as party leader is a personal one, often influenced by internal party dynamics and future electoral prospects, his will be a direct consequence of the sheer number of floor crossings and other expressions of discontent within the ranks. There is no formal rule that requires a party leader to resign under these circumstances, however the writing is certainly on the wall for the man who has worked so tirelessly to overcome the odds - having lost in his own riding and being forced to run in a vacated Alberta seat. The nail that may prove to seal his political coffin came from Conservative MP Michael Ma, who has abandoned the party, a move he announced on Thursday as MP's finished their autumn session. Ma, who represents the Ontario riding of Markham - Unionville, said he now believes the government led by Prime Minister Mark Carney is on the right course, and we can take that as a direct jab at the leadership style of his old boss, Pierre Poilievre. Ma, elected as a Conservative MP, cited a desire for "unity and decisive action for Canada's future," saying that Prime Minister Carney offers what he now sees as the "steady, practical approach" needed to address priorities like affordability, the economy, and community safety. His defection is significant as it brings the Liberal government to 171 seats, just one seat shy of a majority government in the House of Commons. As it happens, Ma won his seat after the previous Liberal candidate, Paul Chiang, stepped down amid controversy. Although the practice of "crossing the floor," or changing political parties between elections, is a controversial one, with public opinion in generally divided on the matter, there seems little doubt someone, somewhere within the Conservative caucus or elsewhere, will look for a windfall of sorts by very soon choosing to cross the floor in an effort to give Mark Carney his coveted majority. Just who that person will be remains to be seen.

Carney Liberals copy Conservative ideas in words only...

Regardless of the troubles now being stirred up by Conservative MPs defecting to the Liberals, credit goes to their leader Pierre Poilievre who spent months fighting for stronger take-home pay for Canadians after a decade of rising costs and Liberal mismanagement. While Mark Carney bragged about stealing Conservative ideas to remove the consumer carbon tax, he turned around and hiked the industrial carbon tax even higher. No real surprise there. But along with keeping taxes on food packaging and the clean fuel standard - which make transportation even more expensive, the Liberals' love of hidden taxes on food continues to increase the cost of living. It's why families will be paying almost \$1,000 more for groceries next year - an issue that has been discussed in these pages recently It's the same approach that led Mark Carney to say he wants to make our country an "energy superpower," only to back down in an effort to appease his keep-it-in-the-ground caucus that voted against building a pipeline and removing the tanker ban. Instead of getting out of the way and approving the pipeline he promised, the Prime Minister has instead decided to keep the same anti-development regulatory regime for hundreds of projects. Under the Major Projects Office, only well-connected insiders like his corporate friends are able to get anything built - with special status for certain projects that benefit the 'insider' class. The same refusal to simply get government out of the way is also suffocating housing construction.

After promising to cut development charges in half, Carney's Minister Gregor Robertson dropped the promise altogether. While it's clear that builders are ready to build, the Liberals are doubling down on their plan to build just 5,200 homes a year. That's after they copied the Conservatives' intention to cut the GST on new homes, but failed to apply it across the board, eventually excluding 95 per cent of homes from the tax cut. That's simply ridiculous. It's the same abandonment of the promise to 'Spend Less and Invest More' that delivered the costliest budget in Canadian history. Canadians will all be forced to pay the cost of that \$90 billion in net new spending, and there's no hope that things will get better any time soon. We could go on and on, but it's clear enough that what this country needs is a federal government that will start to match words with action if we are ever to begin restoring what was a self-reliant Canada - with stronger take-home pay, safer streets, and stronger borders.

Second Harvest - Santa Claus

With the holiday season fast approaching, it's important to take all necessary precautions to keep yourself and your loved ones healthy, including by ensuring your vaccines are up to date. Respiratory illness season typically begins in the fall and lasts through the winter months, when colder weather and indoor gatherings make it easier for viruses to spread. This includes several common viruses such as influenza (flu), respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) and COVID-19.

Currently, COVID-19 and RSV activity remain low in Ontario, but flu season is officially here, and cases are steadily increasing. The flu shot remains one of the most effective ways to protect ourselves from influenza. Each year, the vaccine is designed to cover multiple strains. Getting vaccinated reduces your risk of catching the flu and, most importantly, lowers the chance of severe illness, hospitalization and serious complications.

Flu and COVID-19 shots are already available across Ontario for people 6 months and older at participating pharmacies, doctor and nurse practitioner offices or public health units. RSV immunization is also available for eligible groups, including adults aged 75 and older, infants and pregnant women. Those at higher risk of severe illness are especially encouraged to get vaccinated early. Influenza activity is expected to peak as early as mid-December in some regions. As the vaccine takes about two weeks to reach full effectiveness, getting vaccinated now will help ensure you are

protected when virus circulation is at its highest, while also reducing the spread of illness and protecting those most at risk. If you or a loved one are at higher risk for severe illness, you should talk to your health-care provider now to plan for testing and treatment.

As the holidays approach, let's all remember the simple steps that make a big difference: wash your hands, cover coughs and sneezes, clean shared surfaces regularly, and stay home if you are sick. Dr. Kieran Moore
