Racing Rules of Sailing:

We had some real controversy at the end of our racing season this year in the Finger Lakes Yacht Club. I want to highlight what happened and what was done about it. Mostly I'd like to emphasize the spirit of Sailing and the sport we love. If you are not a sailor and don't care about this, read no further and skip down to the bottom ... unless you can't help yourself. For the rest of you, the Finger Lakes Yacht Club has an 8-race season which works out to a race every other weekend during the season. A few more non-points races are thrown in for fun. One person is the keeper of the Excel based race handicap system and scores all the races. We use the PHRF handicaps published widely for boats.

When a new boat, a Pearson 31, was added to the database at the beginning of the season, an error crept in. The Pearson 31 was added as Pearson 28 by a typo. This gave the Pearson 31 an incorrect but beneficial handicap. The new boat and

skipper placed highly in all of the races and won a few of them. At the end of the season the season scoring showed the Pearson 31 as the overall winner. The Race Committee discovered the error after the final race and met with the skipper to explain the situation. The handicap was corrected and the season scoring corrected to move the Pearson 31 from first to second. The next day a firestorm erupted on our message list which includes

all racers. Some accused non-ethical activity, and some said we all should have voted on what to do. Thankfully, the Racing Rules of Sailing covers this situation, and we all learned a lot. In Rule 90.3 c Scoring, if the race committee discovers an error it is required to correct it and notify all racers. That is what was done. World Sailing regattas include in the Notice of Race a statement that says all Protests must be filed within 24 hours of the end of the race and results are final Rule 90.3(e). We don't have a Notice of Race document, and we don't have anyone verifying the handicap values. I expect that we will next year. Most importantly, we were able to focus those involved on taking care of maintaining Racing Rule 69 Misconduct which states "Misconduct is: (1) conduct

that is a breach of good manners, a breach of good sportsmanship, or unethical behavior; or (2) conduct that may bring, or has brought, the sport into disrepute." So just have fun out there, we are beer can racers.

Chuck and I arrived at about 2 P.M. to the Vinoy Park in St. Pete to claim a space big enough for the 18 MSA members who decided










A CHRISTMAS CONCERT THE BAY CHORALE DECEMBER 7TH AT 4 P.M.
