This month, Willow have been utilising playdoh as a way to support us with our reading skills. We finally finished the book 'Dinoteks' but we were astonished when the story ended in a cliff hanger! We had a fantastic conversation thinking about why authors might use this and if we think it was an effective strategy.... We also ordered the second book so it must be! Playdoh helps us to show how characters are feeling but also allows us to explore how we visualise certain characters. We chose our favourite Dinotek and then made them out of playdoh. Make sure you ask your children to tell you the story.



Another fun, productive few weeks in Beech class around the Easter holidays. We finished off our science topic with a splash, testing for materials that absorb water and ones that are waterproof. The children then took turns to dress in a plastic rain mac with an umbrella to see if they stayed dry and Mrs Forkings then had to see if she stayed dry without the umbrella or rain mac while they threw water balloons at her. I think you can guess what the result was!

In personal development we thought about how we keep clothes clean and then washed the dolls clothes and hung them out to dry.

We couldn't have wished for a better returned after the Easter break all the children have enjoyed learning about the town and country during our first geography lesson, we celebrated St George's Day by acting out the story, completing pencil control dragons and making stick puppets to tell the story with and in our art lesson

children created tulips using the wool winding technique. We are looking forward to seeing what the rest of this half term brings.














Oak Olass

This Month in Thrive we have been working with our students around expressing their emotions in a prosocial way to build on their emotional well being. We have been having conversations around cause and effect and how that looks with our behaviour toward others, how that impacts their feelings and how it makes others feel around them. We are using phrases like " I'm wondering how you are feeling", "I can imagine that's really difficult", "I'm noticing that has made you feel sad." This allows our students to open up about their emotions with out feeling they are being questioned by using W.I.N.
