Winter parking reminders

No parking is allowed on the street during a snow event at any time of day or night, even with a parking permit.

In order to help us clear the roads more effectively, please assist us by following Clarington's by-law regarding vehicle operation. The by-law is applicable year-

round

Do not park on the road between the hours of 3 and 5 a.m., or for a period of longer than three hours.

Do not push, plow or blow snow onto the road

During late winter and early spring, follow weight restriction guidelines

Oshawa Winter parking takes effect on December 1

Changes to on street parking for the winter season will be in effect from Monday, December 1, through to

April 1. Reminders to community members:

On street parking is not permitted on Oshawa streets between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., from December 1 to April 1. Vehicles can be ticketed and/or towed during that time, regardless of snow clearing operations or weather conditions.

Vehicles parked on Oshawa streets at any time while salting/snow clearing operations are underway, may be ticketed and/or towed, regardless of whether it occurs before December 1 or after April 1

Occasional Use Parking Permits ((O.U.P.P.'s) are not valid during salting/snow clearing operations, and all previously arranged O.U.P.P.'s are suspended during salting/snow clearing operations.

Remember to lock your car and make sure you are not violating any of the thousands of downtown by-laws. Just because the space is free. You may be in violation of an array of bylaws.

Make sure that if you are a downtown merchant. Keep your walk ways clear of snow and ice.

The City at one time use to clear snow along the core as part of it's community involvement.
