Spring graduation celebrations are approaching, and the Durham Regional Police Service (DRPS) is once again hosting two community-driven initiatives aimed at helping local youth attend their graduation celebrations with confidence and pride.

Youth support youth who may face financial barriers by providing free dresses and accessories for prom and graduation. With some formal dresses costing hundreds of dollars — in addition to shoes, hair services, and accessories — many students would otherwise be unable to participate in these milestone

events. In addition to Gowns for Grads, Suits for Youth helps outfit young people with suits, ties, and accessories they can use not only for graduation, but also for job interviews and future employment opportunities. Gowns for Grads is currently seeking donations of new or

WHO IS MAKING WHAT? ACROSS DURHAM AND BEYOND

Ontario just released the latest public salary disclosure, popularly known as the "Sunshine List," illuminating which public sector employees made more than \$100,000 in 2025.

What is the Sunshine List?
The list includes information on all public sector employees who were paid \$100,000 or more in 2025 and are subject to the Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act.

Who topped the Sunshine List?

Kenneth Hartwick, Ontario Power Generation special advisor (**salary paid \$1,907,408.69**)
Nicolle Butcher, Ontario Power Generation president and CEO (**salary paid \$1,596,218.20**)
Steve Gregoris, Ontario Power Generation chief nuclear officer (**salary paid \$1,092,854.84**)
Aida Cipolla, Ontario Power Generation chief financial officer and chief administrative officer (**salary paid \$1,013,496**)

Subo Sinnathamby, Ontario Power Generation chief projects officer (**salary paid \$981,475.74**)

Kevin Smith, University Health Network president and CEO (**salary paid \$939,603**)
Ronald Cohn, The Hospital for Sick Children president and CEO (**salary paid \$880,013.40**)

Mark Knutson, Ontario Power Generation chief enterprise engineering and chief nuclear engineer (**salary paid \$856,947.43**)

Jon Franke, Ontario Power Generation senior vice-president nuclear (**salary paid \$826,655.46**)

Mark Fuller, Ontario Public Service Pension Board (Ontario Pension Board) president and CEO (**salary paid \$826,235.89**).

Across Durham's top three mayors all come from its three most western municipalities, with Pickering's Kevin Ashe topping those who hold the chain of office.

Ashe's total compensation in 2025 came in at **\$319,890.65**, which includes pay from the municipality, the region and the Elexicon board, upon which he sits as a director. Also added in are benefits and pension payments.

The same holds true for Whitby Mayor Elizabeth Roy, who earned **\$318,666** when all compensation is included.

Third on the list is Ajax Mayor Shaun Collier, with a total compensation package of **\$308,125.76**.

All three are chairs of committees at the Region of Durham, which enhances their income by around \$7,000 (finance committee) for Ashe and Roy (social services committee), to about \$14,000 for Collier (police services board).

Though all three serve municipalities smaller than Oshawa, they make more than Mayor Dan Carter.

Part of the reason is they are all members of the Elexicon Board (Oshawa is not part of

Elexicon) and Carter, though a member of the police services board, receives a smaller stipend. Carter's expenses are lower as well.

Adrian Foster Clarington Mayor Adrian Foster was at the bottom when it comes to remuneration, expenses, pension pay, and all compensation in 2025 in south Durham mayors with just over **\$227,000**.

Carter's complete compensation package for 2025 was **\$270,719.12** for an estimated Oshawa population of 213,000. Whitby's estimated population for 2025 is 162,000. Ajax's estimated population at the end of 2025 was 141,000. Both Pickering and Clarington have estimated populations of 115,000 at the end of 2025.

All four mayors made more in total compensation than Regional Chair John Henry, whose package comes in at **\$257,463**.

His remuneration for the position is \$224,823. Durham Region's estimated population at the end of 2025 was 810,075. 4 Durham mayors top Toronto mayor in pay. Coming in next on the list is Clarington Mayor Adrian Foster, who received a total of **\$227,378.37**.

Foster doesn't sit on the Elexicon board, nor is he a chair of any other regional committee and his expenses are comparatively low.

Toronto Mayor Olivia Chow is reportedly compensated **\$235,850.94** for a city with an estimated population of 3.3 million.
