AHOY MSA

As your 2026 Co-Commodore allow me to introduce myself. I was born in Knoxville, TN in 1942. Six months after my birth my mother and I flew to Miami to join my father who had just joined Eastern Airlines as a DC-3 pilot and Miami, FL was to be his base. So, during my early years in Miami we lived in Biscayne Park and Miami Shores, both northern suburbs of Miami. In those days, the 1950s, Biscayne Bay was pristine compared to today with a fair amount of undeveloped coastline and plenty of fish in its waters. At ten years of age I was allowed to go to the bay by myself and I spent the next five years mostly fishing and going to school. At age 15 we moved to South Miami again near Biscayne Bay but the south end this time and it was like being reborn as far as the places and things for a kid to do went. Here I got my first boat, an 8

1/2 foot pram and with my Dad's 5 HP outboard on it, went all over south Biscayne Bay and the northern Keys camping and fishing with my buddies. It was the best part of my life so far. At about 16 I bought a 22 foot Chris Craft speed boat hull and refinished the hull inside and out and repowered it with a straight-six engine and now my buddies and I could cruise the Bay in style. It was a rather beautiful boat with classic lines. My next boat was an airboat I built and in which we explored the Everglades and had much fun and adventure.

I subsequently went to Uni. of Florida for 3 1/2 years in an architecture program that was not a promising career path for me, so I left school to learn to fly. Back in Miami I got married, found a job as a yacht carpenter at a well-known yard, Bertram's Yacht Basin, where I worked for a year learning many woodworking tricks which have been useful to this day and flew on weekends getting my Private, Commercial, and Instrument ratings which allowed me to apply to the airlines. Of course, Eastern was my first choice being the hometown airline plus they had just bought a bunch of B-727s and didn't have enough pilots to fly them so I figured they needed them, even under qualified pilots like me. I was right and fortunate to be applying at that time and was hired with less than 200 hours of single engine, fixed gear, fixed pitch prop time. I was amazed but very happy. Nowadays it takes 6 to 8,000 hours of turbine and glass cockpit time to even

apply successfully. I was sent to Boston to fly the L-188 Electra on the first and famous no-reservations-required shuttle between Boston, Washington, and NY LaGuardia. I did that for about a year then transferred to Atlanta and upgraded to the B-727 which is still my favorite airplane. I have 10,000 hours in that plane and it is a wonderfully capable flying machine.

Now begins my sailing career in earnest. I and a friend went in together and bought a 23 foot Neptune monohull lake-sailer and had that for quite a few years and enjoyed it, but I had dreams of a sailing catamaran in the Florida area. I nurtured that dream for about 10 years with a picture of a 34 foot Gemini 105 Mc catamaran taped in front of my desk until finally I bit the bullet and bought one in 2010 docked in Hobe Sound, FL just south of Stuart on the East Coast. It was a perfect boat for me, big enough to comfortably have another couple on board yet small enough for me to single-hand when I wanted to. I sailed that fine boat up and down the southern half of the East Coast from Vero Beach down as far as Tavernier in the Keys. This period of sailing came to an end when I wearied of the 11 hour drive from my house just SW of Atlanta to Hobe Sound so I decided to take the boat to a marina closer to home i.e. Panama City. When that was accomplished, the boat was only 6 hours from my house and will be much easier to sail more often.

After my retirement from the airlines, I decided to move me and the boat to Florida where I wanted to be all along. In May of 2016 my sailing buddy and I took the boat from Panama City to Cove Sound Marina in Cortez, FL and my subsequent sailing on the West Coast of Florida extended from Marco Island to Pensacola with all the stops and anchorages in between. It was a pleasure to own and sail this boat, but I recently got too old to do it safely and efficiently so I sold it this past November. After 15 years it was a sad day but still a relief not to have to do all the work required to keep a boat running. Now I'm boatless like many of our members as we age out of the ability to do an activity as strenuous as sailing. It's sad but inevitable, I guess, if you live long enough.

My aim now is to keep MSA alive and well with the help of Rick Jackerson our other Co-Commodore and the very capable Board of Directors which is Vice-Commodore Tom Briggie, Cruising Captain Jim McGinnis, Racing Captain Sue Davidson, Secretary Claude Solomon, Treasurer Linda Briggie, Social Secretary

Gail Gordon, Membership Chair Deana Boydstun, and Past Commodore Jim McGinnis. With all that fine help how can 2026 be anything but successful?

A brief synopsis of our Board meeting on Jan. 21st:

We decided that there would be general meetings with dinner at Mean Dean's (6059 26th St. West, Bradenton) quarterly on the second Wednesday i.e. February 11, May 13, August 12, and November 11, 2026 with January 2027 having the Installation Dinner as usual. 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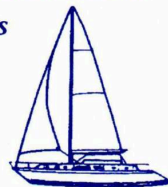


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TALES OF A KITE FESTIVAL

I watched the weather reports for Martin Luther King weekend, January 16th, 17th and 18th, as if I had money riding on it. The week prior was unseasonably cold with fronts coming in right and left. Even with the questionable forecast, I kept seeing advertisements on TV and other media touting the many facets of the upcoming Kite Festival scheduled for that very weekend on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday

Bob and Karen had decided to get a hotel room, so they had their bikes in tow. I think renting a hotel room may be next year's plan for this activity. About an hour later, Rick and Adelia Jackerson and

layers of clothing as already the temperature had far exceeded the forecast highs and by midafternoon, it was close to 75 degrees with almost no wind. We were actually sweating!

The MSA gathering at the kite festival was complete when Bob and Linda Lund and Deb Jacobs added their chairs to our group for a total of 11. They found at midafternoon inexpensive beach parking was available. It was a nearly perfect day after all and once again, we

enjoyed sun, sand and surf among some of the most talented kite performers in North America who displayed their expertise to the public free. It was worth the effort, and I can hardly wait until next year! Thank you for joining me.



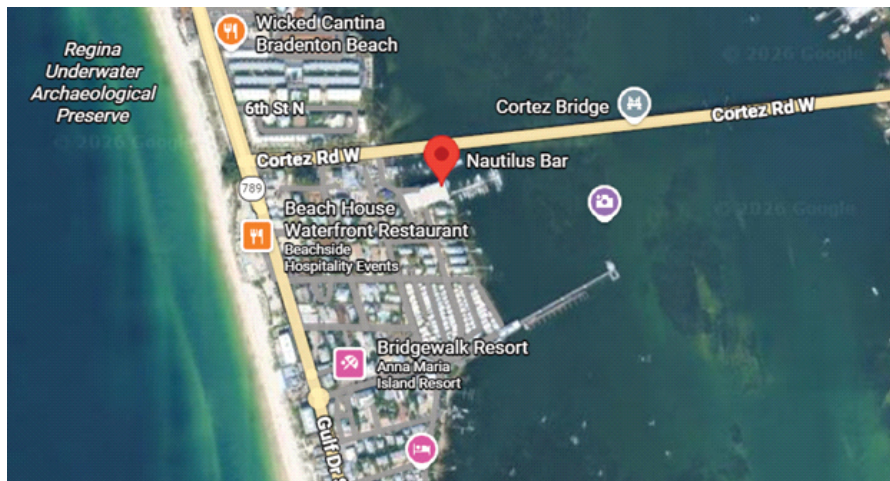

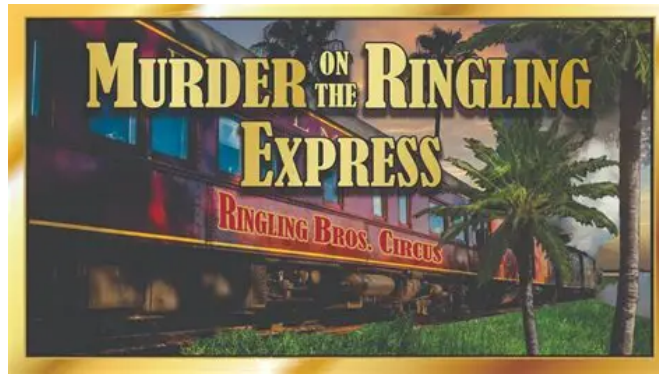

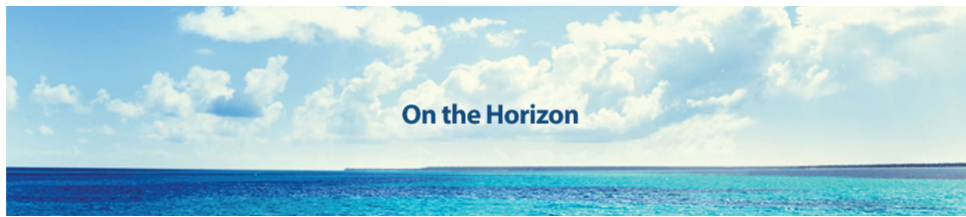
As I get older, I appreciate these times of celebration even more. We have a long
