believed in myself and held a boa constrictor much to the amazement of the children!



PE Achievements


 \uparrow All pupils have attended a PE session this month.

The highlight of this half term has been our adventures at forest school
It has been brilliant seeing the children exploring and investigating outside.
Activities included making dinner in the mud kitchen, blowing bubbles, obstacle courses and making lots of music with pots and pans.

The best bit was seeing the children working together as a team with Sally whose enthusiasm is contagious.

In creative art we have been learning about weaving techniques. We started by creating tulips through winding wool around a cardboard template and have also produced balloons using paper weaving and 3d art using wire racks and material strips and attaching plaits.

Using literacy shed this half term, watching videos that do not have text or speech has encouraged the children to engage and watch carefully so that they are able to answer questions at the end. Our favourite so far is Bubbles.

We also have a fabulous new interactive board in class and all the children have enjoyed playing interactive phonics games from phonics play and maths games from topmarks.

Thrive

This month the whole school has been working on comic strips and discussions around different incidents, and how we shine a light on their behaviour. We are encouraging students to think about the impact that antisocial behaviours have had on their day. This over the course of time can help our pupils to understand how it's ok to have these feeling's, it's how we use prosocial behaviours to deal with our emotions.

The comic strips have 3 parts

- 1. What happened in the incident
- 2. How this made them feel and others around them.
- 3. What they could do for next time and what could the staff of done to helped support them better in that moment.

This allows our pupils to reflect on their behaviour and the impact it's had on their day.
